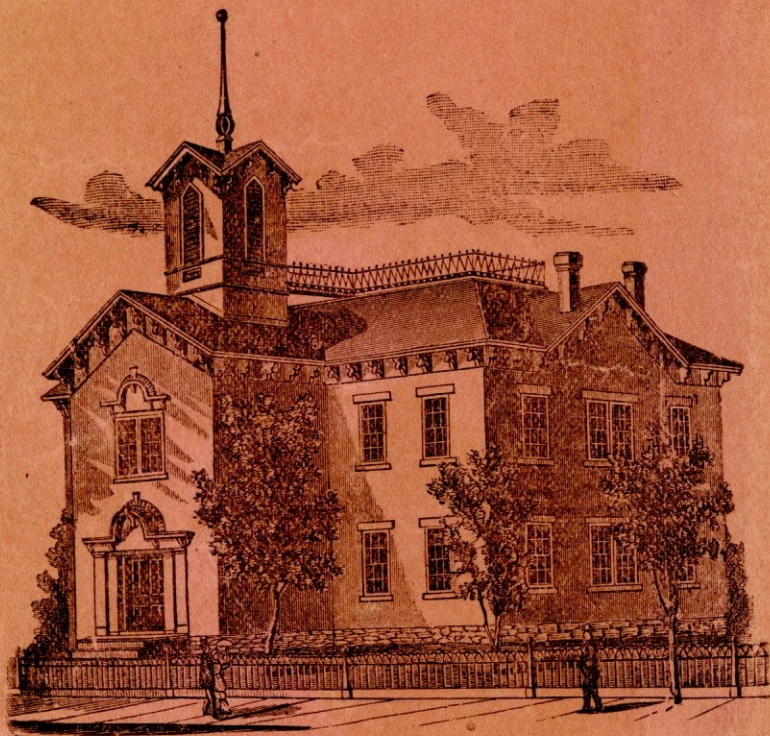

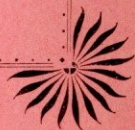

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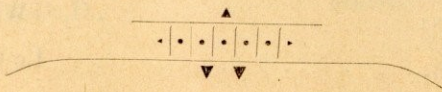

GENERAL INFORMATION.

THE AIM OF THE INSTITUTION.

The main objects sought by this Institution are five:

1. To furnish an English education to a class of students whose early advantages were few, and yet whose age and general development enable them to do work more rapidly than is possible in our graded schools.
2. To prepare young men and women for admission to classical and scientific courses of colleges and universities.
3. To afford a general education and culture to those who desire more than a common school education, and yet are compelled to accept less than a regular course.
4. To furnish thoroughly trained teachers for the public schools of the state.
5. To give all who may come under its influences such an intellectual and moral bias as shall tend to make them well-balanced men and women.

LOCATION AND ACCESS.

Albion Seminary is situated in the northern part of Albion, Marshall County, Iowa, on the Iowa Central Railway, seven miles northwest of Marshalltown. The Iowa Central Railway makes connections with other railroads as follows: With the Chicago & Northwestern, Chicago, St. Paul & Kansas City and I. C. & N. W., at MARSHALLTOWN; with Toledo & Northwestern at GIFFORD; with the Burlington, Cedar Rapids & Northern, at ABBOTT; with the Illinois Central, at ACKLEY; with Dubuque & Dakota Railway and Belmond Branch of Central, at HAMPTON. It will be seen that Albion is centrally located, and easy of access.

The village of Albion is pleasantly situated on high rolling ground, in as healthful a region as can be found in the state.

The town is free from saloons, beer halls, billiard halls, and such demoralizing influences.

The quiet of the place, and the interest the citizens take in educational matters, make it easy for the student to become interested in the school work.

BUILDING AND GROUNDS.

The building is a commodious, two story, brick edifice, containing Recitation Rooms, Library and Reading Rooms, Music

Rooms, Large Hall for Chapel Exercises and public purposes. Repairs and additions are constantly improving the comfort and appearance of the building. The grounds embrace about two acres, laid out and set with shrubbery and shade trees.

The library contains many books valuable for reading and reference, especially Cyclopedias and Historical works. The most of the newspapers within a radius of thirty or forty miles are found each week upon our reading room tables. Also many other valuable papers and periodicals. The library is free to students, and open to them and friends of the school at all proper times, for reference and reading. Donations of good books and magazines will be gratefully received.

A Museum and Cabinet has been started, and is already of sufficient size to be of much help to students in the Natural Sciences. Valuable additions thereto are being made from year to year.

STUDY ROOMS.

Students are expected to study their lessons in their own rooms, but a study room has been provided for those who may wish to spend vacant hours at the building. This room is used for study only.

LITERARY SOCIETY WORKS.

All pupils are expected to do some literary work, such as letter-writing, composition work, declamations, etc. Those who wish to do so can become members of a well-conducted literary society.

PATRONAGE.

This school is under the patronage of the Upper Iowa Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church. This does not give it sectarian bias, but becomes an assurance to patrons of a deep and continuous moral and religious influence, and insures such protection and support as is necessary to secure its continued welfare.

COURSES OF STUDY.

1. **The Seminary Course** is designed to meet the wants and needs of such as desire a knowledge of the languages, sciences, etc., and yet are not able to go through college. We believe it will fit for a high place in society and qualify for active life.

2. **The College Preparatory Course** is designed to qualify for ready entrance to the full classical and scientific courses of our colleges.

3. **The Normal Course** offers those branches of knowledge which best fit for teaching, broaden and deepen thought, and stimulate habits of observation both in doors and out. Classes in Theory and Practice of Teaching and School Supervision, with the best text-books as authorities, will be organized for those taking this course.

