June 10: 10:00 a. m. Annual Tree Day. Seniors give advice to under classmen and dedicate the 1919 tree.

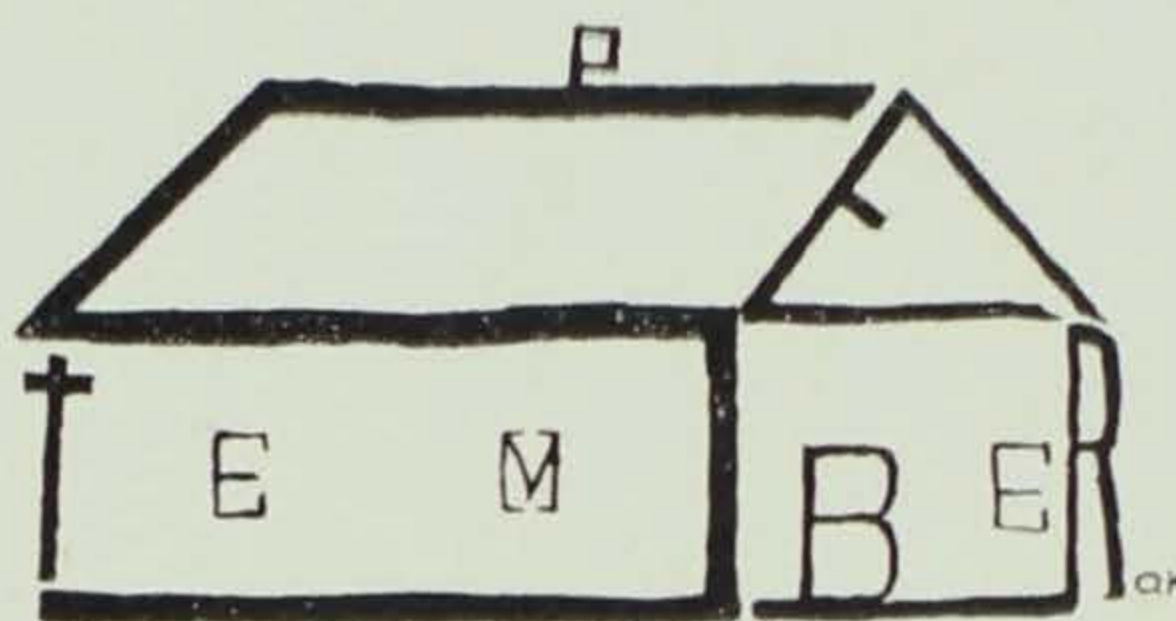
