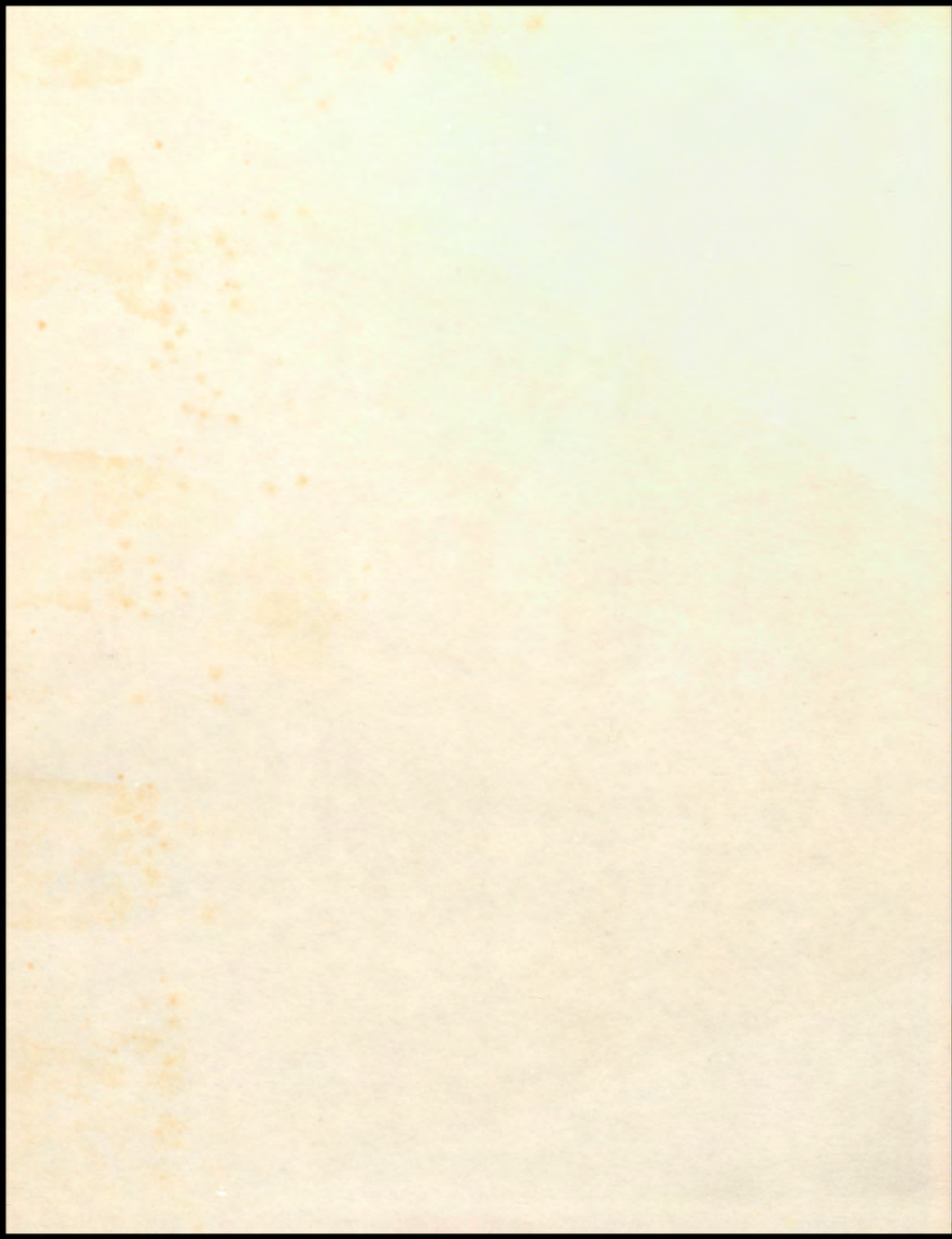

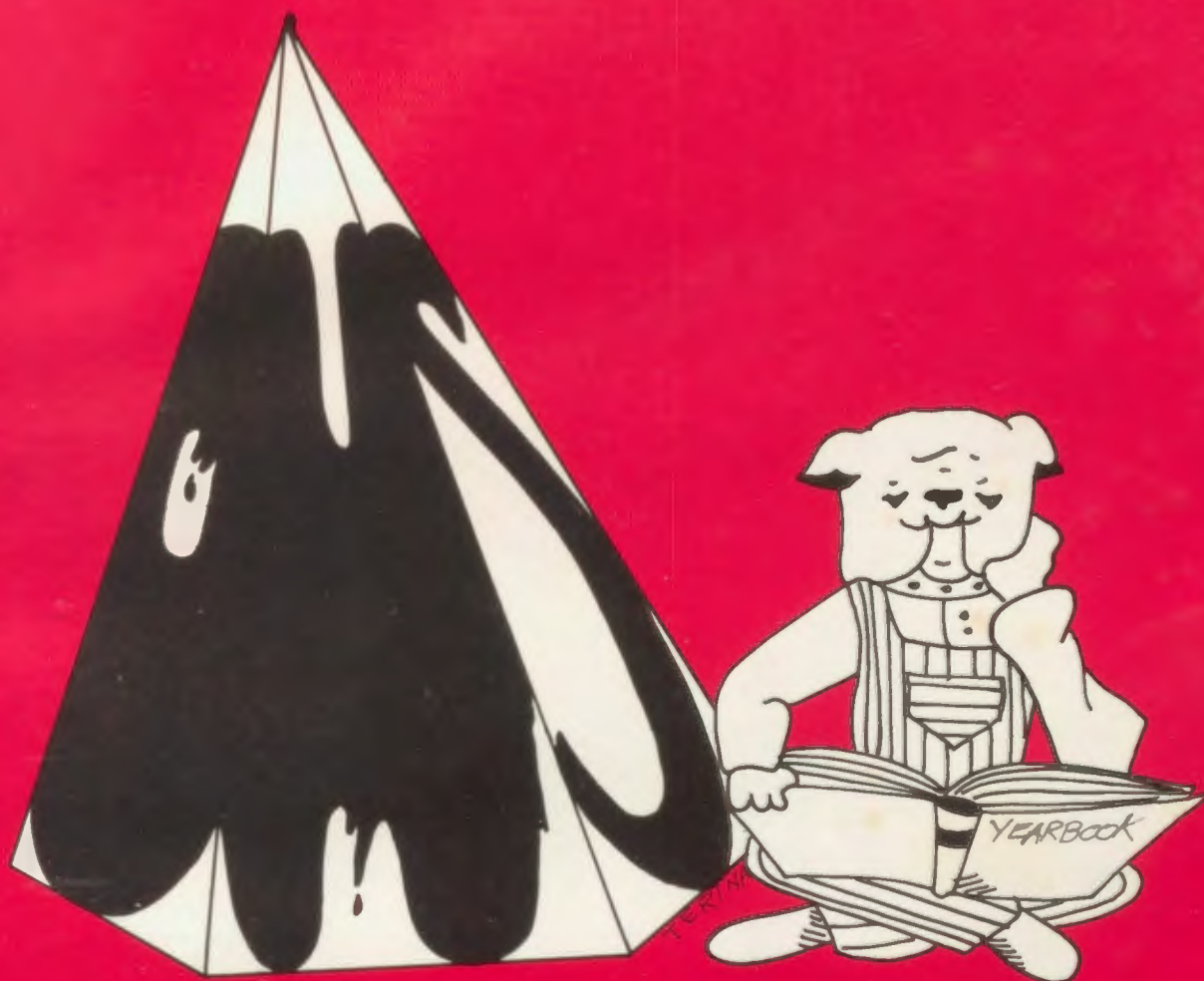

"The Old . . .

The old building has held several generations of students since it was built as an elementary school in 1883. Later on it was utilized for many high school classes, most recently instrumental music, U.S. History, auto mechanics, and the Forensics team.

The Adams building could not last forever. It was termed obsolete and a fire hazard. The rooms were poorly lighted and difficult to heat. It had to go, but in its place was built one of the best vocational-technical facilities in the Midwest.

Construction on the \$2.4 Million Vo-Tech building began in March of 1977. Scheduled completion was for the fall of 1978, but classes were not moved in until early in 1979.

It was worth the wait! Many classes were improved with the larger working space and several courses were added. Class time has been increased, and the vocational department has become a more integrated part of OHS since busing to the old Benton Street facility has been eliminated.

The new building also contains both vocal and instrumental music rooms, including practice and storage areas. The entire music department is located in the same general area, apart from other academic areas, to allow the students and staff to work more closely together.

Driver education facilities have been greatly improved. Now all phases of the program are near each other. The classroom can hold a large group of students comfortably, as opposed to the old room designed for only half that number. New simulators have also been installed.

