MEET THE COMPILER



Allow me to introduce myself, I am Avis Wehrman Schlintz, daughter of the late Louis and Lula Tessen Wehrman. I had a pleasant childhood living on a farm and attending an 8 grade school. My father had a small farm and when my older brothers went out on their own, my sister and I lent a hand with the farm work. I have always loved to write, even when a child I saved every scrap of paper to write on. I became interested in genealogy when I assisted Dr. (Erwin) Hoffman, an Accredited Genealogist, with the Schlintz family history. I then set out, on my own, to do the Wehrmann Genealogy and have been working at it for six years. However, several years ago, I did put it aside and compiled and published the Grupe Genealogy, at the request of relatives. It is the history of the family of my Grandmother Fredericke Grupe Wehrmann. The Wehrmann Book was further delayed by health problems of my own and the declining health and subsequent loss of my beloved husband. My daughter Bonnie (Boni) Novotny has been a great help to me in the publication of this book.

We lost our oldest daughter, Judy Lee, when she was not quite sixteen, in an auto accident. I feel fortunate to have a devoted daughter, a son-in-law who is very good to me and my grandchildren, Stephanie and Billy, aged 2 and 4 years — they keep life interesting.

My mother passed away in August, 1980 at 92, my father, 95, followed in February, 1981. I have two brothers and two sisters and we have a good relationship, all live within short distances.

I own my own home in a rural community, have a large yard that I could not manage without the help of willing relatives. I was employed in the office of Center Valley Cooperative for 21 years, retiring in 1978 because of allergy and loss of hearing. I have a severe hearing loss but now wear a hearing aid.

Forward

In the completion of the Wehrmann (Wehrman, Wearman, Werman, Vehrman) Genealogy, families bearing this name have also been included whose relationship has not been established, either directly or positively. Many of them first came to Sheboygan County, Wisconsin following our direct ancestors who came in 1847. It is said that Wehrmann was a common name, especially in Lippe Detmold, in the mid- and late-1800's. It is possible that the Wehrmanns who migrated from Hanover followed a group, including the Grupe family and settled in the Cleveland, Wisconsin area — not very many miles from Town Hermann, the home of our ancestors.

The format on each page gives the complete background as page headings, listing succeeding generations in chronological order. For further identification, individual members are assigned on a digital basis. The first digit of each number designates the first generation, the second digit — the second generation, and so on. Related families have an additional letter or letters preceding each individual's number to identify the family. A raised digit to the first or second power indicates a first or second marriage of that generation. When numbering family members, after the count of 9, a letter such as X, Y, Z are used in place of a 10 etc.

Spelling

You will notice often that there is a difference in the way a name is spelled. This is due to variation in the records as written by individual pastors. As an example, you may find that the name Frederick sometimes written as Frederich or in rare cases as Dietrich. Catherine may be spelled Katherine, Catrinka, Treneke, or Caterina. The name Johann often appears as Hans.

The same will be true of names of villages, such as, Tevenhausen, Tefenhausen or even Tevenholzhausen. We will print them as recorded. You will note that at about the 7th generation, most families dropped one "n". Others retained it and we spell it as the family was accustomed to spelling it.

Errors

This record may contain errors — some copied, some made, some through translation. We ask that you bear with us and we encourage you to inform us of errors at once, that you wish corrected.

This book is produced in looseleaf form to enable you to add pages as new members are born or as others pass on and leave the family circle, keeping a living documentation of this family history.

I will present a finished book to the Wisconsin State Genealogical Society, where it will be placed in their extensive reference library to be studied by future generation, if they so desire.

Some members have failed to respond, some responded but didn't provide photos. I do my best with the material that I have to work with.

Pictures

All photos in this book have been painstakingly reproduced by an experienced printer. In fact, he makes copies until he finds how it looks best. In some cases, due to the film on which the originals were taken, he cannot control light or dark in a photo. Thus you may find that a photo is sometimes on the dark side or not as you expected it to look. This is in no way the fault of the printer.

INDEX OF NAMES

Some names, such as parents of persons marrying into the family are not indexed even though they are mentioned, because they have no direct relationship to the family.

The practice of giving multiple names and the somewhat inconsistent usage thereafter, the changing of names through marriage cause an indexing problem. We have indexed them in the most complete form possible and may differ from the form used by others.

To avoid confusion, different ways of spelling last names are listed together (such as Wehrmann-Wehrman). At times, persons have been known by nicknames so wherever the given name was found, it has been printed and the nickname listed in parenthesis behind the name but not used as a part of the alphabetizing. In the case of using other than the first name, it is enclosed by quotation marks.

There are occurrences of names of distantly related persons being identical. In such cases, page numbers are all listed together under their common name.

In order to use this index it is necessary to understand the symbols used. For example:

1. If Eleanor Elizabeth Campbell married Charles Hepfinger, she would be indexed under: Campbell, Eleanor Elizabeth / Hepfinger
and under: Hepfinger, Eleanor Elizabeth (Campbell)
2. If she married, secondly, Merrill Penny, she would be indexed under:
Campbell, Eleanor Elizabeth / Hepfinger Penny
and under: Hepfinger, Eleanor Elizabeth (Campbell) / Penny
and again under: Penny, Eleanor Elizabeth (Campbell) Hepfinger

All pages for her would be listed under the underlined last married name, Penny. When checking a maiden name, refer to the married name underlined, for page numbers — unless the person remained unmarried or the married name was unknown.

INTRODUCTION

It is regretable that most of us do not take an interest in our "roots" until late in our lives—after those who could have told us, in detail, have passed on. I remember the hours spent with Grandfather Simon Wehrmann who could have told me so much, if only I had asked, rather than working so hard now to find the facts. Strangely, he did not speak of this ancestors, possibly because so often the young are not interested, or perhaps because the German people were too unpopular during WWI.

I recall that he wrote and received beautifully-written German letters from Germany. After this research, I realize that he must have kept up a correspondence with two cousins who remained in Germany. I questioned my own aging father and he told me that his father never did discuss these matters with his children. I am glad, therefore, that through my efforts my father and his remaining brother and sisters have learned more about their ancestors. It is a worthy heritage that has been passed down to us—their descendants.

Our search has reached as far back in the past as possible—to the first entries made in the records of the German Reformed Church in Langenholzhausen, Lippe-Detmold, Germany. The first entries were made in the year 1684. We may have been able to go back for another generation but records were poorly written, pages showed deterioration and penmanship was poor.

In listing first baptisms, often the record listed a "daughter" or a "son"—listing no name—with the father's name only. Most men had three or four given names and one never knew which one that they used, without extensive search and comparison in records for similarities in the use of names. Brothers sometimes had the same first names and used their second or third to avoid confusion.

A researcher at Salt Lake City interpreted the data in the very early records. I studied microfilm of the church records and obtained quite a lot for myself. By courtesy of a friend and genealogist, Dr. Erwin Hoffman, a German researcher by the name of Helmut Strahlau, of Bad Sulzuflen (about 25 kilometers from Langenholzhausen), checked the records of my great-grandfather's family in that old church register. In this way, I found that two family members remained in Germany and secured records in those families in 1972.

