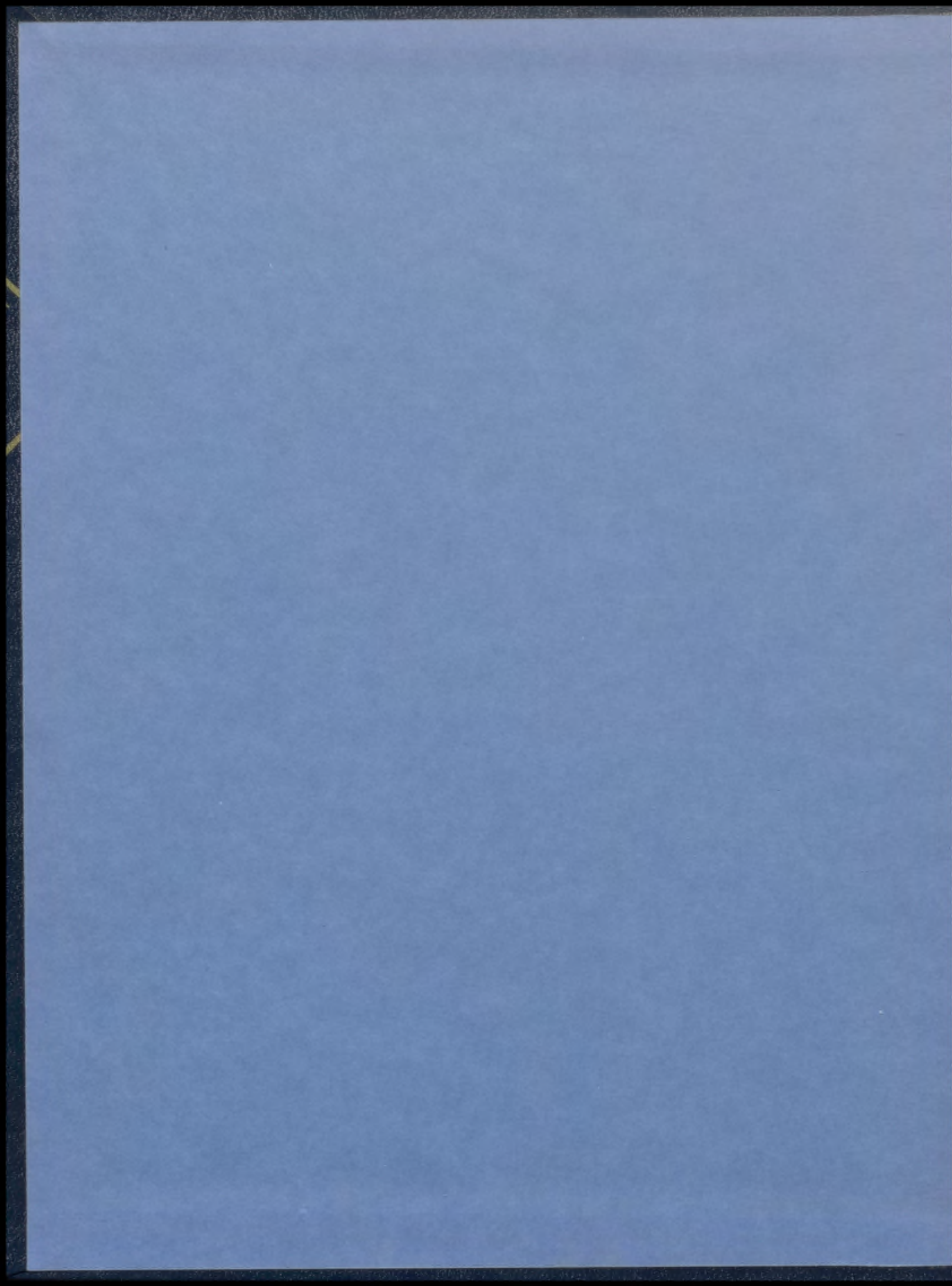

Ottumwa Makes National News

Living in a town of only approximately 30,000 people in the rich farmlands of Southeast Iowa may seem boring at times. Despite this, our little community of Ottumwa made the national news scene more than once throughout the 1982-83 school year.

The first major incident came when Northrup Corporation picked Ottumwa as the spot to train students from Saudi Arabia. Many of the foreign students developed lasting friendships with members of this city. Others may have been a little too radical in their thinking. Despite the fact that they helped Ottumwa's sagging economy, disputes broke out here and there. The turning point came when several Ottumwans and several Saudi students got into a fight over a traffic violation. The entire issue was blown severely out of proportion by the news media as well as the citizens of Ottumwa and the Saudi students themselves. The national media quickly jumped in to further exploit a simple hometown fight. Further incidents eventually concluded with the Northrup Corporation packing up and moving their students to other locations around the United States.