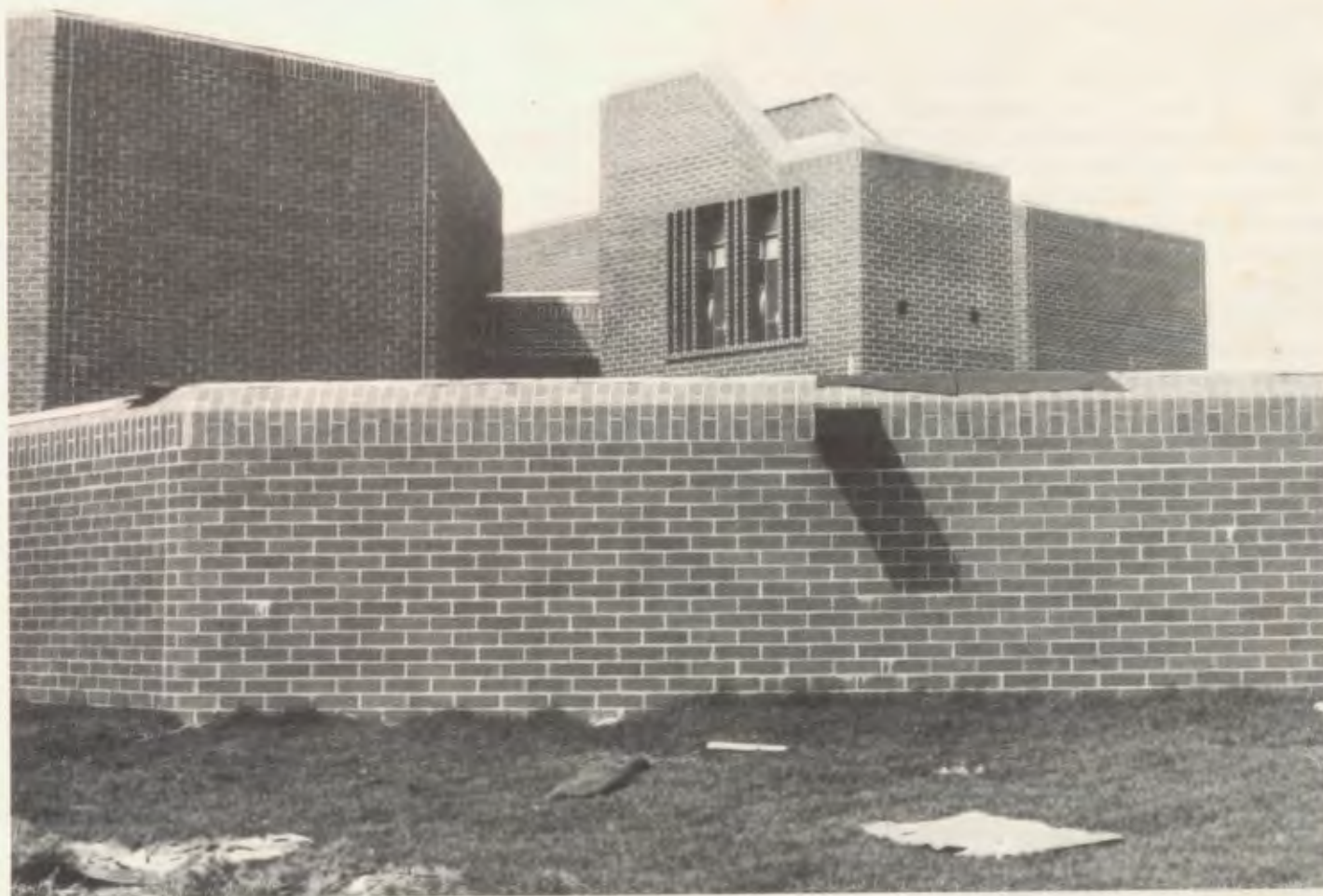

The Year In Review

1978-1979 was a very diversified year. Peace and destruction, shortages and climbing prices will be long remembered.

In the area of world religion, a new era began for the Catholic Church. Predecessor to Pope Paul VI, Pope John Paul I died after a thirty-three day reign. The world's first Polish Pope, former Cardinal Karol Wojtyla, replaced him. Taking the name of Pope John Paul II, he is the youngest pope in 132 years, and the first non-Italian in 455 years.

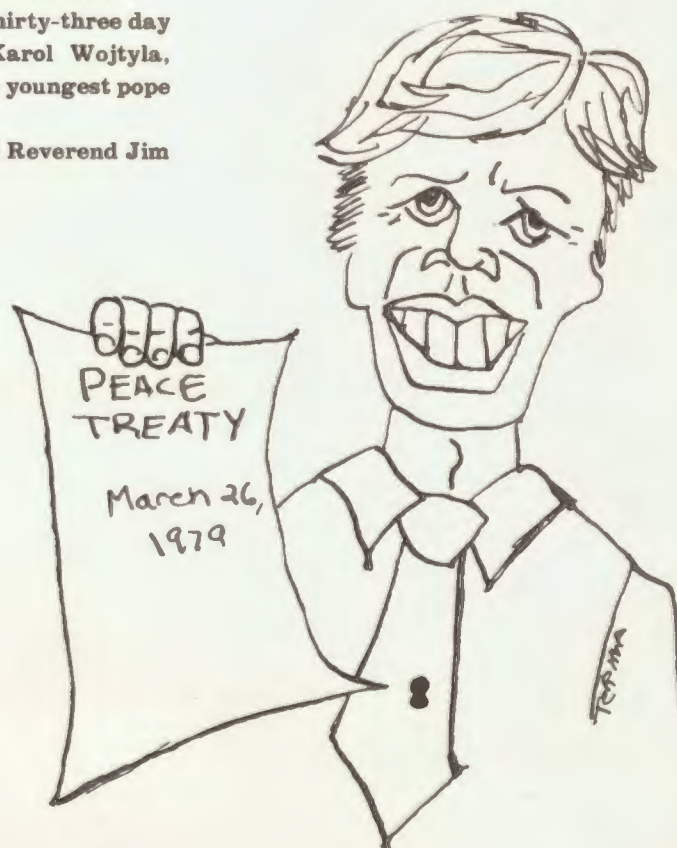
The world was shocked by another religious issue — The Reverend Jim Jones' "Cult of Death." A self-appointed messiah, Jones led a California-based cult, The Peoples Temple, living in Jonestown, Guyana. He attracted hundreds of fanatic followers with a fierce loyalty who worked for his behalf, and he ran regular mass-suicide drills.

These drills soon became a reality when Jones said to his followers, "Everyone has to die." Willingly or by force, the followers drank glasses of Flavour-aide laced with cyanide and then were ordered to lie face down to wait for death. "It is time to die with dignity," Jones remarked from a loudspeaker. He was shot by one of his own followers moments later.

The hundreds of poisoned bodies were shipped back to the United States by American soldiers for identification. A sign in the Jonestown community left a message; "Those who cannot remember the past are condemned to repeat it."

The harsh winter of 1978 will go down in the record books as one of the worst ever. The snow began to fall late in November and didn't ease up until late March. Chicago, the hardest hit area in the Midwest, received a 25-inch snowfall in mid-January which completely shut down the big city.

On the local scene, Ottumwa schools were forced to close down on numerous occasions due to snow-blocked roads and highways. As the snow melted and spring rains began, flooding on the national and local scenes began to plague the low area residents. Soon afterwards, the Midwest enjoyed a very mild spring in anticipation of a long hot summer.