My first letter of inquiry, mailed to Horstmar (the address was incorrect and was transferred to several possible addresses) was surprisingly returned to me as an unclaimed letter. All for 21 cents worth of postage!

In 1976, a friend checked addresses in the city of Bonn for the name Schafmeister, my grandfather's cousin's married name. She did find an Elmer Schaffmeister and although it was spelled differently, I decided to write a letter. Several months went by and in March of 1977 I did receive a reply. The letter had been passed from family to family until it reached the right destination.

Otto Schafmeister asked his mother, who was visiting in his home in Böchum, near Heidelberg, to write a letter in return. Irmgaard Schafmeister, widow to the son of Mathilda Wehrmann, did write to me and helped me to contact the widow of her husband's brother. So I received complete family records. Irmgaard and I have corresponded since then.

My plans to visit these people in 1978 were cancelled because of family obligations. But, hopefully, someday we may be able to establish a reunion that was never possible in the lives of our ancestors.

Letters found in my grandfather's effects, after his death, were give to me by an aunt and translation proved that they were written to Karl Wehrmann, in America, from his brother, who remained in Germany. These letters, written in 1865 and 1866, contained a wealth of information concerning brothers and sisters and much more.

The farm purchased and cleared in 1850 by my great-grandfather is now owned by a member of the 4th generation in America. A State Century Farm Certificate was awarded to Arno Wehrmann in 1950. The farm is now owned by his son, another Frederick

Karl, great-grandson of the first.

As a member of the Wisconsin State Genealogical Society, I am the proud possessor of an Honor Certificate awarded for being a direct descendant of an ancestor who purchased land in 1850—that farm remaining in possession of his descendants to this date (128 years at this time).

In conclusion, I am happy to say that in my search for data, I have gained precious friends—both those distantly related and those not proved to be related. I can say in truth and with a heart filled with gratitude that I have been richly rewarded for my labor.

"WHAT'S IN A NAME?"

The name of Wehrmann was a common name in the Principality of Lippe. Professor Joseph Karlmann, stone cutter, writes in his large Ethymological Dictionary of German Families, which he published in Lunberg on the Lahn River 1857-1965, about the origin of the name, Wehrmann. (This is the English translation of the book title, which in German is called Etymologisches Woerterbuch der Deutschen Familienamen.)

"In the Central and throughout the North German Localities, those individuals with this name, who were called into or attached to the (named) Activities of the Militia which was established for the defense or protection of the Country or Specific areas."

Therefore we get the impression that the name means a defender, a military man. Yet he goes on to say, "The study of the name reveals that, never over the years were requests received regarding the name of parents of soldiers with the name Wehrmann and rarely for the Middle High German Wehrman (Waehrmann) or Buerger Gewalhrmann."

Thus he suggests that in some cases, the name of Wehrmann could be a variation for the name "Werner".

Various German Pastors, in entries in church books, spelled it as Weerman, Varmann, Wermann. In one incident a death was simply recorded as the "old Wehrman-ische", the "ische" being the genetive.

An old Wehrmann from Germany wrote that there are vary few Wehrmanns in that country today. Many migrated to America and numerous families lost several sons in war.

I have found several Wehrmann families who originated from Hanover which actually bordered Lippe. When we consider that the size of Germany was and is not much larger than the state of Wisconsin, towns were not too widely scattered that indicate origins of various Wehrmann families. It would seem that the largest percentage came from Lippe.

The House of Halbert suggests that the name appears to be associated with the Germans, meaning "one who is honest and truthloving". Although the Institutes of Heraldry will not guarantee that they have found the official family Coat of Arms, both Halbart and Samson show copies that are nearly identical. The only difference is that Samson sketches a mine exploding behind a stone wall, while Halbert shows the two crenalated towers of a castle wall with mine exploding. Both show a side-facing helmet with grill work closed which is said to denote a peer associated with or serving persons of noble blood.

Surnames were not used until between the 11th and 12th Century. By 1490 a recognized surname was passed on to others in a family. In the year 1095, under the direction of Pope Urban II, the need for identifying symbols was recognized and these took the form of a Coat of Arms. This was during the time of the Crusades and the shape of the shield indicates that its function was to ward off arrows.

Family mottos was believed to have originated as battle cries in medeival times but a motto is not recorded with the Wehrmann Coat of Arms. A description of the Coat of Arms in the unique language of old artists found in the Rietstap Armorial Generalis translated, briefly as follows:

- Per fess: The horizontal lines dividing the shield into fess (fields).
- in Cheif: The ordinary formed by horizontal line forming upper part of shield.
- per pale: For those who defended the government, cities, displaying a military bearing and strength with great fortitude.
- in dexter: Upper left part of a shield.
- Gules: Red - fiery nature, fortitude in military endeavors.

A lion: Heroism, courage, strength, power.
Argent: Silver/white to signify serenity, peace and a nobility of purpose, holding a sword of the same, garnished. Or: (meaning gold depicting courage, valor, great value) accompanied in dexter chief (left field) by a mullet, a 5-pointed star and crescent of the same (gold) in sinsiter (heraldry on right upper shield) per fess in chief (dividing line) or gold background - a demi (half) hart or stag in base quarterly, gules (red) and argent (silver/white).
In base: (lower field) Azure (blue) - depicting important traits in fidelity, loyalty, truthfulness. A castle wall with mine exploding behind it - all proper. The lower field may be an interpretation of the name Wehrmann (Military man) as a defender.

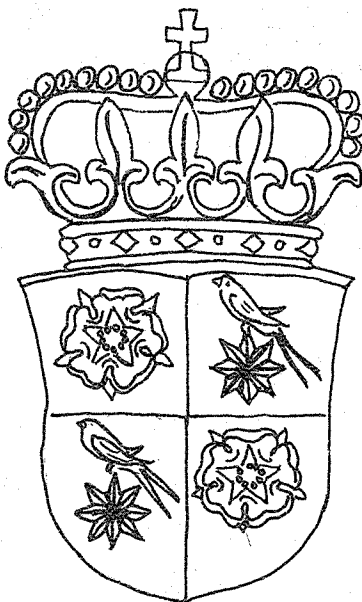
The Mac Daid Memorial Library, upon examination in reference works and the data systems of Holmes-Carey Ltd. states that the first person, bearing the surname of Wehrmann, to sail to America was a G. Wehrmann, sailing the ship, Duke of Wirtemberg with Montplier as her Commander. The ship left Rotterdam on Oct. 16, 1751 landing in Philadelphia in 1751. G. Wehrmann is listed as a Pennsylvania German Pioneer and being a subject of the English Crown, was under obligation to the Governors of American Plantations. It was not uncommon for persons wishing to leave Europe to put themselves in bondage as payment for passage for as long as 5 years. The ship, one of the earliest on record, took from five to ten weeks in crossing.

The fact that he sailed from Rotterdam would not seem unreasonable because history tells us that groups of German people fled to Holland when they were being persecuted because of their religious beliefs, namely the Protestant or Huguenots. Sailing to America, they became known as the Pennsylvania Dutch (Deutsche). It is said that the American Indians could not pronounce the German version and it came out sounding like "Dutch".

England wanting to keep power in America and wishing to build a strong providence encouraged the skilled German craftsmen to sail to America, under bond to the British Empire.