On the positive side, Ottumwa hosted the Video Game Olympics at Twin Galaxies in downtown Ottumwa. Ottumwa, dubbed the video capital of the world by Gov. Terry Bransted, was again the focus of national attention. Nine top players from around the country were invited to our town to compete for the world championship. A crew from television's "That's Incredible" filmed part of the competition as well as a mini-parade. This was featured on the television show viewed by millions of people.

"That's Incredible" also played an essential part in rejoining an Ottumwa family after many years of separation. Lucille Frey knew that she was going to die. She then found homes for each of her seven children. Many years later they all met again on the set of "That's Incredible" after a long and tedious search for the entire family. A movie, *Who Will Love My Children*, was shown telling of this story on ABC television network.

In national news, the White House was filled with controversy as usual as several advisers were dismissed. Secretary of State Alexander Haig was replaced by George Schultz. Security Adviser Richard Allen faced public inquiry into his private affairs before he resigned his post while, at the same time, several agency chairmen were also asked to resign. Interior Secretary James Watt publicly claimed that the annual July 4 concert on the Washington Mall was "despoiled by rock bands." He then signed Wayne Newton and the military bands to perform at the festivity. The Beach Boys, performers at this festival for the past three years, were the main attraction that many felt Watt was speaking of.

President Reagan had problems facing him from all sides. He had to deal with the MX missile, turmoil in Lebanon, Nicaragua, and El Salvador, Nancy's expensive China collection and, of course, the nation's depressing economy.

A national trucker's strike resulted in widespread violence. Drivers who refused to strike faced rocks, rifle fire, and angry mobs every time they entered the freeways.

Soon afterwards the strike was called off and promises were made to the trucker's to improve their working conditions and salaries.

Due to a large surplus of processed cheese and butter, the U.S. Government supplied free food to families that qualified. Families in Ottumwa stood in long lines outside the Coliseum waiting for their free government handout.

The space shuttle program continued with its sixth flight into outerspace as *Challenger* made its debut flight. This most recent journey included a walk in space by two of the astronauts and the launching of a satellite from the space craft. More flights are scheduled in the near future.

Despite an ugly campaign by both candidates, Harold Washington defeated Benard Epton to become Chicago's first black mayor.

Throughout the nation, the weather was nothing short of bizarre. The south saw a record number of floods. The Midwest faced 70° temperatures in February and a snowy March and April. California saw hurricane force tides while many watched their expensive beach side homes simply float out to sea.

On the sports scene, the Washington Redskins defeated the Miami Dolphins in the Super Bowl. The St. Louis Cardinals won the World Series over the Milwaukee Brewers. The Iowa Hawkeyes football team went to the Peach Bowl and defeated the Tennessee Volunteers while the basketball team advanced to the NCAA tournament for the fifth year in a row. The North Carolina State Wolfpack upset number 1 Houston Cougars in the NCAA

finals. Iowa's head basketball coach Lute Olson resigned and moved to University of Arizona and was replaced with Washington State's George Raveling.

The Academy Awards chose *Ghandi* as the best picture of the year and Ben Kinsley best actor for his portrayal of Mohatma Ghandi. Meryl Streep took best actress honors in *Sophie's Choice*.

As the T.V. Korean War wound down, the MASH era came to an end. What started as a movie on September 17, 1972, ended more than a decade later on February 28, 1983. It was in the top ten shows of the year ten out of eleven years. Through the years it received fourteen Emmy awards with ninety-nine nominations from the two hundred fifty-one episodes.

Around Ottumwa the work on the viaduct continued, the new Mall saw many new stores move in as the Ottumwa Center was "born." The new Governor Terry Bransted even took a day to visit Ottumwa.