While rioting broke out in Iran as the Shah appointed a leader to a new civilian government, the United States believed events there were beyond our immediate control. President Jimmy Carter, however, in a bold mission to stop the collapse of peace talks, flew to Egypt and Israel to show that the United States has the power to influence world events.

The end result was very far from certain, but at the last minute of his six-day stay, President Carter brought Egypt and Israel to the threshold of peace after 30 years of aggression and four long, bloody wars.

The entire world watched as the peace treaty was signed on the White House grounds, and in a sudden display of emotion Egyptian President Anwar Sadat and Israeli Prime Minister Menachem Begin embraced. It was another big step toward world-wide peace.

The future of world energy has long been a question yet to be faced. Now so is the future of nuclear energy and its industry. A cooling pump on a nuclear reactor broke down at the Three-Mile Island facility near Harrisburg, Pennsylvania in April. The result was a release of radioactive steam for three days over the area. Citizens were warned to stay inside their homes as engineers worked to cool the reactor and prevent a possible meltdown of the reactor.

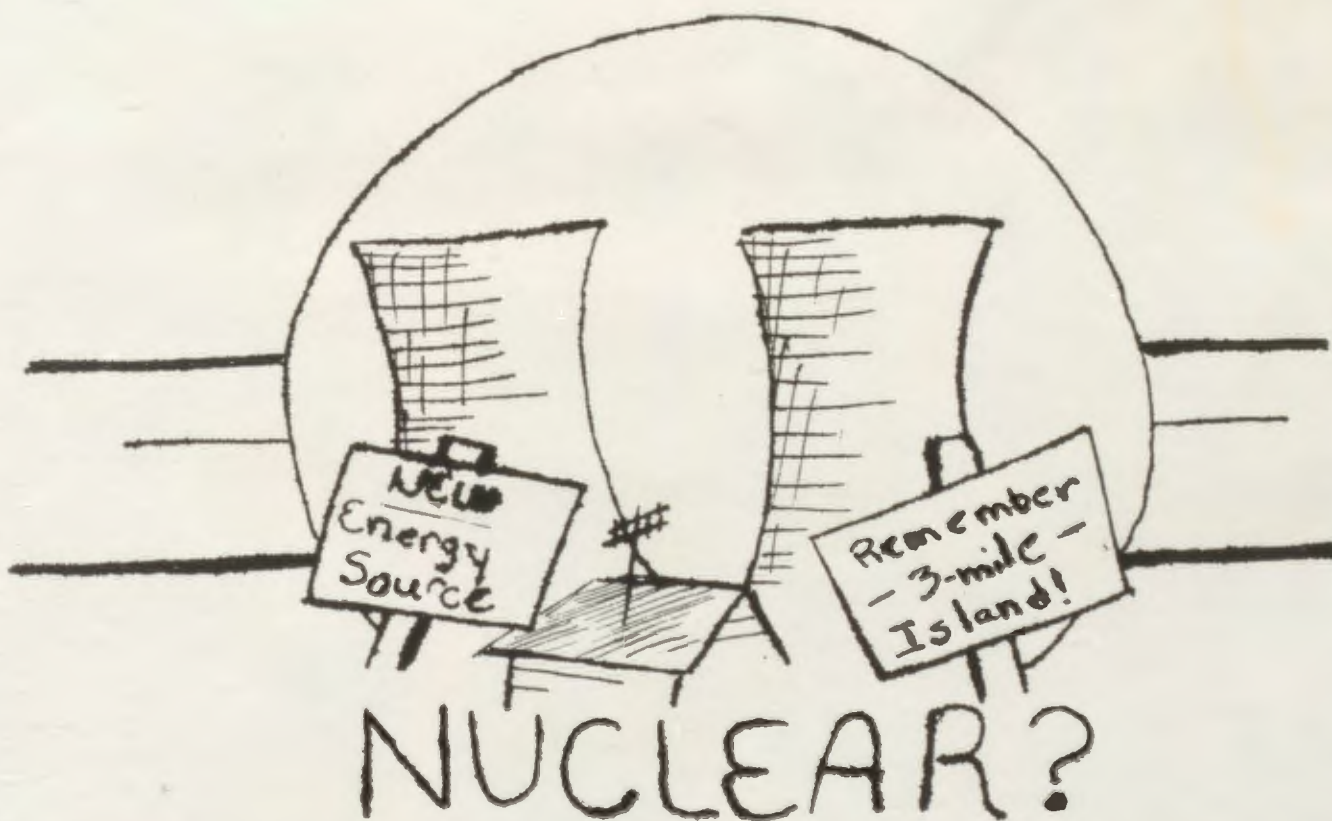
The worst accident in the history of U.S. nuclear power production caused a world-wide protest





against this form of energy. "Stop nuclear power before it stops you" and "No more nukes" were the pleas of over 10,000 protesters that rallied near the White House. The radioactive gases escaping from the Three Mile Island nuclear plant have raised public consciousness about the long-term dangers. The problem is still in question.

Our community has, of course, been affected by these global and national events. The gasoline shortage, inflation, and a winter which seemed to last all year have been problems for all of us. Ottumwa and our state will continue to show concern over world events. The outcome of many 1978-79 happenings is still yet to be seen.