I have been surprised to learn that there was a prominent Wehrmann family, French speaking, who were famous restaurateurs in New Orleans in very early years. They were very "upper class" and wealthy.

NOTE: I have consulted experts in the field of Heraldry in an effort to find a true Coat of Arms. To date I have been unable to do so. A Coat of Arms can only, legally be used when one can find the record of a proven relative obtaining the Coat of Arms and it must be registered an Armorial House. Experts take a dim view of using those "so called" Coat of Arms obtained from Halbert or Samson, although they specifically state that they do not guarantee it being official, many people have the mistaken impression that it is actually their Coat of Arms. Many businesses profit a great deal by offering glassware, plaques, door knockers, etc. with your Coat of Arms.

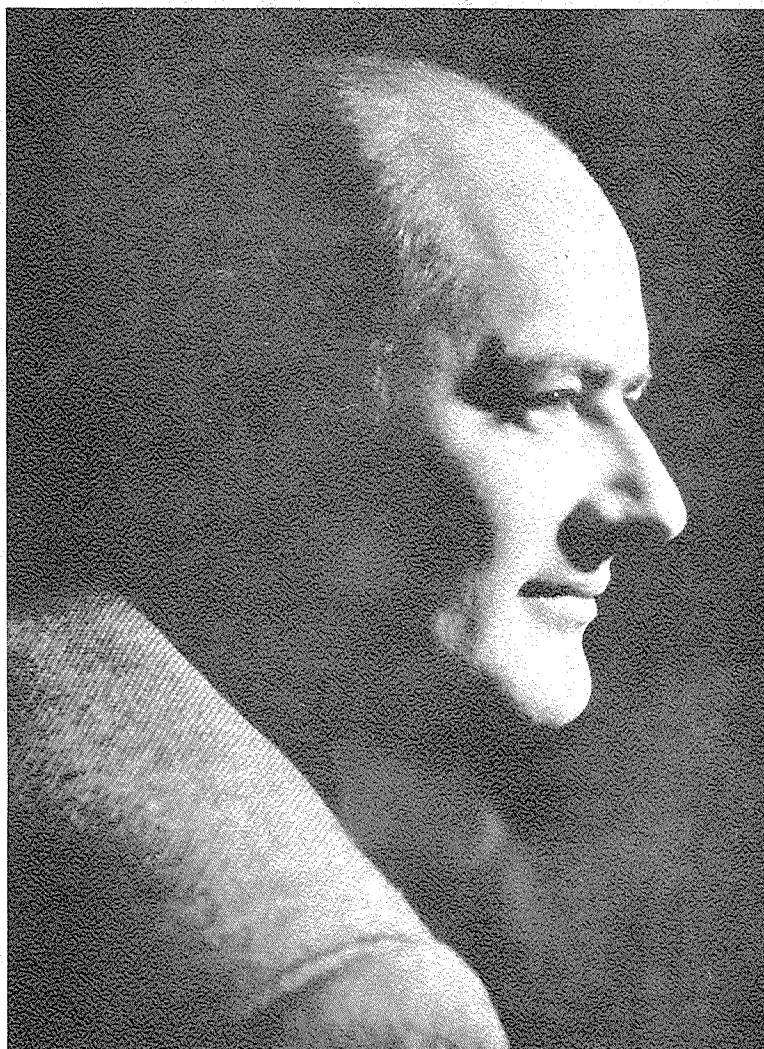


CREST OF LIPPE

This is the Official Coat of Arms for the House of Lippe and is still used by the Royal Prince today. The Princely Line of Lippe continues but the Prince no longer reigns.

The bird on the Crest is a Swallow, the flower, the Lippe Heraldic Rose. The Swallow perches on the 8 pointed star or Estoile. The rose is a symbol of beauty, hope, grace and joy, the Estoile for eminence, honor, the Swallow is a symbol for a bearer of good news, also may represent one who is prompt and alert in affairs.

Crowns were given for those who preformed a feat of valor or in this case denotes a house of Royalty.

HISTORY OF THE PRINCIPALITY OF LIPPE

Lippe is the former land of the German Reich. It was inhabited in the early days by several tribes. The strongest of these being the Cherusii tribe led by Arminius (Roman pronunciation) of Hermann. The Roman Emperor was worried about their growing strength and sent a Roman Army led by Varus. Hermann led his tribe to victory, defeating the 9 A.D. legions and ended Roman domination. It was later dominated by Saxons, defeated by Charlemayne.

The founder of its princely family, one of the most ancient in Germany, was Bernard I (1113-1144). He received a grant of the territory from Emperor Lothair II. Lothair II was a grandson of Charlemayne and was chosen King of Germany at Mainz on August 30, 1125. In 1133, he became Roman Emperor, but he returned to live in Germany. His reign was regarded as the golden years for Germany.

Taking his name from his strong fortress near Lippestadt (presently Lipperode), Bernard took the title of Lord of Lippe (Edler Herr von Lippe), which is still proudly born by his descendants.

The following is copied from the "Germanic Genealogist", Number 19, pages 109-111. (Printed by permission of the publication.)

The family fortunes having been firmly founded by Bernard, it pursued a career typical of the German mediaeval baronage and waxed ever stronger through the centuries, acquiring Detmold towards 1150, Schwalenburg, Biesterfeld, and Weissenfeld in 1322, the incipient State being strengthened in 1368 by the adoption of the principle of primogeniture. Sternberg was added to their growing territories in 1405, and in 1528 they assumed the title of Count (Graf), being confirmed as Counts of the Holy Roman Empire in 1529.

In spite of the acceptance of the canons of primogeniture in 1368, the habit of the German princes to divide and subdivide their territories among their children—a tendency which gave rise to the Wettin States of Coburg, Meiningen, Altenburg, and Weimar—asserted itself, and on the death of Count Simon VI in 1613, the territories of Lippe were divided amongst his sons, Lippe-Detmold being vested in one son, while various Bailiwicks were given the other children, and thus gave rise to the Principality of Schaumburg-Lippe, and the countly Lines of Lippe-Biesterfeld and Lippe-Weissenfeld.

From 1613 onwards, Lippe's history is characterized by astonishing territorial and dynastic stability. The territories of the two States of Lippe and Schaumburg-Lippe did not change hands or increase or decrease in size from 1613 to Nazi times, with the exception of the cession by Count Friedrich Karl August of Lippe-Biesterfeld (1706-1781) of his territories to the reigning line in 1762. Count Friedrich Karl August was the founder of that branch which succeeded to the throne of Lippe in 1905.

The reigning line—descended from Simon VII of Lippe-Detmold (1587-1627)—had taken the title of Prince (Fürst) in 1720, a title which was confirmed in 1789. During the nineteenth century both the Lippes were hereditary and constitutional Principalities, Lippe being governed under a Charter of Rights granted in 1836 and an electoral law of 1876. It possessed a uni-cameral State Assembly, composed of delegates elected on the basis of a three-class system of suffrage. A State Ministry supervised the departments of State.

