

JESUP — **Janeen Ann Seehase**, 47, of 11525 Dubuque Road, died Saturday, Jan. 29, near her home in rural Jesup of exposure.

She was born Feb. 19, 1946, in Waterloo, daughter of Paul and Jo Mensch Brasch. She married Richard R. Seehase on April 6, 1968, in Waterloo.

Mrs. Seehase had been employed part time since 1991 at the Jesup Library and was a member of the Black Hawk County Soil and Water Conservation Commission for eight years, currently serving as chairwoman. She was a 1968 graduate of Iowa State University. In 1989 she was awarded the alumni Key Award by Iowa State Alumni of Black Hawk County.

She was a former textile instructor at Hawkeye Institute of Technology, and had served as chairwoman for both the Black Hawk County Women's Farm Bureau and the Black Hawk County Extension Family Living Committee.

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Jesup woman's death ruled accidental

The death of a Jesup woman found near her home Feb. 1 has been ruled accidental.

Janeen Seehase, 47, died from exposure to the cold, said Black Hawk County Medical Examiner Dr. Albert Dolan. The results of an autopsy released Tuesday indicate that Seehase died between 8 p.m. and 9 p.m. on Friday, Jan. 28.

There was no evidence of foul play, Dolan said.

Seehase was found by a neighbor

the morning of Feb. 1, just a quarter mile from her farm house. She had been missing since Friday evening after she left a basketball game at Jesup High School.

Temperatures that night ranged from 15 to 20 degrees, according to the National Weather Service.

Dolan said Seehase was wearing a light jacket when she died. That would not have been much guard against wind chills in the single digits, he said.