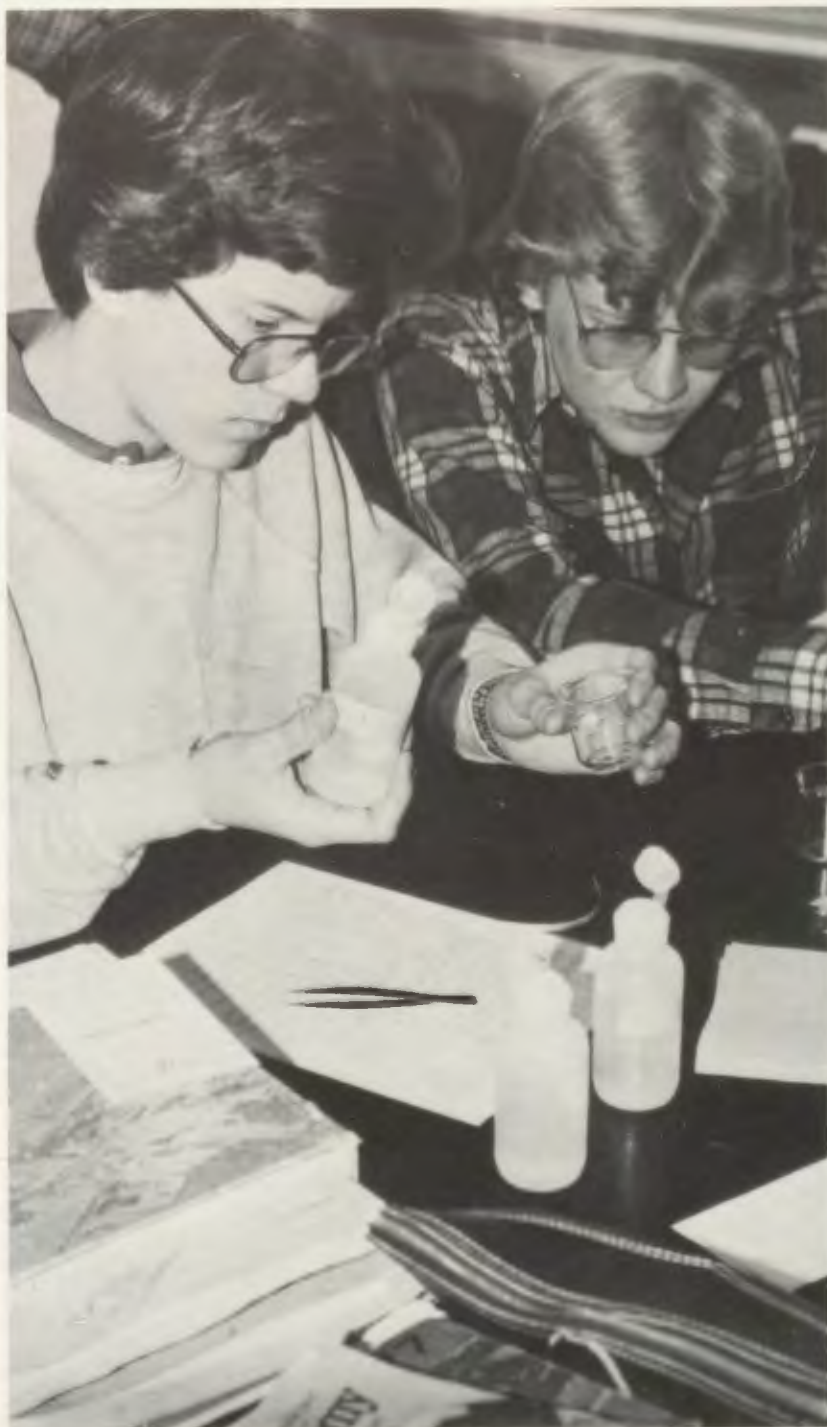

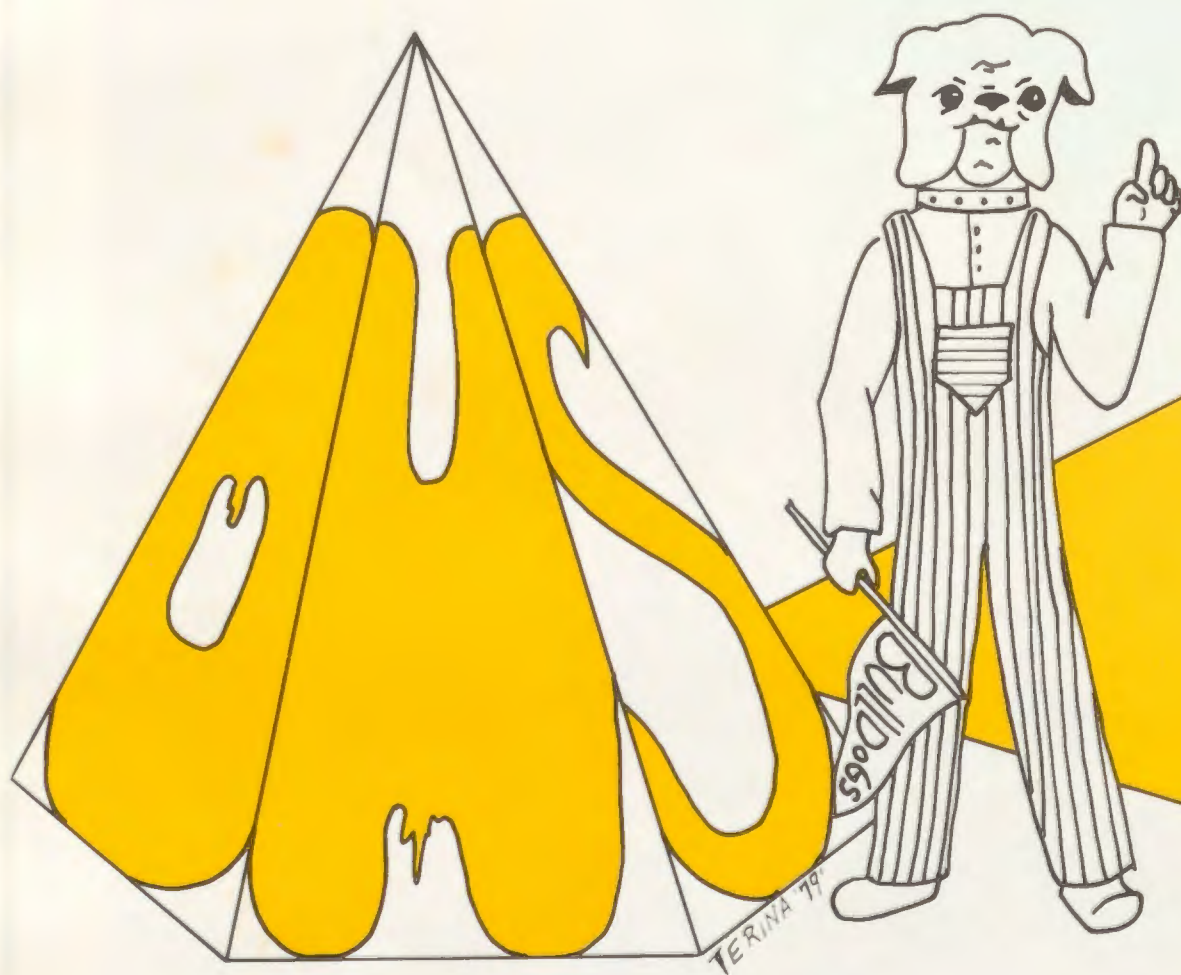

All in all it was a very Wild and Crazy Show.