With the death of Prince Waldemar in 1865, leaving an only surviving brother, Prince Karl Alexander, who was incapable of carrying out the functions of government, the senior line of the House of Lippe began to ebb towards its close, and a most unfortunate dispute as to the Regency and the Succession arose among the various branches of the Lippe family. For the time being, Count Ernst of Lippe-Biesterfeld ruled as Regent and much resented the interference of the Kaiser, from whom he demanded the title of Illustrious Highness, in the affairs of Lippe. He died in 1904 and was succeeded as Regent by his son, Leopold. Prince Karl Alexander died in 1905, and the

dispute over the succession was at last settled in October of that year when Count Leopold was declared Prince of Lippe, with the qualification of Most Serene Highness, by the High Court of the Empire.

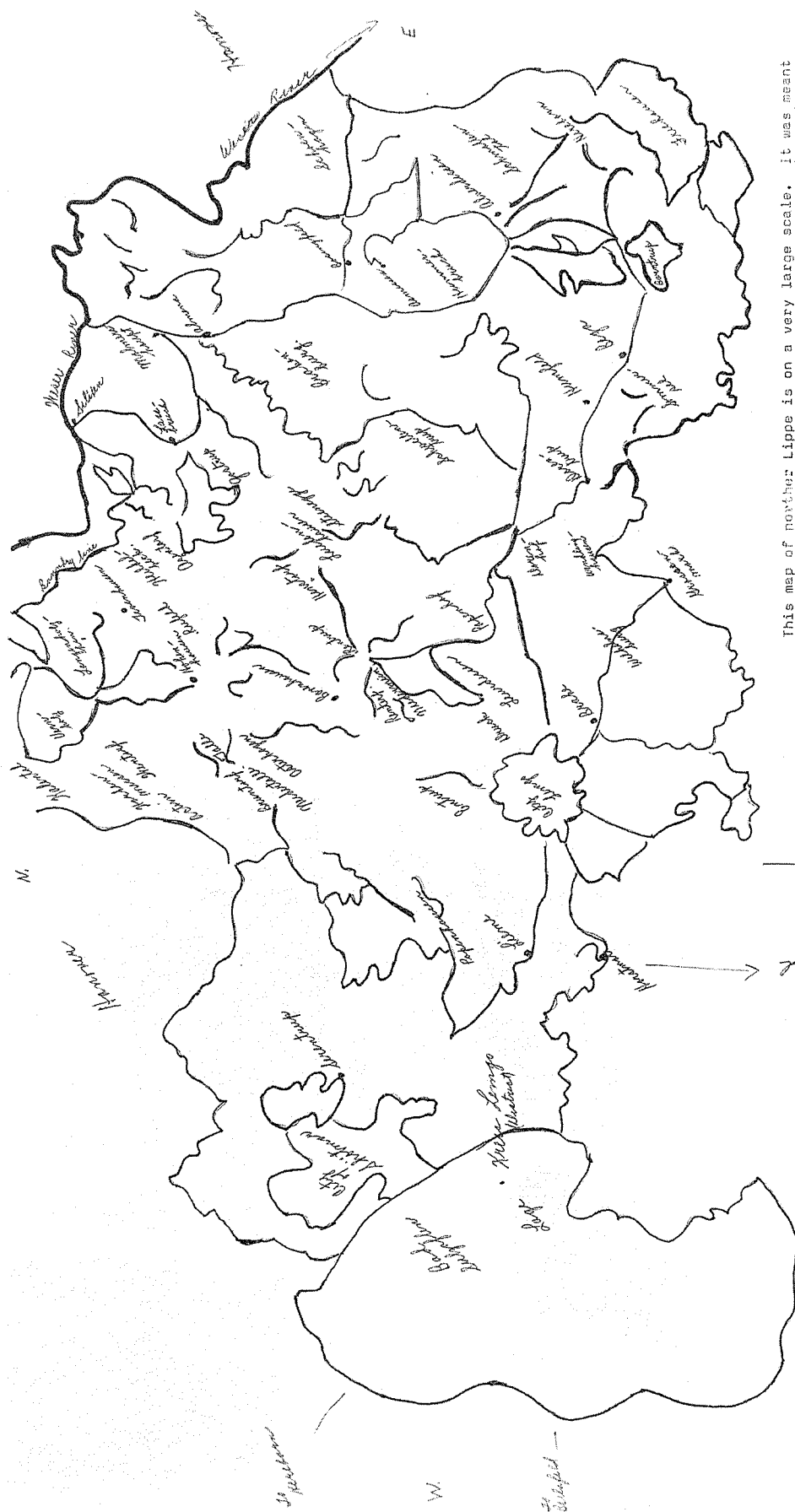
Leopold IV Julius Bernard Adalbert Otto Karl Gustav, thus declared Head of the House of Lippe, was born at Obercassel on 30th May 1871, and was twice married. Prince Leopold abdicated on 12 November 1918, and retired into private life, the family retaining possession of their estates and the affection of their people.

Prince Ernst August is the son of the late Prince Julius Ernst of Lippe (1873-1952), a brother of Leopold IV, and of Her Highness Princess Mary of Mecklenburg-Strelitz (1878-1949), through whom he is related to the British Royal Family. His Most Serene Highness is married to Princess Crista (nee von Arnim). It is interesting to note that Prince Bernhard of the Netherlands, consort of Her Majesty Queen Juliana, is a member of the Princely Family, being the son of the late Prince Bernhard of Lippe, another brother of Leopold IV. 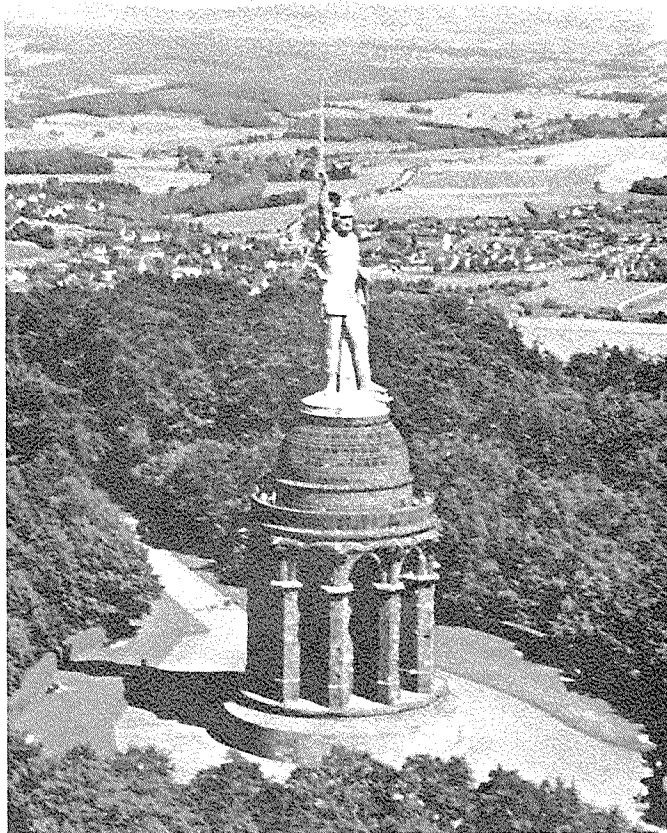

This map of northern Lippe is on a very large scale. It was meant to be an informative map showing the historical areas, routes, etc. Thus, I can not be sure that boundary lines are accurate. It is, however, the best map that I found to show the location of dorfs (villages) and of cities that are named in the family histories of the Lippe-landers.

