Pine Lake Watershed subject of three county conservation sessions

Fortnight, forward looking, soil and water conservation has many faces. Soil must be protected from wind and water erosion. Land must be properly covered to accomplish these things. In areas where the land is very steep, and the soil thin, grasses and small trees will not suffice. Trees and shrubs are needed and must be planted properly and kept in place. Dams, erosion control structures and terraces of all types play a part in the soil-water-land drama. Rivers, creeks, lakes, reservoirs, swamps and marshes all make contributions to the quality of life we all enjoy so much. We all want abundant food, all the clean water we can use with beautiful natural resources and abundant wildlife. All this has a price and a heavy responsibility. Every American man, woman, and child. Our main responsibility and concern is with Hardin County, however.

During the last year the Hardin County Soil and Water Conservation District held a responsibility meeting with representatives from the local landowners. We called your attention to the need for that meeting and we sincerely solicit your interest and support to address these two significant tasks. The meeting was hosted by the Hardin County Soil and Water District commissioners and included representatives from Franklin and Grundy conservation groups, as well as area water conservation officials.

Present from Hardin County were District Commissioner Lawrence Green and commissioners Carroll Hobson, Martin Broer, and Gary Walters. Grundy County was represented by District Commissioner Jerry Scott and commissioners Ralph Moore, Russell Kauter, and Larry Jorgensen. From Franklin County were District Commissioners Charles Krueger and D.W. Mott. Area Conservationists Dennis Leach and Resource Conservationist Jeff Gierach attended from the Fort Dodge area office of the State Conservation Service. James Reel, who is a watershed specialist, was the featured speaker, coming from the Office of the State Conservationist in Des Moines.

The session was held as a part of Hardin County's Annual Work Plan and sponsored with the goal of ending new erosion control in the Pine Lake Watershed of both Hardin and Grundy counties, according to Hobson. Franklin County representatives were present because of similar problems around Beeds Lake in Hampton.

Lower Pine Lake has many erosion control structures in place and is well protected. Most of this work was done from 1966-88. Upper Pine Lake watershed is another story, Hobson said, and exposed in the watersheds of both Hardin and Grundy counties. Lower Pine's watershed is well known in this area because of the Agricultural Research Service (federal study on the Ray McDowell farm). Hardin's soil conservationists hope to revive the interest and community enthusiasm which accomplished good work in the Lower Pine area, Hobson reports.

Reel advised all people of Hardin and Grundy counties to "close ranks, create a non-profit corporation, raise local money and hope to attract grants." Reel further suggested a possible opportunity to acquire some of a special ACP fund offered through the federal government. He also suggested acquiring funds from the Soil Conservation Fund in Iowa. "All of this is available, provided the farmers and the people here support the project and provided the Pine Lakes Watersheds would qualify," Hobson reports.

Reel was explicit about the cost of dredging once a lake is full of silt. He reported the cost of dredging of 1800 cubic feet of soil provided the conditions are ideal. A close place to put the dredged material is the critical factor in dredging. Reel said moving the soil any distance could easily double the cost of dredging.

He thought the cost of dredging at unprotected (no upland treatment) lake could run into millions of dollars. Upper Pine watershed is located in both Hardin and Grundy counties, with 54 percent located in Hardin and 46 percent in Grundy. Leach and Gierach suggested higher cost fees for which state approval would be needed, and directed community dedication to save the lake.

Reel recommended asking visitors in the park to help along with higher fees. He concluded by saying, "Don't put off the effort. Don't try to do more than one big project at a time. Show small communities can't handle more than one expensive project at a time. Show no-believers some of the lakes in Iowa that are already dredged."

The combined watersheds of both counties comprise approximately 8,000 acres of farmland.

Summary of district activities

Twelve regular, two special meetings, one workshop, and one joint county meeting were held by the Hardin County Soil and Water Conservation District Commissioners. The special meetings were to review applications and request supplemental funding. The workshop was spent developing the 1989 annual work plan.

January - commissioners re-elected the following officers: Chair - Carroll J. Hobson; Vice-chair - Martin L. Broer; Treasurer - Gary D. Walters; Broer, Knutson, Hobson attended commissioners' annual short course in Ames. Requested and received supplemental state cost share funds.

February - District Commissioner met with Farm Bureau board members to explain Food Security Act program. Special sign-up period for Conservation Reserve Program had 14 bids submitted for 310 acres. HEL determinations completed. 60,000 acres of Hardin County land is considered to be highly erodible. Group meetings held in Union, New Providence, Eldora, Oakes, Iowa Falls, Buckeye and Hubbard to explain requirements of 1985 Food Security Act to owners and operators of highly erodible land.

