Two of last year's men were back, and with many promising freshmen out, it looked as if Buena Vista could atone for its football season by some accomplishments on the hardwoods. Coach North understands basketball and gave his team several plays which are being used to good advantage by many of the winning college teams this year, but which never seemed to function effectively in a game. One unusual phenomenon this year was the showing the Beavers made against the strongest teams on their schedule. They played their best when the odds were greatest against them.

With a taste of the victories of past years still lingering, the defeats this year were harder than they would have been under different circumstances.

Coach North has received more criticism this year, than any other man in the history of the college. After the football season fans were so eager to criticise that he did not have a chance to show what he could do in basketball. And with the whole college and the town of Storm Lake waiting only for a chance to razz, it would be a rather unpleasant position from which to accomplish anything.

Coach North has had a hard row to hoe, and he has done it himself in a way that to any fair minded person will unconsciously bring forth a sense of real respect for a man. He never expected the least bit of sympathy, and never whined about the treatment he received. Buena Vista College as a whole will do well to remember these little things, they are themselves indications of something worth while in any individual.

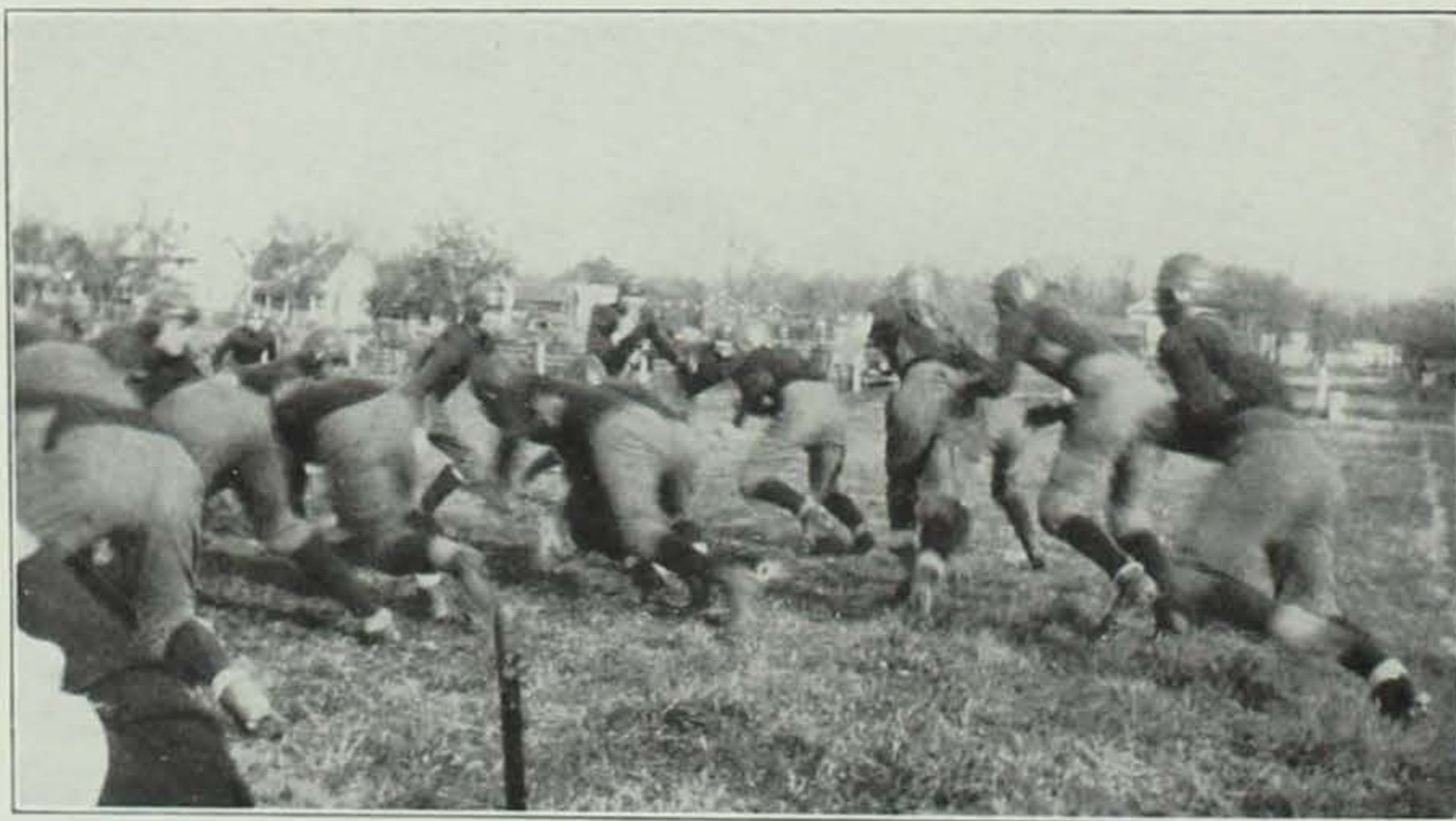


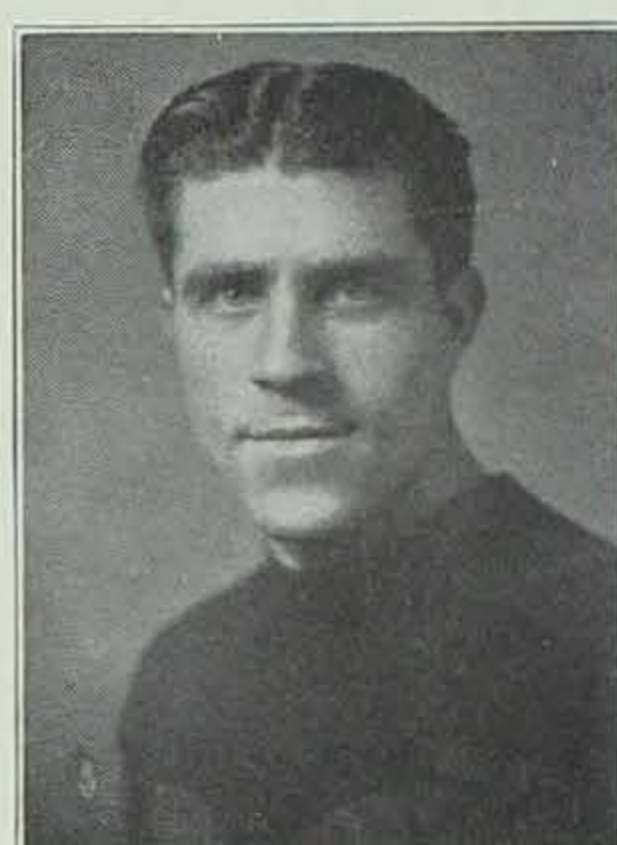
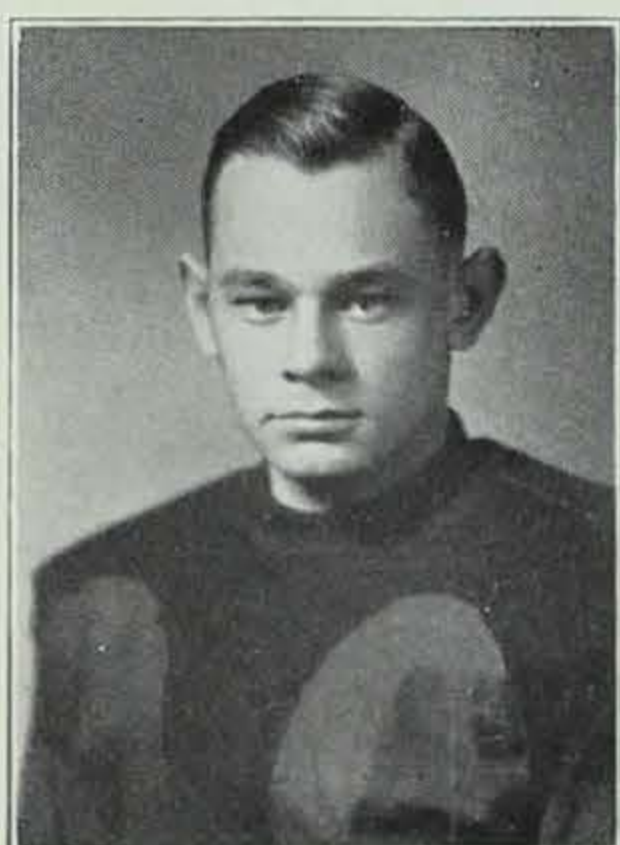
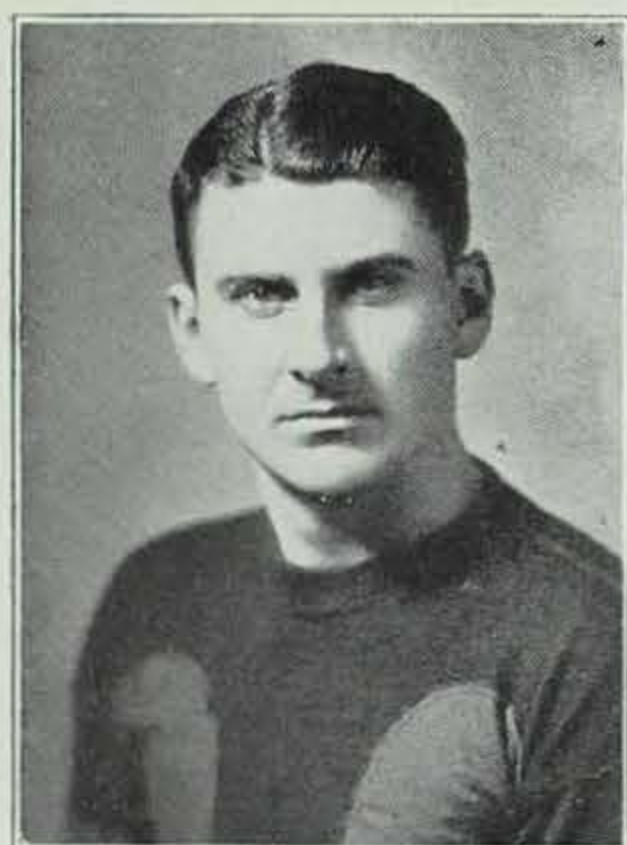
FOOTBALL