The darkest line shows the Weser River, entering from Hanover on the east, bordering Hanover and Lippe for a short distance in the north, then then flowing into Hanover again on the north and on northwest to Bremen, then to the North Sea. This was the travel route of our ancestors on the first leg of their journey to America.

Those who lived in Hanover traveled to Hamburg and on to the sea.

DESCRIPTION OF LIPPE

Lippe Detmold was a tiny principality consisting of about 470 square miles. It was surrounded by the more powerful divisions of Saxony, Hanover and Hess-Cassell, kingdoms in themselves and strong in state affairs. The Lippe River is a right bank tributary of the Rhine. It rises in Lippspringe under the western slope of the Teutoberger Wald and is joined by the Alme, the Pader, the Ahse on the left, by the Stever on the right, flows into the Rhine near Weser. Near Lippstadt, it is navigable by the aid of 12 locks for boats and barges drawing less than 4 feet of water. It is important for transporting facilities it affords the rich agricultural districts.

The city of Lippstadt was founded in 1168 by the Lord of Lippe, the right of over half of the town later passing to the Counts of Mark, which in 1614 was incorporated with Brandenburg. In 1850, the Prince of Lippe sold his half to Prussia. The Marienkircke in Transitional style is located here. It was bombed twice in WWII by the British RAF.

DETMOLD

Detmold, which is the seat of residence in the area of Lippe, is designated as Lippe Detmold. It stands in the foreground and behind it appears the rising slopes of the Teutoberger Wald (forests) with its beautiful Weinberg (vineyards) and glorious old trees.

These beautiful hillsides were the scene of the battle of the Cheruskan, led by Arminius or Hermann, who defeated the Roman leader Varus in an early century and won for Germany her earliest freedom from the Roman Empire.

Here, on the crown of the hills stands the Hermannsdenkmal in honor of the brave tribesmen leader who lead his men to victory. So beloved is the early warrior that the immigrants who left Ulm, Germany and established the beautiful old city of New Ulm, Minnesota, U.S.A., built an almost identical monument on the steep western side of the city. Hermann stands with sword upraised and holds his shield with his other hand. Hermann the Cherusker symbolizes all of the patriotic defenders who in 9 A.D. and ever since have fought to prevent the fall of the Fatherland to a foreign invader.

Our own ancestors in Sheboygan County changed the name of their township Howard to Town Hermann.

Schloss Detmold was the residence of the Princes of Lippe and stands preserved in a park jeweled with floral settings. An imposing monument stands on its grounds.

INSIGHT INTO THE CUSTOMS AND LAWS OF LIPPE

Wayne V. Jones of Houston, Tex. has compiled a book on his wife's family, namely; "The Reike Family of Bavenausen, Lippe-Detmold." Included in his book is a chapter of Wehrman/n. He has graciously granted his permission for me to print some informative data from his book. Mr. Jones has worked for large oil companies since graduation from college, is part owner in an independent company bearing his name. He is an accomplished Genealogist, has numerous recognitions in the field and has traveled to Lippe. Most of the following information has been taken from his research.

Permission to marry was required by the reigning Prince of Lippe, through his agents. Descriptions of marriage contracts often contain words such as "Vollspanner" or freeholder, "liebzuchter" or pensioner, "Klein Kotter" - small cottage, "Straasen-dotter" or cottager at the road, "Auf den Röte" newly cleared land, etc.

An example of a marriage contract is as follows: "Frederick R. of Bavenhausen wants to get married to Anna Marie _____ of Rentorf. The bride is moving to the groom on the latter's small cottage of his own and brings into his property, based on the promises of the mother, the widow _____ presently in bad condition. He gets from her farm, 60 Reichsthalers, the bride wagon, wedding clothes, 2 cows, 2 heifers, 4 pigs, and 4 sacks of corn, at equal parts. The groom's parents get their portion; free dwelling in the house and formerly apportioned 2 bushels hired land, 2 scheffel of see, hereditary land (this means as much lands as it requires to sow 2 bushels of seed). His brothers and sister are getting the homestead, the brothers 5 Kruezer (a very small sum) the sister, 5 Kruezer and a cow, if one is left behind by the parents. This, acted in the presence of the mothers of the groom and bride and of the agent, Hans Freytag."

His wife died and Frederick wishes to marry again in 1762 the second contract goes like this: "Frederick R. of Bavenhausen want to get married to Caterina Dohmeyer of Langenholzhausen. The groom is moving to the bride in her own small cottage homestead and is inserting 5 Rhenish Florins in cash. The bride's mother is receiving her portion, half of the dwelling in the house, half of the garden, half of the fruit on the trees, the lowest part within the fence."

Another contract maintains that the groom is to maintain the demented person (father-in-law) staying in the household for his lifetime.

In 1605, a claim was brought against a man, at Humfeld, who had carried away another man's fence.

In some cases the "bride wagon" is called a "bride cart" or even a "bridewain".

A 1779 marriage agreement shows the bride bring with her "40 Reichthalers, 2 cows, 2 big pigs, 6 bushels grain, beside the customary "bride carriage". The groom's parents were given the entire house, 1/3 of the fruit on the trees, a lot of land in the so-called "turnip garden" and the usual allotment of seed grain listed as coming from:

1. in the shade - 5 shorte Kopfe (1/4 bu.)
2. in the brightness - ("Helli") at the lowest part, etc.
3. on the ("Butte") or hillock on top below — heldge — etc.
4. on the topmost part of the "Reckte" and 1/4 of the land from the top down of the land bordering the Braakhagen (neighbor's name)
5. on the woodlot (Brand or land turned by burning into arable land) the lowest part of the road, etc.
6. at still the same place, a part of the second part from below, upwards
7. in the turnip garden — the middle part of
8. behind the "Brinke" or border, the second lot from Rehm's land on here-wards, etc.
9. in the hereditary woods, the second lot from below, etc.

This all adds up to 18 bushels of grain from these 9 locations.

The document was done at Varenholz 1707 at the cost of:

Tax 2 thaller, 20 Groschens
Order 1 thaler
Copy of procatal 3 Groschen

(None of these records pertain to our own ancestors, but are an example of the requirements that they also had to meet and of well and not-so-well kept records.)

Another instance that I thought to be of interest is the case of the pastor of the Church at Bega who upon his death left a widow and two daughters. An interested party intervened to help out the daughters. He wrote, praising the late pastor and asked that the Parish Bega be given a young man who could marry the late pastor's daughter or that the husband of the married daughter be given the post. His request was not granted. Another pastor's widow wrote that her son could not fill the place of his father for various reasons and she asked that he be given the Bega parish and he could marry the single daughter. The Burgomaster and the Council of Blomberg recommended him but he was not given the parish. However, in 1620, he was appointed to Barntrup. The story ends here.

There was an incident where a school teacher, in the forenoon of Holy Christmas Day, got so completely drunk in the company of man servants that during the noon service she created a scandal by vomiting in public. Her neighbors left the church because of the stench and she was carried out of the church.