March - Annual report published. Meeting on seeding and management of set aside and CRP acres held. Training meeting for carbohyd and tillage contractors held in Iowa Falls. Watershed training regional meeting.

April - Thaine Hogue began educational presentations on soil conservation to fifth and sixth grades in Hardin County schools. Business sponsors sought for conservation education program.

May - Self-guided tour featuring no-till and ridge till fields.

June - Erosion productivity study sites visited.

July - Received initial allocation for 88,890 acre cost share funds.

August - 7th sign up period for conservation reserve program 28 bids submitted for 935 acres.

September - Walters attended fall regional meeting. Carl Drieke selected as Hardin County winner of Izak Walton League Windbreak Award. Recognized accomplishment of group terrace project.

October - Joint meeting of Grundy, Franklin and Hardin district commissioners held to discuss watershed treatment in Pine Lake watershed. Sponsored fall conservation tour for senior citizens.

November - Hobson and Walters attended annual conference.

December - Annual work plan for 1989 completed.

Implementing your conservation plan

As the planning continues, a number of farmers are also ready to "make their move" in implementing their plans, getting the conservation work started on their land. The conservation compliance rules require that at least one conservation practice must be implemented in 1990. For most farmers, this first step is something such as conservation tillage, maintaining grass waterways, terraces or

What to expect in your conservation planning session

What's Done at the Session:
You sit down with an SCS conservation planner, usually for one to two hours. You discuss what conservation measures you use on your fields that have been designated as highly erodible. SCS records your decisions, and later gives you a conservation plan.

What SCS will provide:
SCS will be scheduling appointments for conservation planning sessions with producers who have highly erodible land. To help you plan for conservation work, you'll receive:

1. Maps of your farm showing where highly erodible land is located.
2. Form CPA-026 listing the tracts and acres of land that are highly erodible and need a plan.
3. A listing of possible conservation treatment alternatives for your land.

What's Expected of Landowners:
As a producer with highly erodible land, you first need to decide whether you intend to continue to receive farm program benefits. It's your responsibility to be sure you have a conservation plan on highly erodible land by December 31, 1989. You need to stay eligible for USDA programs.

You will be expected to:
1. Contact SCS before the planning session if you don't agree with all field boundaries and acreages. This can make a difference on highly erodible land classification.

2. Study the conservation options available to you.

3. Be prepared to make decisions on which conservation options you'll choose to put in your conservation plan. This includes the type of tillage to be used, crop rotations, and any structural conservation practices. You'll also be asked when you plan to begin the conservation work. Both landowner and operator must sign the plan.

Should I Be Concerned?
Producers who have planned with SCS so far have been relieved to find that it's not a complicated process. Most have also found that they don't need major changes in their farming operations.

following a crop rotation. In a number of situations the plans involved no change in the present farming system.

The conservation rules of the 1985 Food Security Act also requires that the entire conservation plan must be fully implemented by December 31, 1994. Even though items contained in the plan may be scheduled for 1994, we strongly encourage that farmers should not wait until the last minute to put the conservation on the land. If you do wait until 1994, you run the risk of not having technical assistance from the soil conservation staff available when you want it. Also, if the plan calls for no-till planting, planning a portion of your farm no-till in '91, '92 and '93 to work out any problems you might encounter rather than waiting until 1994 to plant no-till for the first time on all your HEL acres.

The exception to the 1990 date for planning and 1994 for implementing the plan is in the case where highly erodible land which was not cropped between 1981 and 1985 will be brought into crop production. This is called subsoiling and it requires that conservation plan must be fully implemented before the area is planted to a commodity crop the first year.

The Hardin County Soil and Water Conservation District and the soil conservation staff is available to provide technical assistance in implementing your plan. We can design and layout conservation practices such as terraces, sediment basins, grass waterways, contour lines, contour strip cropping systems and grade stabilization structures. There is no doubt that the tremendous amount of work which needs to be completed before 1995 will place great demands on the soil conservation staff. We strongly recommend making appointments by phone to work with individual staff members in the office. For the remainder of 1989 finishing conservation plans to keep production eligible must be our top priority, with application of conservation practices on the land running a close second place. Please give us notice as far in advance as possible if you need field layout of conservation practices this spring or summer.

To financially assist in the construction of permanent erosion control practices such as terraces, sediment basins or structures there are two sources of cost share funds. The state cost share program provides 50 percent of the cost of construction and material to complete the project. Applications for state cost share money must be made through the soil conservation office in Eldora.

Federal cost share funds may be available through the ASCS office in Iowa Falls for construction programs or as incentive payments for management related conservation practices.