Instructions in these classes will be given by lectures supplemented by study of text-books and oral discussion. The aim is to impart not only a knowledge of the subjects taught, but to enable the student to obtain a knowledge of the principles upon which all right teaching is based, thus fitting by thorough *professional* training as well as by technical knowledge for the great work of teaching.

4. **Commercial Course.** The aim of the Commercial Department is to furnish a practical business education. A commodious room has been set apart for this purpose and requisite apparatus procured for carrying on, by a system of exchange, the actual business affairs of life. It is expected that added improvements in facilities will be made during the ensuing year. The course includes Book-keeping—single and double entry, principles of Notes, Drafts, Receipts, Indorsements and the maturing of Mercantile Paper and the transaction of "*Actual Business*." For thoroughness of the work done and the extent to which the work fits for actual Mercantile Exchange, we challenge comparison with other institutions.

5. **A Course in Instrumental Music** embodies the following Piano Studies arranged in three grades:

1st. Selections from the best classic authors will be interspersed throughout the course to form a correct style and taste.

2d. To complete the above course will require at least two years, but pupils will be received at any time, and upon satisfactory examination, will be credited in the course with progress already made.

3d. In addition to the Pupils' Recitals which occur semi-monthly, concerts will be given during the year at which the pupils are expected to assist in furnishing the music.

4th. Classes in Vocal Music will be formed as needed, both in Rudiments and Sight Reading.

5th. For occasional loss of lessons by absence of pupils, no reduction will be made. In cases of protracted illness, however, there will be suitable reduction.

6th. Private lessons will be given in harmony and voice culture at low rates.

7th. Graduates in all courses will receive Diplomas certifying to the careful completion of said courses. They will not be issued to those who do not merit them, as shown by thorough examination and class work.

It will be seen by the above figures that our terms are from \$1.00 to \$5.00 lower, for the same grades of studies, than any other school in the State.

BOARD AND ROOMS.

By the energy and liberality of the trustees and other friends of the school, an attractive Boarding Hall has been built, and has been in successful operation for the past five years. It is situated just across the street, fronting the Seminary. It has the capacity in rooms and at the table for thirty pupils.

Large, pleasant, well-ventilated rooms (provided with good heating stoves), oil for light, and excellent meals are furnished in this hall at the very low price of \$2.25 per week.

Board bills are payable monthly in advance.

For students who go home on Friday afternoon and return Monday forenoon, a reduction will be made of fifty cents per week.

Pupils are expected to supply the other furniture, than stove.

Those who wish Board and Rooms in the hall or in the community, will do well to apply some time before the term commences.

Good board in private families, with rooms, lights and fuel furnished can be easily obtained at from \$2.25 to \$3.00 per week.

Rooms for self-boarding can be rented at from 50 cents to \$1.50 a scholar per month.

With good rooms so cheap and provisions at low prices, or furnished by parent or guardian, the actual money outlay for board need not exceed \$12 per term.

There are no extra fees not mentioned in the catalogue. We can compete with any institution in the State in the amount given for the money.

TEXT BOOKS.

Students should not purchase new books before classification, but should bring their old text-books with them. If not used here, they will be convenient for reference. The following authors have been in use, and can be bought here at about wholesale rates, viz: Robinson's Arithmetic, Wentworth's Algebra and Geometry, Reed & Kellogg's Higher Lessons in English, Swinton's Complete Geography, Houston's Physical Geography, Swinton's Word Analysis, Gage's Natural Philosophy, Hamill's Elocution, Goodyear's Book-keeping, Kellogg's Rhetoric, Packard's Zoology, Young's Civil Government, Anderson's History of the World, Page on Teaching,

Dana's Geology, Gray's Botany, Eclectic U. S. History, Steel's New Physiology, Harkness' Latin Grammar, and Jones' First Lessons in Latin. It is designed to have the best books, the greatest good to pupils, and thus the greatest benefit to the school.

RELIGIOUS CULTURE.

It is the desire and aim of our faculty to foster a healthy religious life and growth among our students. By giving prominence to the Bible and spiritual truth, we aim to teach our students what we deem the most important lesson enjoined by the text, "Seek ye first the Kingdom of God."

DEVOTIONAL EXERCISES.

The work of each day is introduced by suitable religious exercises, upon which all are required to attend, unless excused at the request of guardian.

Students are also expected to attend at least one church service on the Sabbath, and are required to report such attendance at roll-call.

GOVERNMENT.

The government of the Institution is mild, but firm, and designed to be preventive as well as corrective.

Punctual and regular attendance upon all duties of the school and a strict observance of study hours as designated by the Principal, will be required of every student.

A student by entering, becomes subject to the laws of the school, and will be so considered until his connection with the Institution is *formally severed* by graduation or otherwise.

Students not living with parents or guardian, desiring to leave town must obtain permission from the Principal.

The use of Tobacco on the Seminary grounds, the playing of cards, attendance upon balls, dancing parties or circuses, disorderly conduct in or about the buildings, each and all are strictly prohibited.

MERIT AND DEMERIT.

A daily record is kept of the scholarship, attendance and deportment of each student, an abstract of which is read publicly at the close of each term and sent to parents or guardian when requested.

RECITATIONS AND EXAMINATIONS.

Students will not be allowed to take more than four studies unless in review and each student will be required to pass the regular examination of his class before grade is assigned. If any student fails to obtain a grade of seventy per cent. in any study, he is required to pursue the study again or pass, satisfactorily, another examination.

Entrance examinations are conducted on the first day of each term.

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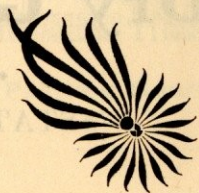
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