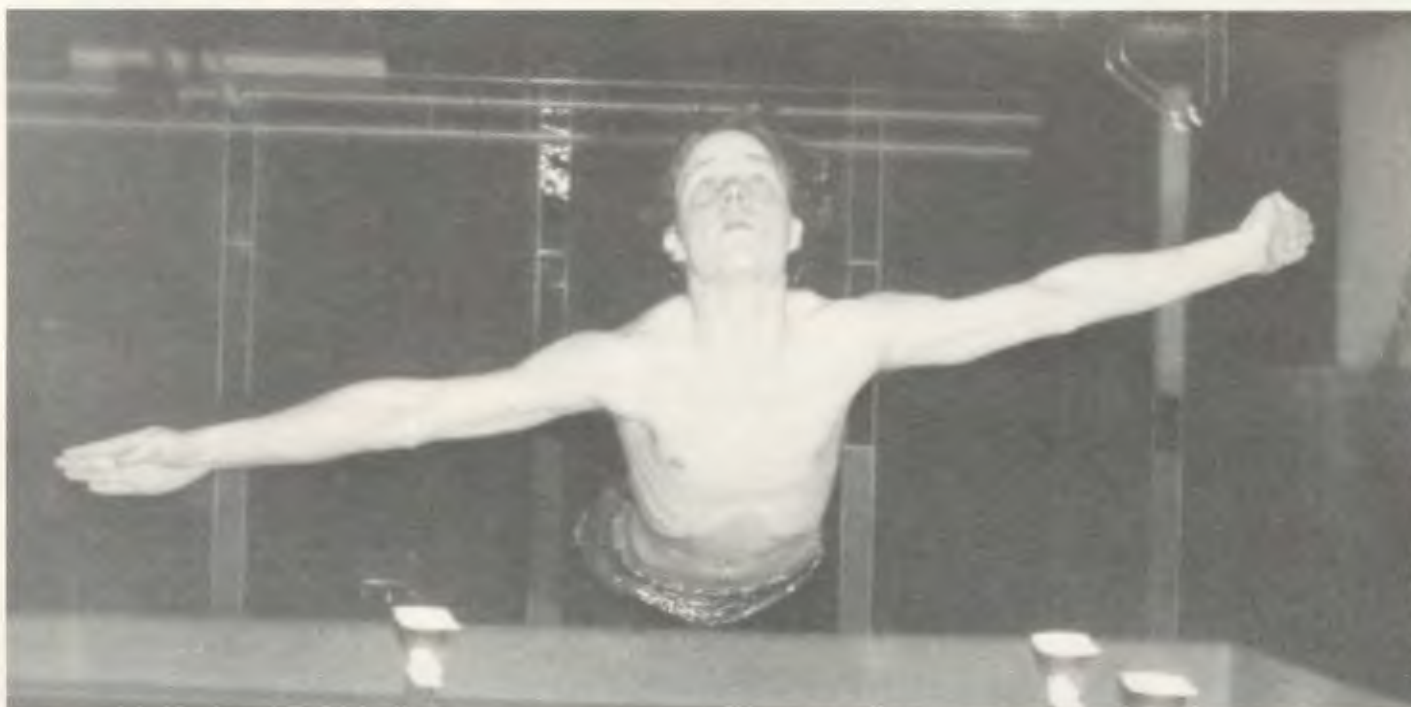

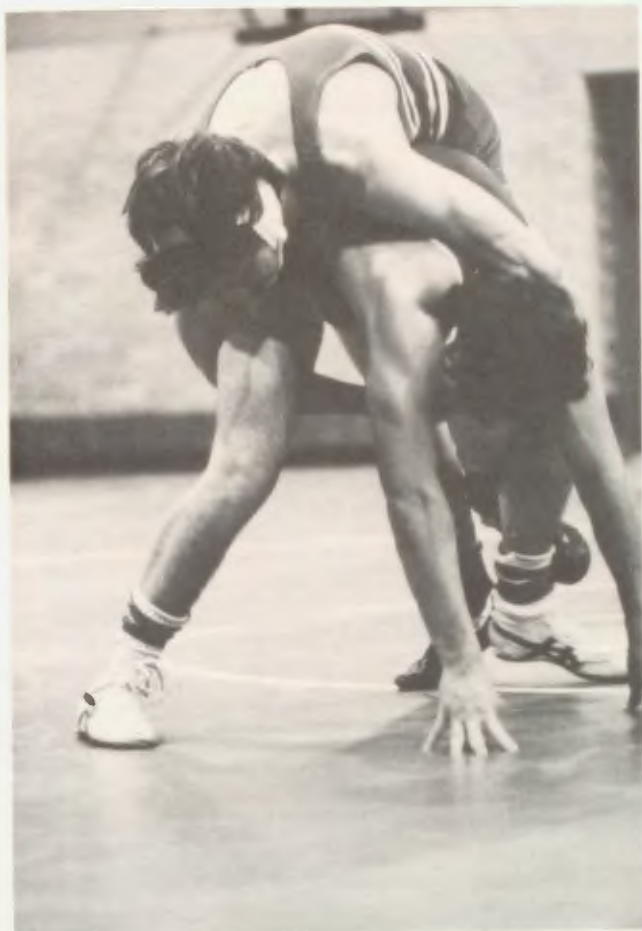

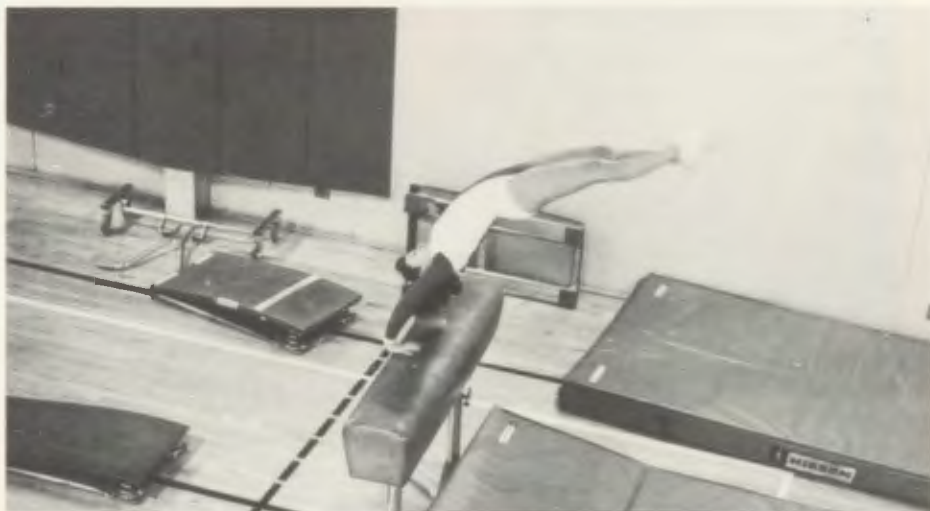

Homecoming: "Pride . . . Big Deal!?!"