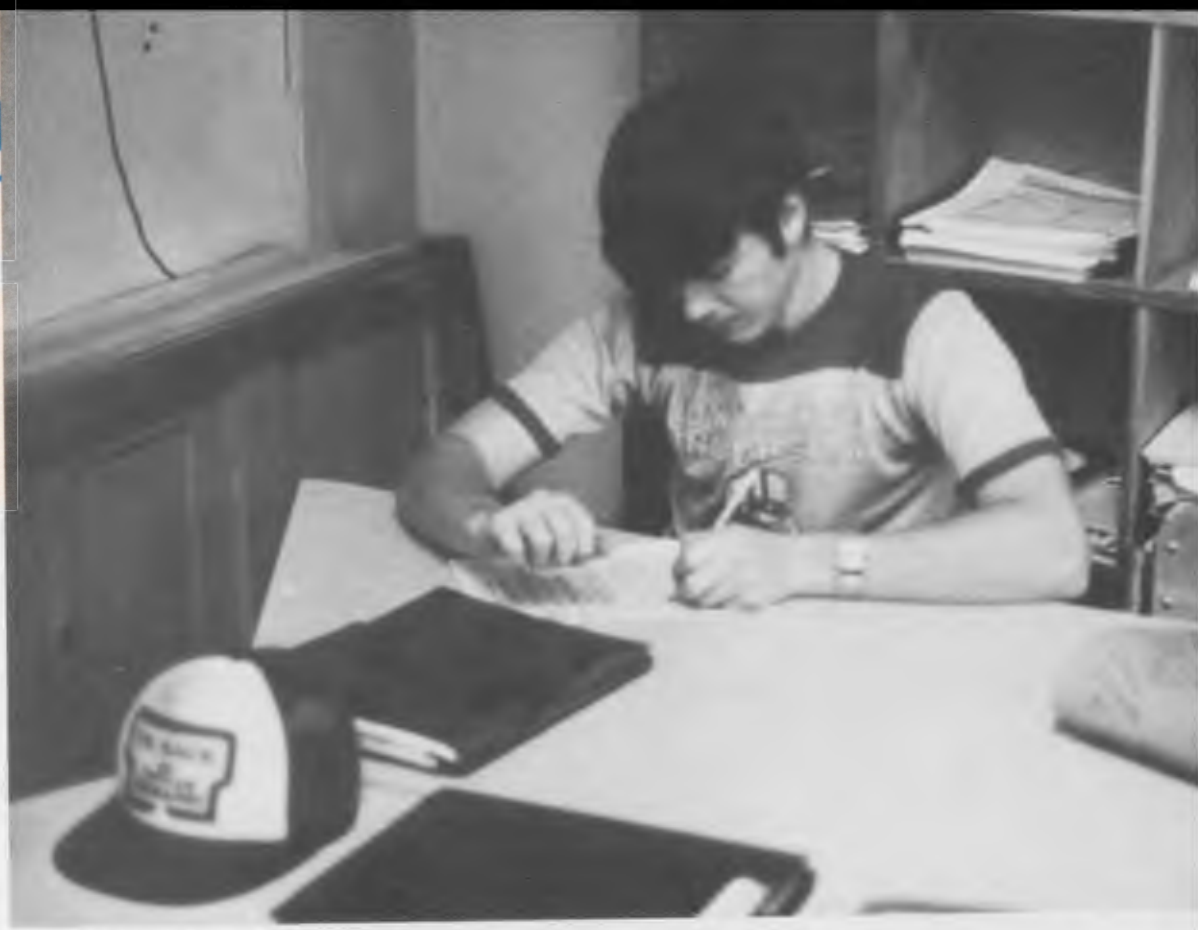

The OHS Speech and Debate team is a competitive unit that begins travelling in late October and continues through mid-March. The team competes throughout Iowa and into Nebraska, South Dakota, Minnesota, and Illinois. The 1982-83 team had a season that, once again, was a success.

The 26 member team won 78 team and individual awards at major tournaments. The Varsity teams debated 210 rounds at 13 tournaments; the Junior Varsity 129 rounds in 9 tournaments; and the Novice teams, including freshmen for the first time, 174 rounds in 7 tournaments. Individual speech competitors competed in 230 rounds at 11 tournaments.

At the Eastern Iowa National Forensic League's Qualifying Tournament, Rich Puszciewicz and Larry Sigel, both seniors, finished in 3rd place and at the Iowa Forensic League's State Tournament, they finished 5th.

Students compete in many areas of individual speech

events. The main areas are Impromptu, Extemp, Humorous and Dramatic Interpretation, Oral Interpretation, Prose and Poetry Reading, and Original Oratory. OHS speakers in these events won 30 trophies and finalist recognitions during the 1982-83 season.

Seniors Larry Sigel and Rich Puszciewicz will receive the Double Ruby Degree from the National Forensic League. Seniors Valerie Carder and Jan McDonald have earned the Degree of Distinction from NFL. Puszciewicz was awarded the Bookin Memorial Award for OHS Outstanding Debator and Sigel was given the OHS Team Leadership Award for the second consecutive year. Carder was named Outstanding Individual Events Speaker and Susan Hennen won the Outstanding Novice Speech award.

The OHS team won Sweepstakes trophies for overall team excellence at several invitational tournaments during the year. Mr. Bob Beisch is the Speech and Drama Coach and his wife, Judy, is Assistant Speech and Debate Coach.