Edwards was always on the bottom of the pile at guard, when a play came his way. He has one more year left and has a good opportunity to make a name for himself.



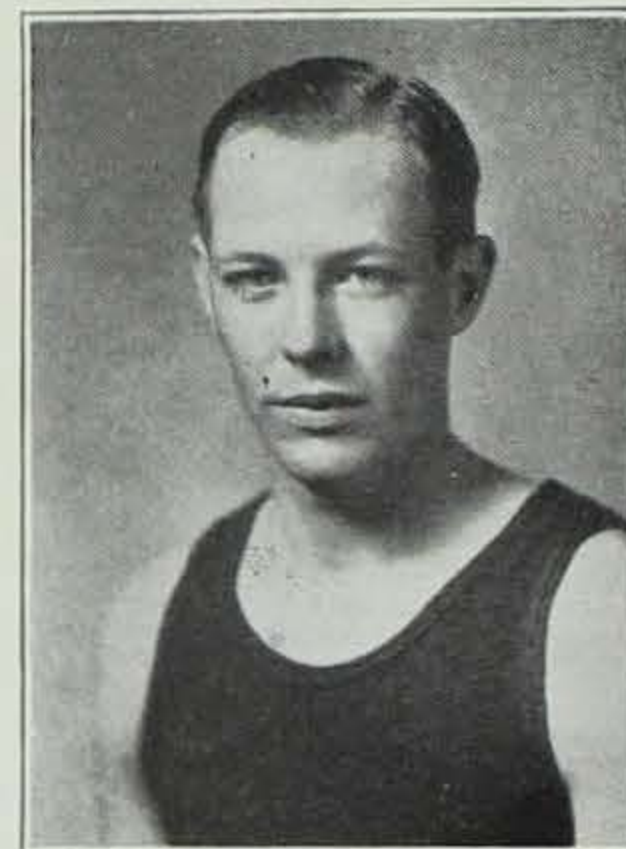
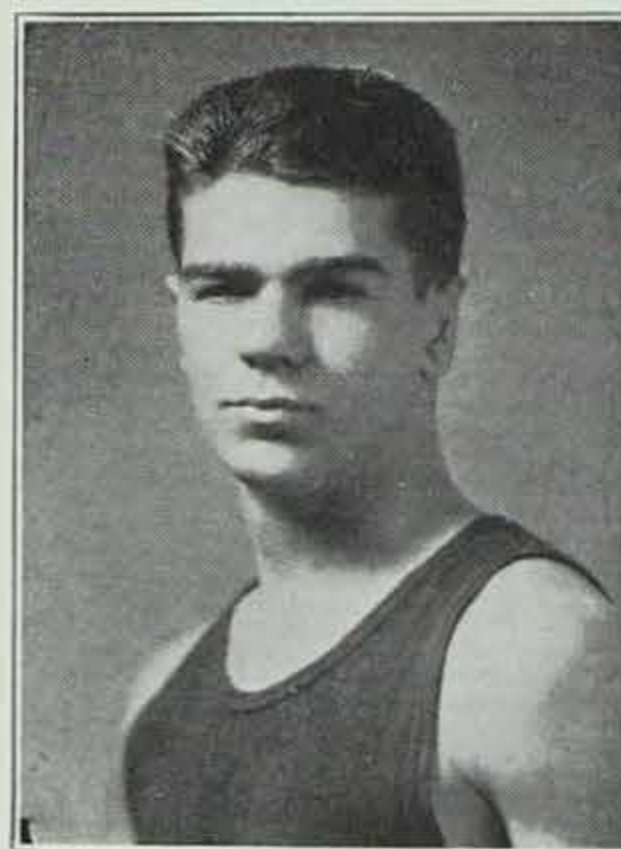
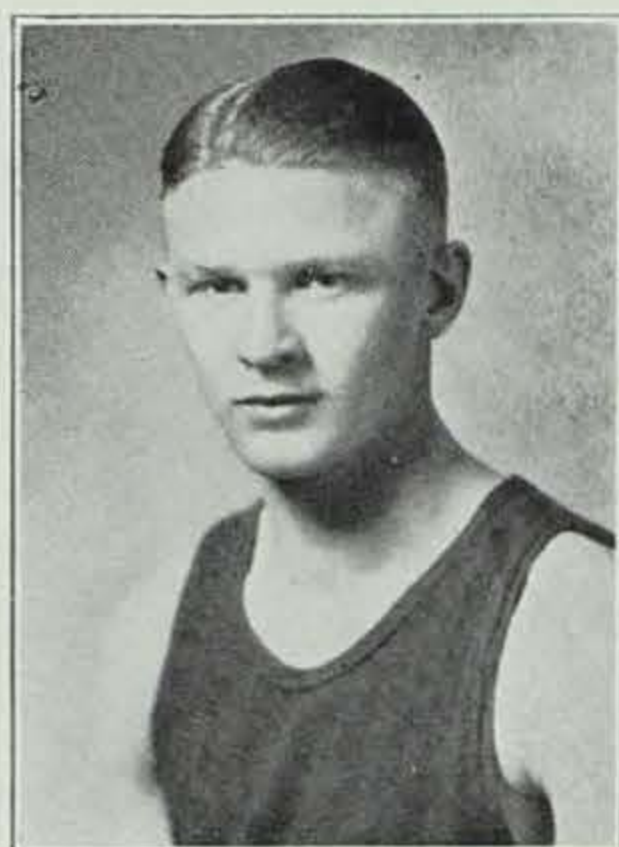