Both state and federal cost share funds are likely to be in short supply with the large amount of work which needs to be completed before 1995 to keep Hardin County farmers in compliance. It would be wise to apply now for cost share money needed for fall terrace projects. There are no guarantees that funds will be available, so think ahead to be sure you can implement your plan on schedule.

Deadline for your conservation plan nears

"Make Your Move Now. Stay Eligible for USDA Programs." is the theme of the new USDA campaign urging farmers who have highly erodible land (HEL) to get started in developing a soil conservation plan. The clock is ticking. You have less than a year to finish developing a conservation plan for HEL fields. The plan must be approved by the Hardin County Soil Conservation District before December 31, 1989, in order to maintain eligibility for USDA farm program benefits.

In Hardin County almost 60,000 acres or 20 percent of the cropland is considered to be highly erodible and will require conservation plans. So far, plans have been developed for approximately 3,000 acres (60 percent of total acres needing conservation plans). At our present rate of planning we will be able to get the job done, provided the continuing operation of local farm owners and operators.

Last year we knew some farmers were backing off because they were afraid the rules for erosion control were too rigid. The final rules do provide more flexibility in reaching acceptable reductions in soil loss. Area farmers are finding that the alternatives presented by SCS personnel are workable. A number of farmers have reached after developing conservation plans that "what was so bad."

1988 Conservation tillage self-guided conservation tour

Last year instead of having a conservation tillage tour on a set day we decided to put signs on the fields so the people could stop and look anytime convenient to them and at any stage of crop growth. Also it gave those that are interested a chance to look again later as the crop progresses and to show the field to others. From the comments we received we think it was a successful way for a conservation tour.

This year we are going to expand on this method and have nine fields with signs marking them instead of the four last year.

The four last year included a field on DAI south of Buckeye operated by Elvorn Hale. It was corn planted ridge till on soybean trees. The other ridge till operation on the self-guided tour was on the Quakerland Farm at New Providence. This was soybeans following corn. Then we have two no-till fields, one on the Gene Roberts farm north of Hubbard. This was corn planted in alfalfa soil. The other was a field on Gary Walters farm planted no-till into soybean stubble. This was in the New Providence area. The fields had no-till yields, however, the yields were comparable to conventional tilled field and on a year like 1988 that was satisfactory, and on a normal year would have saved many tons of valuable soil.

This year there will be maps available by printing them in the county papers and at the soil conservation office. Hopefully, 1989 will be a better year for the

Soil and water conservation in Hardin County Schools

A goal of 365 Hardin County students were given instruction in the spring of 1988 on the basis of soil and water conservation. Instruction for the classes was Thaine Hogue, Iowa Falls, retired district conservationist.

Farm tours of ponds, terraces, and conservation tillage were held for some of the students. The Calkins Campus farm near Iowa Falls was visited by some students also.

Soil erosion demonstration basins with sodded soil and unprotected soil were used by Hogue to show the differences in runoff due to water striking the soil during rainfall. Soil profile cores were also used to demonstrate soil types and the fragile layer of topsoil that exists on most soils of Hardin County.

Many businesses in Hardin County were contacted by the commissioners of the Hardin County Soil and Water Conservation District to support these education efforts. The commissioners, staff, and students are grateful for their contributions. Without private donations this program could not continue. Any individual or business may contribute to this educational program.

Conservation bus tour held for senior citizens

The Hardin County Soil and Water Conservation District sponsored a bus tour for senior citizens on October 26, 1988. Seventeen people, including District Commissioner Lawrence Green, commissioners Caleb Knutson, Martin Broer and Gary Walters, left Dorsey's Senior Center at 1:30 p.m. for the five stops of the tour.

The Stanley Granger farm was the first stop where a newly constructed waterway swamped with rye and broom grass was observed. Explained were the benefits of the graded waterway which included erosion control and habitat for wildlife. The swamped waterway and sodded provision of the 1985 farm bill were discussed.

At the second stop the conservation reserve program was observed on the Dick Terveer farm. The ten year program featuring grass planting and optional tree planting were discussed as well as the sign up and bidding process.

Conservation tillage was observed and explained at the third stop of the tour. A field in Tipton Township was being tilled with a color chisel leaving an abundant stubble much of cornstalks on the surface of the tilled soil.

The beautiful and functional Carl Drieke farm waterway was next viewed on the tour. The waterway consisted of two rows of homegrown and two rows of evergreen plantings. Cost share for waterway through ASCS was explained.

Terrace construction, tile lines and outlet pipes were observed at the final stop on the Dunn Estate Farm where tenant is Duane Klosterman. These conservation practices were explained as being part of this farm's plan for compliance to the Food Security Act of 1985.