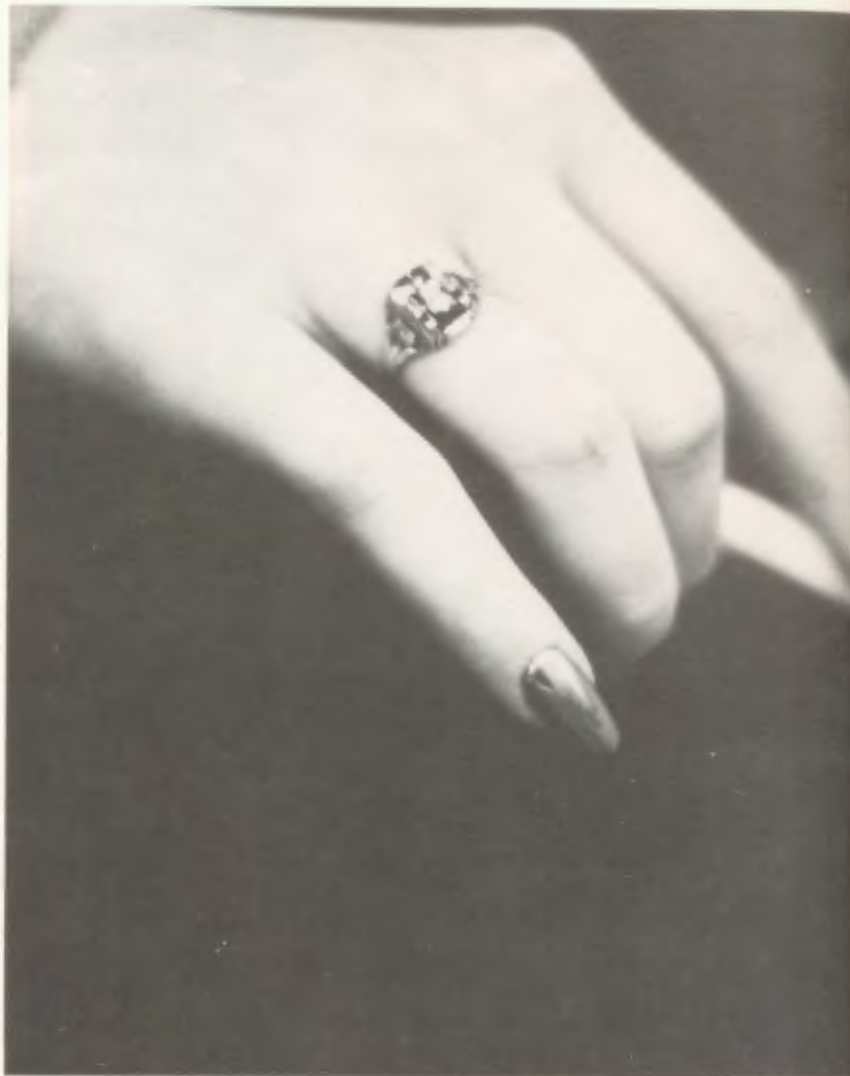

It seemed no matter what you wore, did, or how you acted, it was in style with one of the many trends sooner or later.



