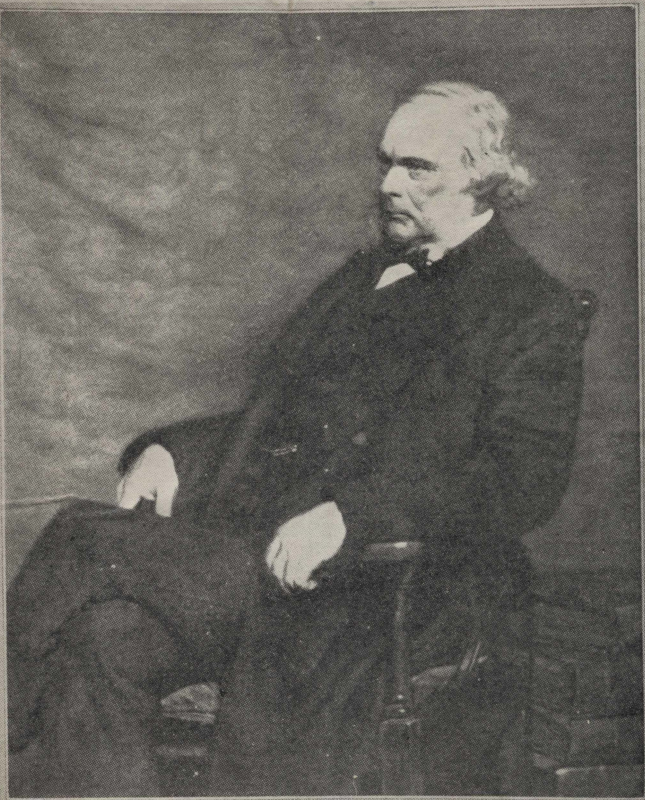

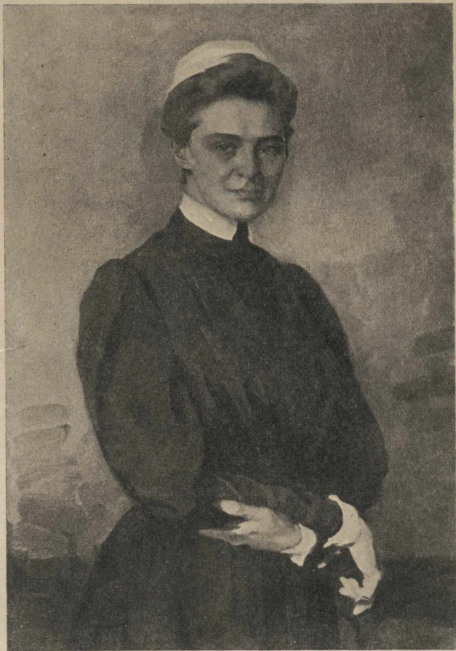


Fig. 50.—Miss M. Adelaide Nutting. (From a painting by Cecelia Beaux.)

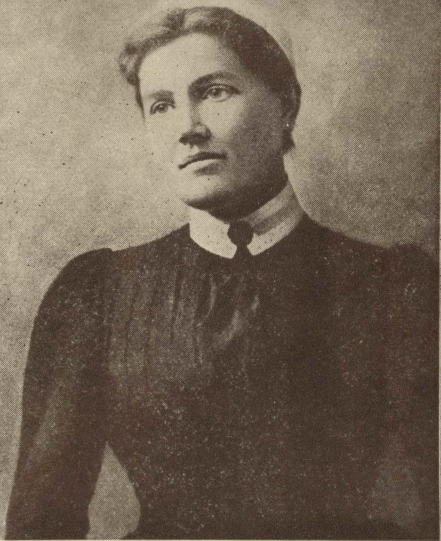

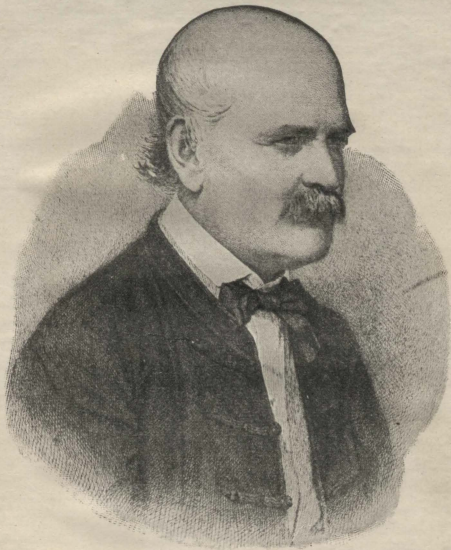


Fig. 36.—Ignaz Philipp Semmelweis, the discoverer of the cause, and the inventor of the means for the prevention, of childbed fever, or puerperal infection.

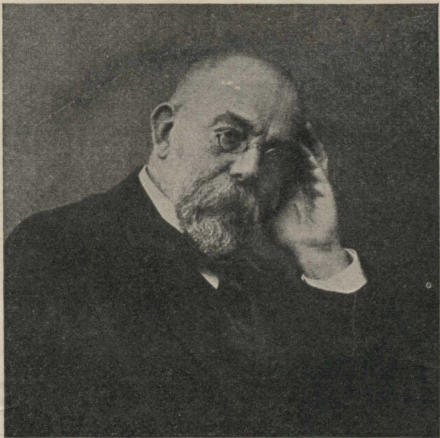


Fig. 38.—Dr. Robert Koch (1843–1910). (Courtesy of Captain Henry J. Nichols, U. S. Army.)

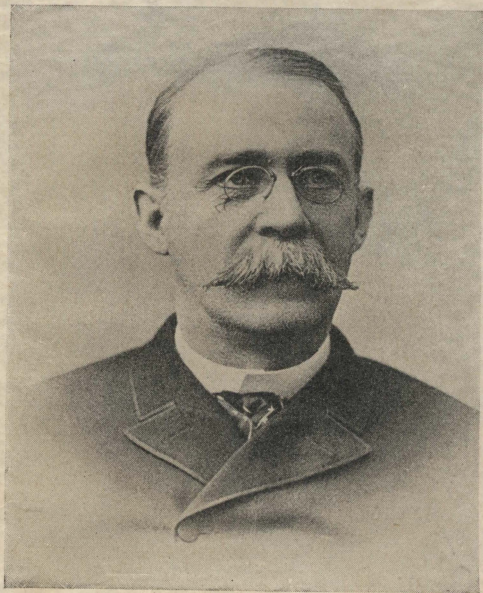


Fig. 48.—Dr. Edward Cowles. Founder of the first training-school for nurses in a hospital for the insane.

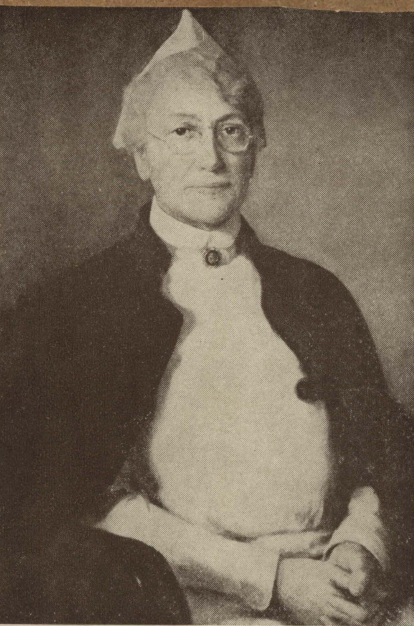
Fig. 45.—Miss Mary L. Beard of Boston.