"The Bega Church was originally Lutheran. The Reformed Confession was introduced into Lippe in 1605. Lippe was not a strictly Lutheran land, since even Lemgo, which demonstrated against the Change of Confession ordered by the Sovereign, had not accepted the formula of Concord. On the other hand, even after 1605, Lippe was not strictly a Reformed land. It took a somewhat middle position between the two Evangelical Confessions, but church life was more influenced by the Reformed trend.

In the Church at Bega, the change took place without disturbance. The pastor welcomed the tendency for a union within Protestantism which was underway in those days, especially from the Reformed side.

At Alverdisen and Senneborn the Reformed Confession was accepted with a threatening attitude toward pastors. The removal of Pictures, Crucifixes, and the use of bread instead of the host, in particular were opposed most strenuously.

The inn at Bega was in possession of the church, the deacon had the right to appoint an innkeeper. It is said that in 1591, Prince Phillip purchased the inn. (It would be interesting to know if our own ancestral church was once Lutheran or if it was always a Reformed Church. The Reformed Church did not accept all of the teachings of Martin Luther, in fact, they seemed to find much of the Catholic theme still in the church and resented it. In one of the above paragraphs it is written that "church life was more influenced by the Reformed trend.")

Lippe still exists as a political unit and has a vote in the Riechstag but the whole country of Western Germany is now divided into units called Landkreiz, the area that we refer to is in the Landkrieiz Lemgo. It is roughly 22 miles by 10 miles in size, very irregular in shape, larger than an American Township but smaller than an American County.

Not all villages have churches in them, many are too small to support a church. These are officially a part of the nearby town with a church. There are supervising towns to which the smaller places report — as Americans report to a local governmental unit."

In most villages the custom was, and is, to number houses in the order built, except that a rebuilt house retains its number. As a result the numbers are scattered all over the village without order and are not to be confused with street numbers.

Title to a house usually carried with it a title to a small tract of farm land, within walking distance from the village. It and the house were inherited or conveyed as a unit. According to the old "Namenrecht" or "Right of Names," in Lippe the "Hof-

name" or name of the combined property, remained the same for centuries. Future owners assumed that name. (Naturally this practice can cause a researcher great difficulty. As I have previously mentioned, there were omissions in records, errors in entering names, poor penmanship, and baptised children's names not registered.) In some instances it was assumed that the child was named after its first and second godparents of the same sex as the child. With girls this was often difficult because registration of female sponsors were often recorded as, "the wife of so-and-so." As Mr. Jones remarks, "at the time, no doubt this was clear to everyone, but today such a record leaves much to be desired."

In the case of marriage records, often the records of the three banns was recorded but the marriage record failed to be put in the books. In such cases, the standard presumption in Germany is that the wedding took place on the date for the marriage.

A number of our ancestors were classified as "hoppenplueckers". One record states that "a hop-picker belongs to the Courtly Domain (Lippe) and must give to it in case of death, and earnest money:

If he owns a small house, on the side of the house a small
courtyard with 3 or 4 fruit trees planted in it - 18 florins
No garden or land.

Gets assigned on wood — 9 florins

A record of Presents and Taxes:

On St. Peter's Day 12 florins

On Michelmas 1 florin

One smoked chicken

Cow and grass money is free of services.

Gives to the Pastor a money offering.

To the Sexton there 2 d. Christmas money."

The Wehrman (spelled with one n) Chapter contains many familiar names, such as: Brandt, Begeman, Frevert, Fasse, Sandmeyer, Kruse, Heger, Rickmeyer, Sanderman, Schulze, Böger, and more, in Jones' book.

MORE ABOUT OUR ANCESTORS

The area from which our Lippian ancestors came is a land of rolling hills and forests. It lay in the shadow of the Tuetoberger Wald. It is possible that this is one of the reasons that they did settle near the Kettle Moraine Country in Wisconsin, because it reminded them of their beloved homeland. Areas of Western Wisconsin attracted them, too, because of the similarity of terrain.

In their homeland, it was mostly mountainous with rich valleys. Much of the land was owned by independent landowners. The ruling Prince possessed a large domain which was let out on a perpetual lease. It was the custom for the oldest son to inherit the property and to compensate other heirs. In this way, estates were kept undivided for centuries. The lease required that a portion of the harvest belonged to the ruling Prince.

It is apparent that the families of the generations remained together with succeeding generations occupying the home. Our ancestors lived in house #42, the descendants of a brother in #44. A member of this family is listed in records as a life annuitant of house #44. Acreage was small and on their three or four acres they raised rye and their potatoes, as a staple food, and usually had a cow or two for milk and cheese.

Many of the people were listed in occupation as "hoppenpluecker" or picker of hops. As was our great-great-grandfather and his brother. Our ancestor was also listed as a "strassenkotter" or street layer, in the slack season. If you have ever visited Germany, you will recognize that this is a work of art. Small, round stones are fitted closely and often resemble the artistry of mosaic. Many are in as good condition today as when laid. In the city of Freiburg, little water troughs run parallel, with clean fresh water to scrub the streets. It is said that other Lippers traveled to a different area where they produced brick.

Our immediate family ancestors lived in the village of Tevenhausen (sometimes spelled Tefenhausen) about three or four miles from Langenholzhausen, the site of their church. Their lives revolved around their religion. Langenholzhausen, nestled in the valley, no doubt near the forests, because the name "Langenholz" mean tall trees. The country was beautiful, with small lakes and the nearby Weser River, which twisted and turned on its way to Bremer to the North Sea. This was the route used to reach the harbor and to embark on their journey to America.

Their possessions were packed in great chests of wood with iron bands to secure them. Women wore little bonnets and shawls and men wore sturdy boots as they turned their faces steadfastly toward America, leaving behind loved ones, some who would follow but many, many more whose faces they would never more see. Ahead lay the unknown, the long ocean voyage, the vermin, the pestilence on the overcrowded vessel. There are those who never completed their journey. The very young and the very old alike, lowered amid breaking hearts into a watery grave in the deep sea. It was a true test of their faith, yet, hardships seemed to strengthen their faith.

They brought with them the tools and skills of their own. The spinning wheels, used for spinning flax in their homeland, were also brought to America. The Wehrmann spinning wheel is owned by a descendant today.

The year 1847 was known as the famine year and was one more inducement for them to migrate to America. It could be that the largest group from any one portion of northwest Germany, was that of the Lippers from the little principality of Lippe Detmold. Especially since, in following years, many more groups followed. They usually went first to Sheboygan County and were welcomed by earlier settlers. Later, groups moved on to farm more colonies and to establish churches in other parts of Wisconsin and in Iowa, Illinois and Nebraska.

Today this area in Sheboygan County, Wisconsin is one of the most beautiful and most prosperous areas in the state. They still speak their native German language among themselves, love their church, but are strongly loyal to this new country. They live in faith, love and fellowship in the way in which our ancestors taught their children and it has been passed on through generations. They endowed them with the enduring

strength, courage and faith in the Lord who guided them all through their dedicated lives.

Everyone of our colonists had been well-educated in High German but the Lippians preferred the "Plat Deutsche" and had a dialect of their own. It is reported that they attended good schools in Germany, their penmanship in the old Gothic script was beautiful. They learned the English language by contact with earlier settlers in surrounding areas.