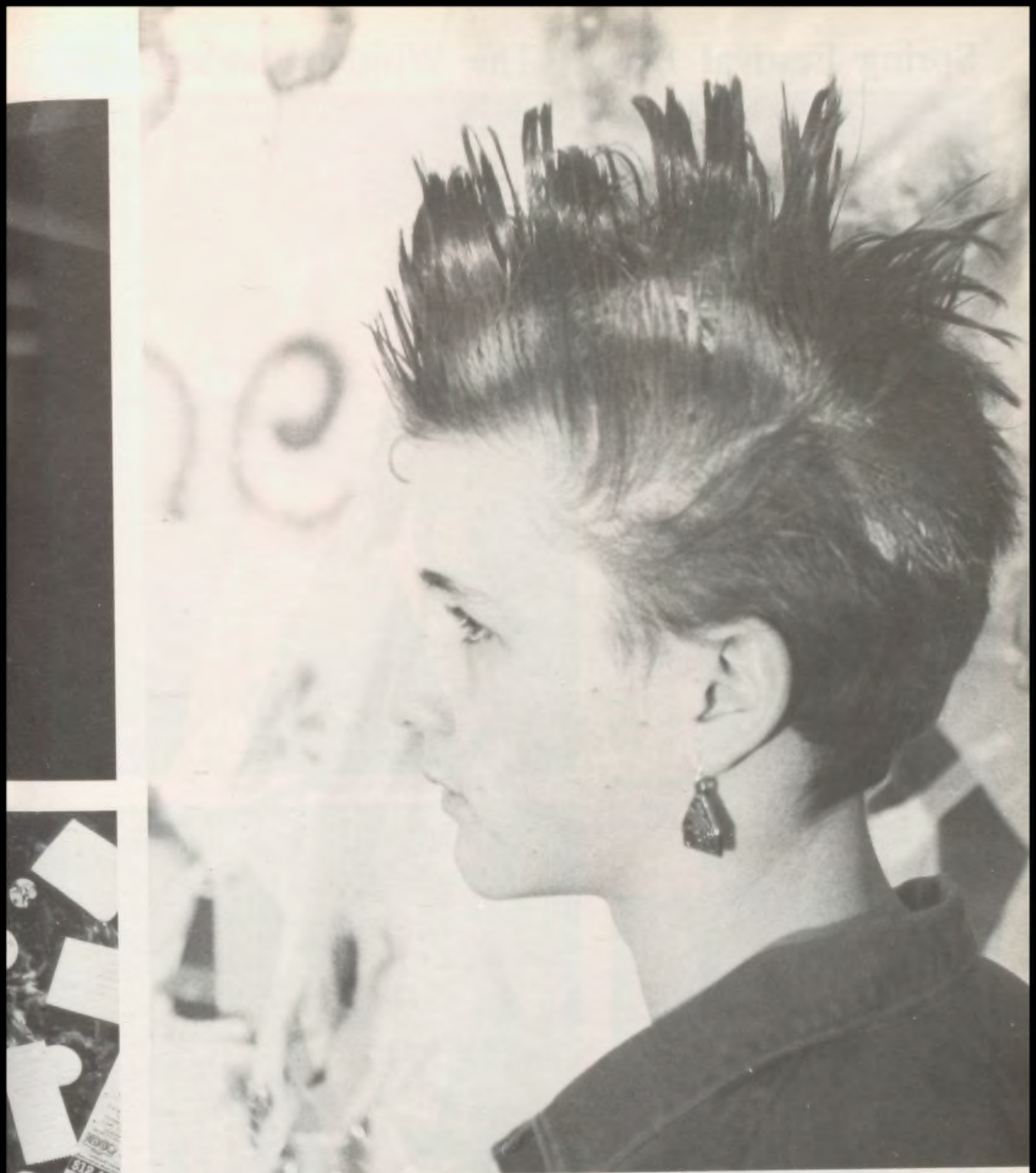

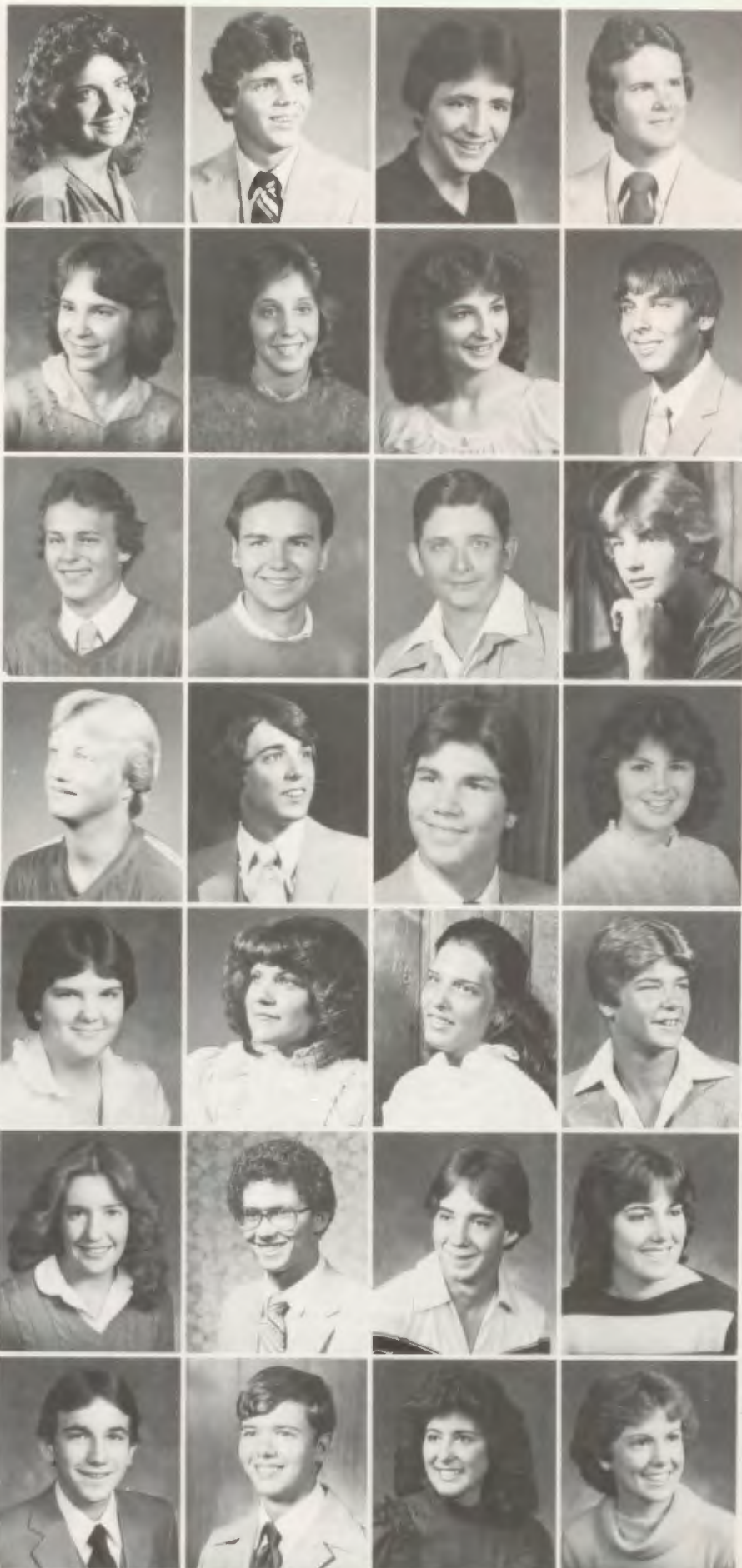

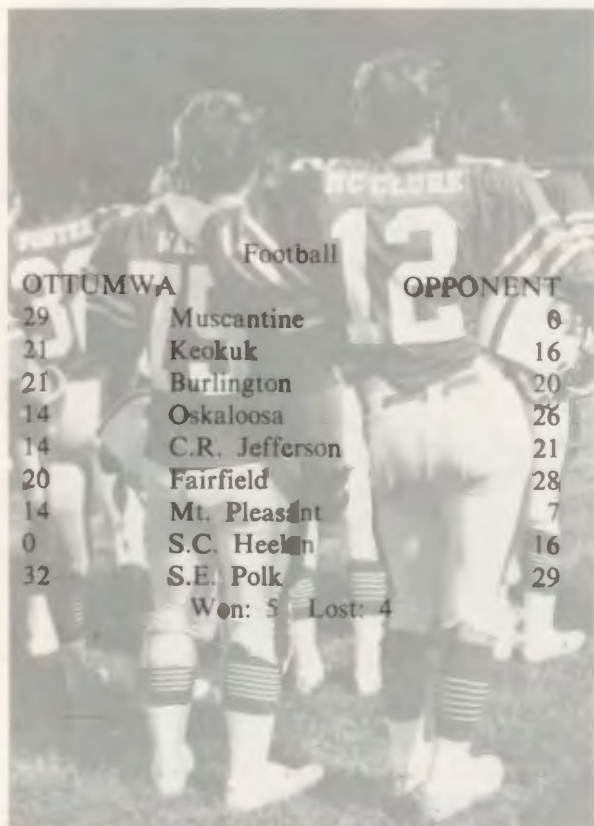
Bulldogs Complete Another Winning Season