BASKETBALL

Interest in debate has grown until this year Buena Vista has had a record of which we may well be proud.

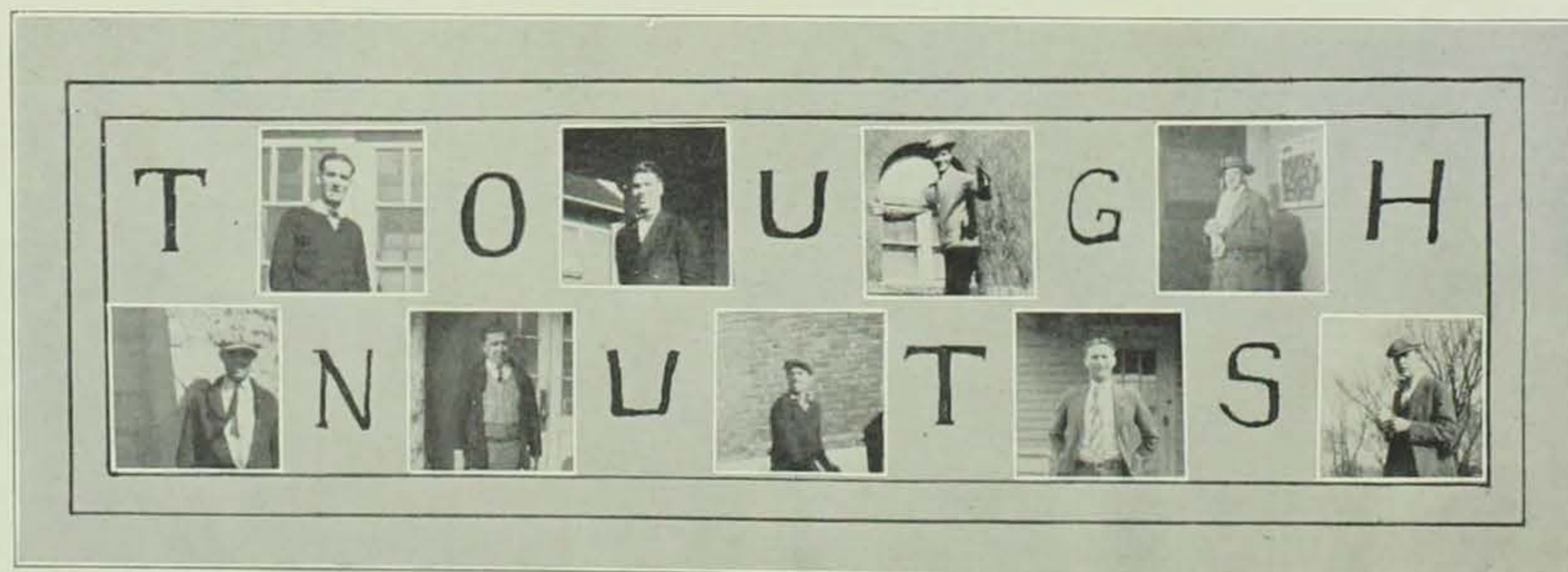