Looking at the old translated letters written to Karl Wehrmann, by his brother who was a teacher in Lemgo, we find that he is mailing books to him. Evidently Karl is educating his children. One book mentioned is an arithmetic book in which he explains the codes for addition, subtraction, multiplication and division. It is probable that there is not yet a district school in Town Hermann or perhaps this was supplementary to their lessons. Song books are also sent, it is apparent that this family, for generations, have loved music and loved to sing.

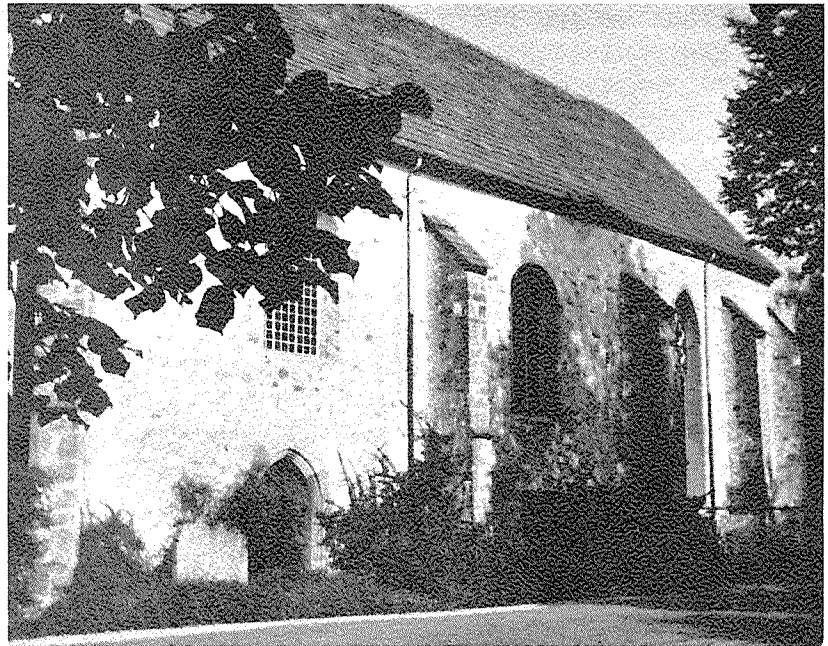
You will note that our first known ancestor is titled as Jost Herman Wehrmann or Hoever. It was the custom, in Germany, for a man who married a women with more property than his to assume her surname. It would seem that this had occurred in a generation before because in following generations the name, Wehrmann, is used. Thus I feel it safe to assume that this is our true family name.

Much of this earlier research was made possible by the financial aid of Stella Wehrmann Kirkendall of Iowa, in order that we might learn how we were related. We found that we are fifth cousins. Her family record is included in this book. I am very grateful to her for her generous contribution.

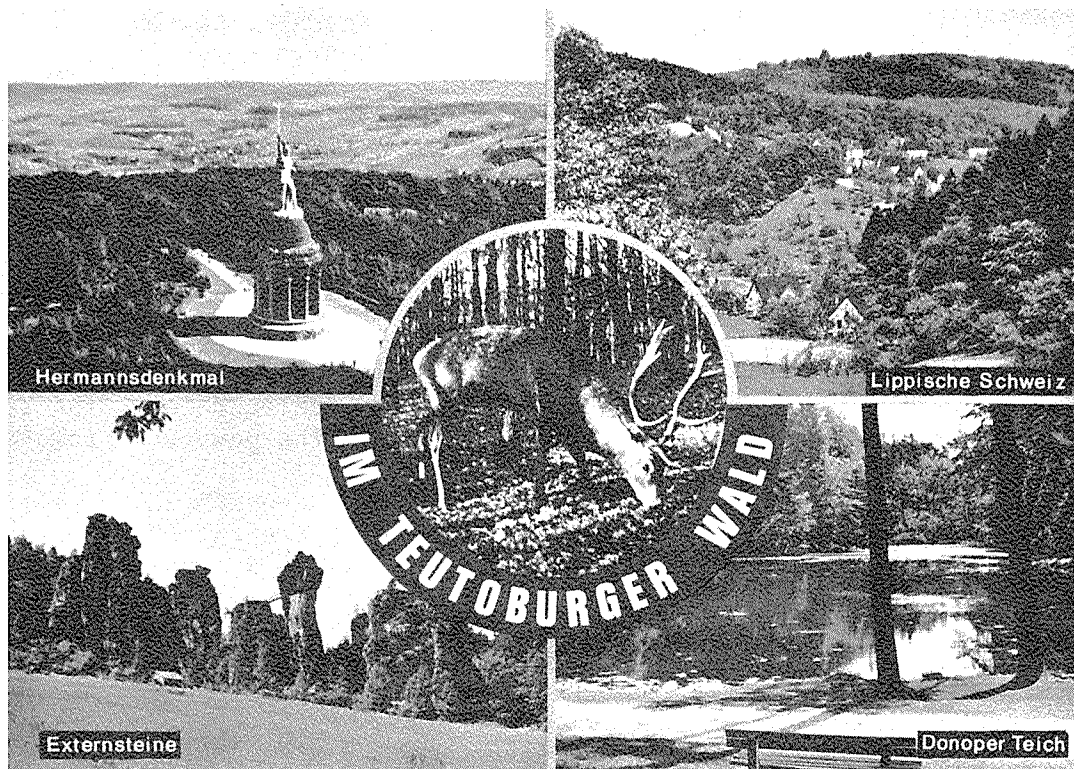


The German Reformed Church of our Ancestors in Langenholzhausen, Lippe. At left is its high square tower with the clock. Constructed in 1350.

Beautiful scenes from the land of our forefathers in the Teutoburger Wald (forest). This mountain range stretches from southwest to southeast, from west of Osnabruch to southeast of Pöterborn for a distance of 62 miles, a width that varies from 3 to 6 miles. The greater part is heavily wooded. It was occupied by numerous German tribes such as the Cheruski, whose leader, Arminius or Hermann, defeated Varus the Roman General in 9 A.D. In the upper left corner is shown the Hermannsdenkmal, erected as a tribute to Hermann. The story has been fully told in another portion of this book. In the upper right are shown Lippish Dairy Farms.

The Teutoburger Wald was well loved by our ancestors and much was told of its beauty. Apparently, much of it was more like rolling hills and was fertile, containing many lakes and "Teich" ponds as in the lower right corner. The "steine" or rocks on the lower left resemble the "Needles" in our Black Hills or the "Garden of the Gods" in Colorado, near Denver or Colorado Springs.

DESCRIPTION OF EVANGELICAL GERMAN REFORMED CHURCH

The Evangelical Reformed Church, at the dorf of Langenholzhausen, in Lippe-Detmold, is the church of our ancestors. It is still active today.

The structure is a large stone-buttressed building with gothic art-glass windows. It has a large square tower that seems to overshadow the main structure and it gives it the look of a fort. The tower has a square clock about three-quarters of the distance to the top.

It was constructed in 1350 (making it over 600 years old) as a Roman Catholic Church. In medievel times, the church was supported by a Graf or a man of royalty who lived in a nearby castle on a hill. He also owned a grist mill run by a water wheel, which still remains standing not far from the church.