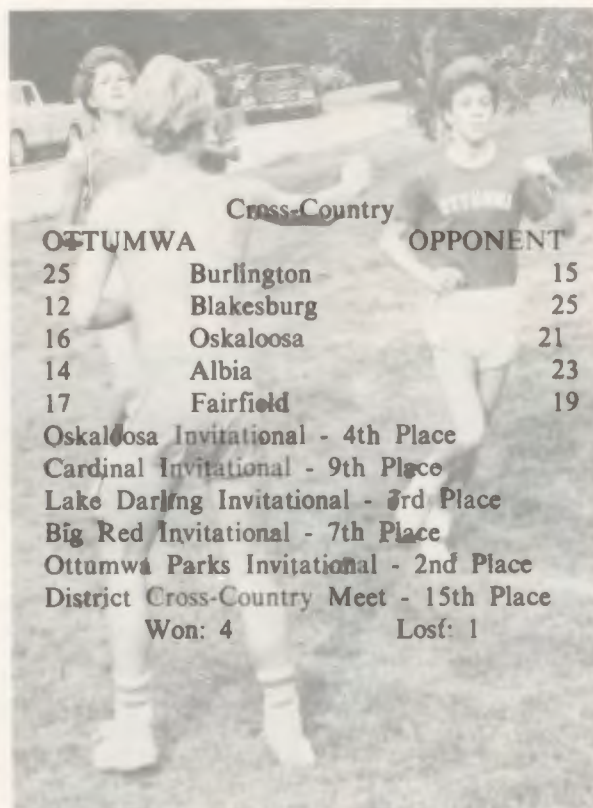

Through all the courses offered at OHS, students are given the chance to understand the expectations of their "New World Tour."