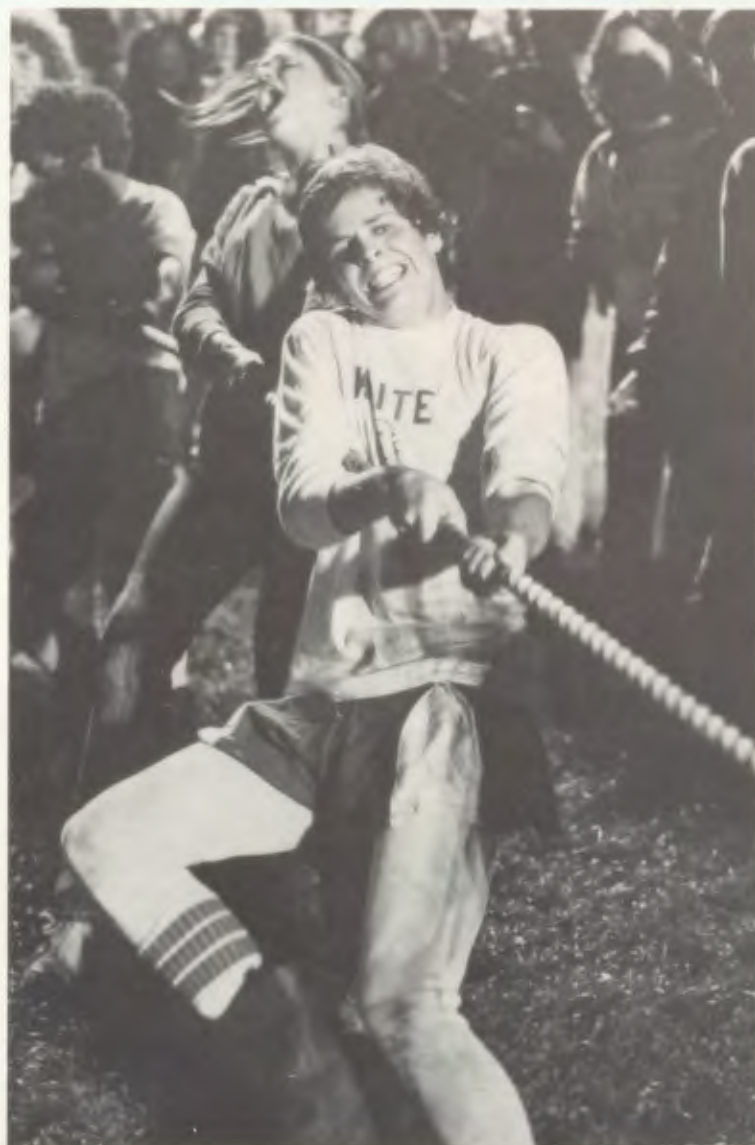

This summer the Rotary Club is sending her on a trip east, including Washington D.C.

Shelley's final comment to Ottumwa and OHS was a simple one: "Tell them I like it here." And we like having her here!

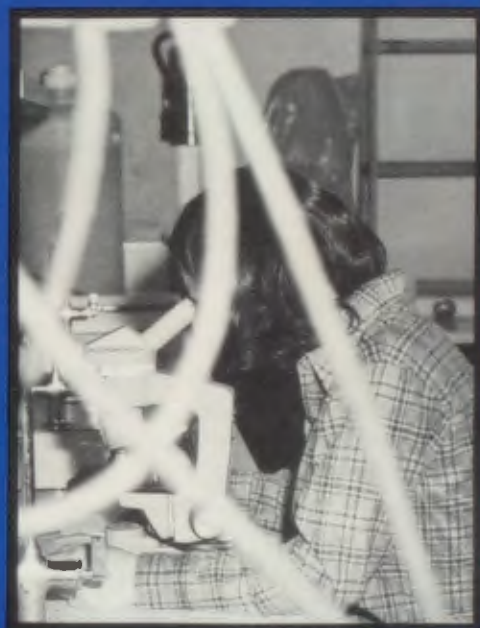
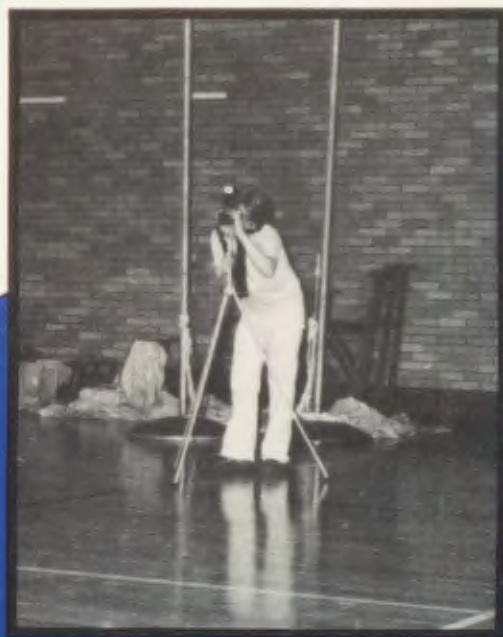

The OHS Speech and Debate Team is a competitive unit with a season that begins in late October and ends in mid-March. Competing with a majority of underclassmen who continued to improve as the year progressed, the 1978-79 season proved to be a very successful one.

The 24 member Debate Team won 26 team awards at major invitational tournaments and at the conclusion of the regular season was again ranked third on the State Debate Poll. This now brings to 12 the number of consecutive years that OHS has been ranked in the top 5 teams in Iowa (1967-79). This outstanding record includes four state titles, three runner-ups and four third place finishes.

In District IHSSA competition, all three OHS teams qualified for the State Tournament. At the National Forensic League Qualifying Tournament the championship teams led OHS to a third place finish. OHS broke two teams to Quarterfinals in the Iowa Forensic League's State Tournament, and the team of Linda Byrne and Mike Brown finished in third place.

Seniors Linda Byrne, Mike Brown and Todd Poole received the Double Distinction Degree from the National Forensic League. Mike Brown was also nominated for the Hugh Seabury Award (an IFL award for excellence in Iowa

debate). Mike also received the Charles Bookin Memorial Award, presented each year to the outstanding OHS Senior debater.

There are many speech events held each year, with competition in the areas of impromptu, extemporaneous speaking, interpretation, humorous and dramatic acting, radio, storytelling, book review, public address and original oratory. Twenty-seven students represented OHS in individual events this season. Members won 19 awards during the invitational part of the season.

At the IHSSA District Individual Events Contest, OHS received 23 "I" ratings from 31 entries, and at the State Contest 21 of these received a Division "I" rating. Nancy Schmidt, Greg Brandt and Luann Troxel were named Outstanding Performers (All-Staters) in their events. Luann was named twice.

Luann Troxel finished second in Original Oratory at the Iowa Forensic League's State Tournament.

Senior Leanne Weaver earned the National Forensic League's Double Degree of Distinction. She also won the team trophy as the Outstanding Speaker. Greg Brandt won the team's Most Improved Speaker trophy and Luann Troxel was named the Outstanding Novice Speaker.