The church was taken over by Protestants in about 1750 and has been renovated three times since then - in 1818, in 1860, and in 1974. The pipe organ was installed in 1743. The first two renovations were done by a Herr Behlensmeier. The roof was supported by gothic arches buttressed from the outside. The pews were removed and interior was plastered in June, 1974.

The alter region showed evidence of the old Catholic Church's niches for statuary. It has the capacity to seat 350 to 400 people in the main area of the church.

On the south wall, near the alter, an artifact painting was uncovered. It depicts a medievel castle on a hill, a monk praying, nearby a knight on a horse, and a dog chewing bones (possible the bones of the enemy).

Several knights who served the Graf and the Graffin were entombed beneath the floor near the altar. Large plaques bearing their name and deeds were removed from the floor and placed along the outside wall on the south side.

In a small churchyard were a few gravestones. One stone had the inscription of the Rev. Joseph Rieke who was born in 1823, died in 1896, having served as pastor for 9 years, namely 1842-1851. It appears that he was the presiding pastor when our ancestors came to America. This would make him only 19 years of age when he began to serve and 28 years old when he terminated his service. He must have been a local person because at 73 years of age he is interred at this church. The pastor serving in 1974 was the Rev. Reinard Uthoff. There was another graveyard nearby. A church school with frescoed walls stood near the church, also a parsonage that appears to join the church wall.

Remarks

The earliest readable records that we were able to trace begins with Jost Hermann Wehrmann or Hoevery. We guessed his birth at 1706, using the age given at time of death. If correct, his wife was seven years older than he was. It is not unusual to find a female at this age and unmarried since the number of females far outnumbered the number of eligible males. No doubt, constant wars left the male population at a minimum.

He was 24 at the time of his marriage to Marien Elizabeth Kathers, she was 31 years old. Her name, Marien, is unusual, too, with a repetition of names used more often. It would seem that she could have lived in a different area - more likely it was her parents, the Frederick Caters, who had lived in a different place, since her baptism is recorded at Langenholzhausen. She did not use her first name as written here, in later records she was called "Marie Lisabeth".

House #44 was the family home that later we see as the residence of the eldest living son, Johann Conrad (W2), while his younger brother, Johann Friederick (W4) is associated with house #41, that family recorded later in this chapter.

"In Iowa, we find several branch colonies, the oldest being in Allkamakee County in the area of Waukon and Postville. Here we find many families who earlier were Wisconsin residents and among others are; Heger (Hager), H. and S. Riefrau, Klemme, H. Luhmann, Meierkord, Opfer, Schnitger, Siekmeier, Steffen, C. Weber, A. Winter. Here they belong to the Presbyterian and Reformed Churches.

A number of families traveled further to Jasper County and settled in Newton and Baxter area where they founded a Reformed Church. Here we find the families of Achtmeier, Boedecker, A. Fasse, Hare, Sandermann, Wehrmann, as well as others."

From "Times - Republican" in 1979 (in part)

"Zoar Reformed Church, near Newton, Iowa, has been placed on the National Register of Historic Places. This rural church in its beautiful setting was built by German Immigrants in 1876. The first church was dismantled and the present one built in 1892. It overlooks the rolling countryside that once was grass covered prairie. A small vista of the former prairie is visible from the church. Architectural embellishments are still noticeable in the pointed arches, pediments, narrow clapboarding and "stickwork" between the native limestone foundation and sill level. The church suggests quality craftsmanship and applied skills on the part of the German immigrants who built it."

Heinrich Hermann Wehrmann left Sheboygan County in 1867 with a family named Achtmeier and settled in Jasper County. The area was known as Horn and it was here that they founded the Horn Reformed Church. Apparently more Lippers followed in later years. It was a beautiful old church with lovely art glass windows. The church burned to the ground in 1971 but the burial ground is still there. The Horn Church must have had a split at some time because Zoar Reformed Church received many of its members.

Heinrich Wehrmann was a charter member of Horn and donated lovely art glass windows to the church. He and many of his family are interred here.

Born 5 Apr. 1828 in Herford, Westfalen.

Came to America in a sailing vessel. The voyage lasted 7 weeks. She worked in New York and met HEINRICH WEHRMANN there. Her family record reads thus:

The father's name at the christening of #1. - Hans Heinrich Pauk of Shotmar (Hans is a German version of Johann or John).

No further effort was made to research the rest of the Pauck family.

Note - name is Pauk in America — Pauck in Germany.

A German AU is pronounced as OW - the CK pronounced as CKT, thus the name would be pronounced POUCKT. Our vowels are A-E-I-O-U, their umlauts are Ä as in AYE, Ö as oor, Ü as oow. A good rule is O or oor should be like a horn blowing, U or oow like a train whistle. In scrip, umlauts have a sharp curved line above them, usually shaded, then drawn to a thin line.

W2¹414 HEINRICH HERMANN WEHRMANN ran from Lippe Detmold to escape going into the German Army with the aid of his employer. There was compulsory military training in Lippe Detmold at the age of 18. He left, apparently, just before his 18th birthday (Feb. 9, 1846), without the knowledge of his parents. The voyage lasted 9 weeks. After landing in New York, he wrote to his former employer asking for wages saved and left with him but never received a reply.

He met CAROLINE WILHELMINE MATHILDA PAUCK in New York. She was an accomplished seamstress. They were married in Long Island, NY on 5 Apr. 1853.

After their marriage they went to Sheboygan Co. He bought 40 acres of land (forest land).

While still in New York, he worked for Henry Luck, who operated a truck farm. Heinrich received from \$9 to \$12 a year. He also worked for a wealthy man, grooming his horses.

After coming to Sheboygan, Heinrich returned to New York to earn money to establish their home. Caroline stayed in Wisconsin at this time earning money, also, as a seamstress.

When Heinrich returned they cleared their land, Heinrich felling trees, ~~MATHILDA~~ burning brush and wood. They lived there for 14 years, raising their first 7 children there, and 1 who died in infancy.

They sold their land for \$1200 and Heinrich went to Jasper Co., IA and purchased 200 acres of land. Soon he gave up the land and returned to Wisconsin, not liking the idea of bringing his family to such wild and new country. They rented land for 1 year in Wisconsin. Then in 1867, they accompanied the Achtemeier family to State Center, IA. From there they walked to a timber near Baxter, 12 to 15 miles. Heinrich purchased, again, the 200 acres he had owned previously. But in this time it had gone from \$7 an acre to \$8 an acre.

They built their home on the banks of North Skunk River. While living here their next 4 children were born. These children include twins, Emma and Christopher.

They built up their land to 1000 acres. Some of this was given as a wedding present to each child when they married. They lived on the original 200 acres until the marriage of Christopher (one of the twins). Then they and their third born, Johanna Wilhelmine (Minnie) went to live with Fred, their 7th born, near Baxter.

Christopher and Ed (Ed being the 11th born) ran the farm together for one year then Chris built a home $\frac{1}{2}$ mile north of the home farm. Ed ran the home farm alone then, marrying Sophia Stolzman, for a number of years. It has since passed out of Wehrman ownership.

Heinrich died in Fred's home, at the age of 72, leaving ~~MATHILDA~~ very well provided for with 400 acres of land besides other assets. The next spring Fred married Minnie Saack and ~~mathilde~~ bought a home in Baxter, where she and Minnie lived until her death.