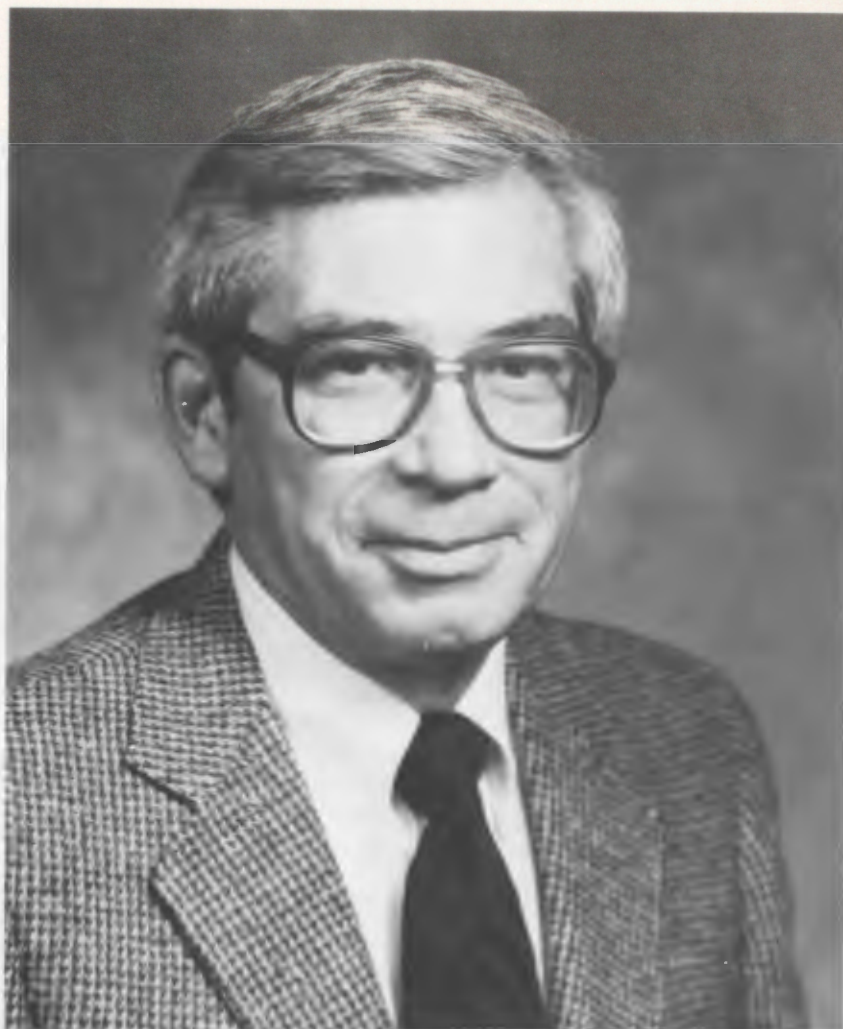

Freshmen Move Into OHS

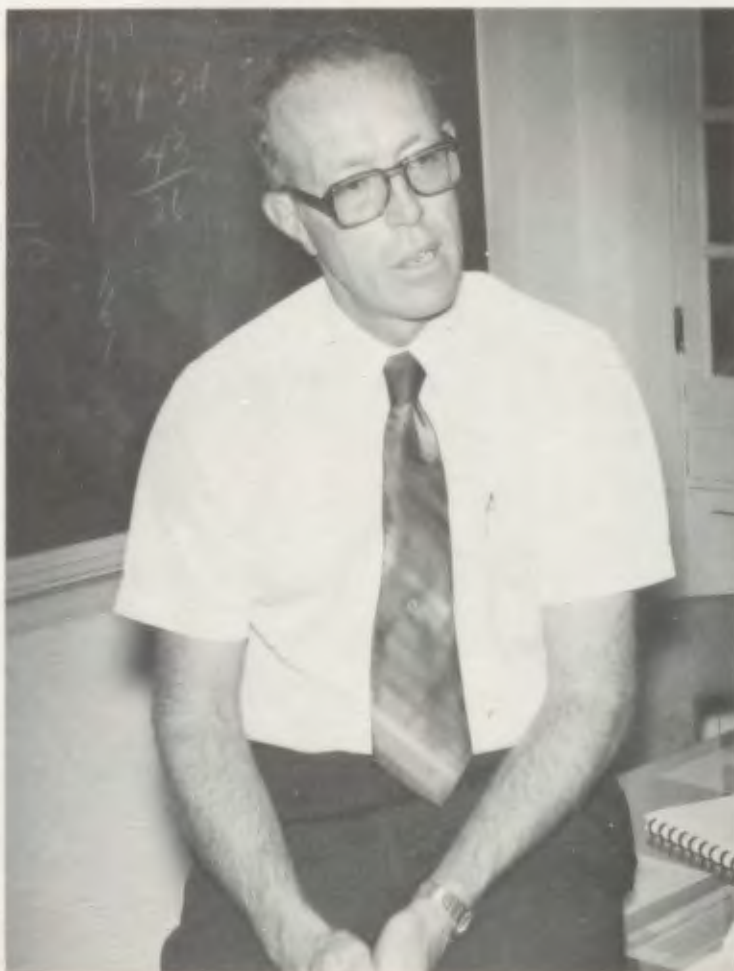

Mr. Breckenridge: Educator And Friend



On the final day of 1982, Ottumwa and OHS lost a great educator and a great man. Robert E. Breckenridge was much more than just a math teacher. Besides writing curriculum for high school math courses and attempting to get a computer program here, for which a memorial has been established in his name, Breckenridge was involved in such activities as the Marine Corps in Korea, a member of the Williard Street United Methodist Church, on the board of Iowa American Federation of Teachers, vice-president of the Ottumwa Federation of Teachers and a 25 year member of the Iowa Academy of Math and Science Teachers.

He received his math and science degree in 1958 at Parsons College in Fairfield, and his Master's at N.E. Missouri State University.

He was always proud to talk about his students, which he referred to as "kids who make things happen." Although he seemed a bit rough at times, it paid off for his students academically.

He began his teaching career as a Marine Corps drill instructor in the 1950's. In 1958 he was hired as a ninth grade math teacher by the Ottumwa School district. Ten years later he moved to the high school, where he became the math department head.

He said, "I never really worried whether they (the students) liked me or not, only that I get their respect." Our respect? Yes, Mr. Breckenridge, you have our respect, our admiration, and our regret at losing a talented friend so soon.

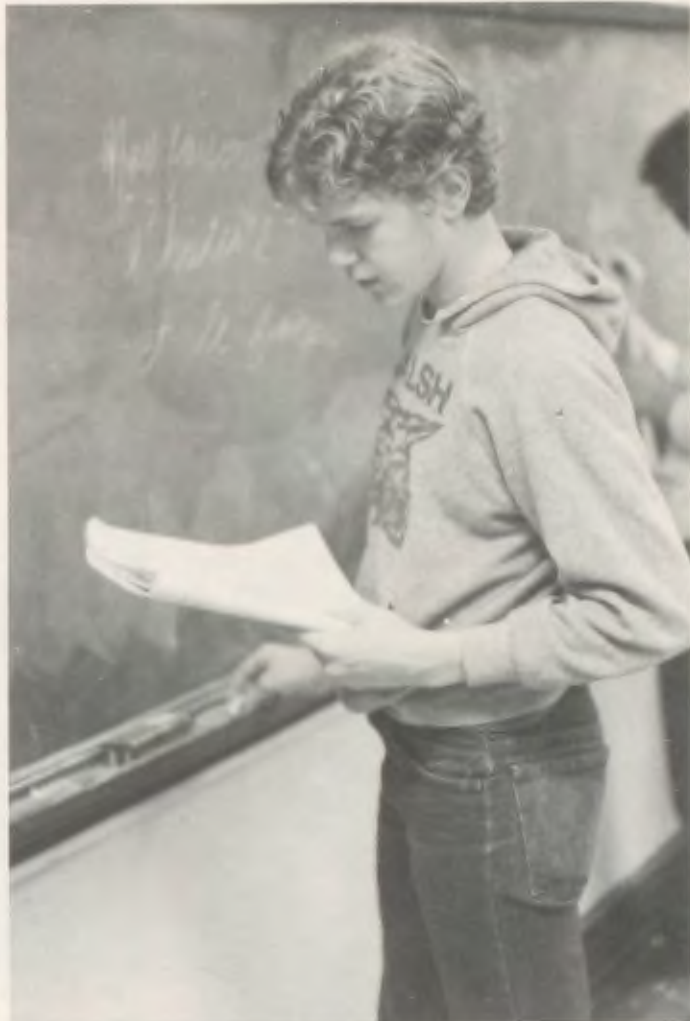
