### In Flood Area Get Typhoid Shots

Charles Silard gave typhoid shots to 250 persons at Pacific Junction on Friday night.

A series of three shots is recommended for the individual who has not had immunization within the last five years.

The second shot of the series was given Friday at the P. J. School and the third will be given on Monday.

Silard said he obtained the vaccine on his own last week, but the emergency involved, but a rest of the supply will be from the State Board of Health.

Those who did not get their family physician's shots were also given a shot of those in the flood areas or family physicians, it was reported.

### Health Measures Advised In Area

Iowa State Department of Health has issued a bulletin advising measures of flooded areas.

Those who have incurred puncture wounds or skin abrasions should be protected against tetanus.

Those who have been in flood areas should be advised to obtain typhoid shots.

Most interested parties are agreed that the creek should be cleaned out immediately to prevent a repeat performance of last week's disaster. All are agreed that such a project would be costly.

## National Airport Plan Now Includes Glenwood

Glenwood is one of 14 Iowa communities recommended for new general aviation (airplane) airports in the Federal Aviation Administration's National Airport Plan for 1968-1971, it was revealed this week.

This is the first step toward receiving federal matching funds for airport construction. Being included in the plan means that Glenwood is eligible to receive federal funds for the purchase of land, construction of runways, taxiways, and other facilities.

The National Airport Plan, which is a joint project of the Federal Aviation Administration and the Department of Transportation, is a plan for the development of airports in the United States.

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## Flood Clean-Up Goes

### Red Cross On Job Here To Give Aid To Flood Victims

Food, shelter, clothing, medical assistance—whatever a family requires immediately to carry on its life—those words describe the emergency phase of Red Cross assistance, according to Mrs. Elizabeth O'Rourke, case worker supervisor in Glenwood's Red Cross disaster headquarters at the Fire Station.

Thus far, most families have been sheltered by relatives and friends. For some, Red Cross provided cots and blankets to handle the extra persons in homes. For a few others, Red Cross has provided shelter or will pay rent in public lodging until the families are able to return to their homes.

In the way of food, women of Pacific Junction banded together quickly and started cooking and serving meals in the Red Cross canteen in the city hall.

As the clean-up work steps up, it's expected that more meals will be served each day. As long as the need for food exists, the Red Cross disaster operation will remain open, stated Mrs. O'Rourke.

In addition to meals, Red Cross provided cleaning supplies for families—brooms, mops, detergent, disinfectant—were distributed to families on Friday. This, too, will continue as long as families require these materials. Comfort kits filled with personal toiletries, soap, toothbrush, razor, and other items have also been distributed to affected families.

As emergency needs are met, Red Cross swings into the major portion of its work. At the clean-up jobs, the meals and comfort kits, the clothing provided, the money given, and Red Cross recovery assistance will be provided as an outright gift to help affected families get back on their feet.

### Emergency Funds Asked For Farmers

The Mills county disaster committee met Tuesday night to apply for emergency Agricultural Conservation Program funds to repair terraces, drainage ditches and other works which suffered flood damage.

Farmers who have been hard-hit by flood waters, if unable to obtain loans from the Federal Farm Credit Administration, may make application for long-term, low interest loans through the Farm and Home Administration.

Deputy Sheriff of the Soil Conservation office in Malvern each Tuesday from 10 to 11 a.m. and farmers seeking to obtain a loan could contact him at this office.

The Small Business Administration Wednesday opened an office in the council chambers at City Hall to receive applications for long-term, low-interest loans from Mills county home-owners and businessmen who suffered losses in last week's floods.

The office will be open from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. to interview applicants. It was announced by Conrad E. Lawler, regional director of SBA at Des Moines, who made arrangements for opening the office.

Francis Emery, a staff member of the regional office who inspected the flood damage at Glenwood, Malvern, Pacific Junction and Silver City Saturday, will be in charge of the SBA office at City Hall.

### City To Observe Holiday July 4

Tuesday, July 4, is a closing date on the Glenwood Chamber of Commerce holiday schedule and most offices and business houses will not open.

Courthouse offices and the city clerk's office will be closed. There will be no city or rural mail service from the Post Office and banks of the county will be closed for the day.

### P.J. High Water Slow In Receding; Repairing Levees

Mills county residents hit by the flash floods last week are engaged in a gigantic clean-up and repair task.

Home-owners have been busy cleaning out the mud and debris, sorting out ruined clothing, furniture, waterlogged keepakes and arranging for repair jobs on basement walls which were caved in.

Damage was heavy in Glenwood and Malvern, but it was particularly severe in Pacific Junction. Silver City had little damage. Mayor Dale Harper estimated damage at \$100,000.

### Water Still Deep Wednesday Wrecking on Street which runs north from Main Street toward the home of Mayor Loren Fisher, which markers which were set County Engineer Charles Weber said heavier rains late in May and early in June, coupled with the storm last week, have set the county back a couple of years in road and bridge work.

### As of Tuesday, he added, he knows of 15 bridges in the county which have been washed out. He said road and bridge damage in the county at Pacific Junction and Malvern is the worst in the northern part of the county.

### The county engineer estimated damage to secondary roads and bridges at \$100,000. This includes damage from last week's flooding as well as previous storms.

### In areas where roads badly damaged and washed to the shoulder line are unmarked, we will place markers. If someone would notify our office, the county engineer stated. "Also we would appreciate being notified when markers which we have set have been destroyed or torn down. The markers will be reset if we are notified."

### Loss at LeMere Cleaners and Laundry, which was badly flooded, reportedly has been estimated at more than \$60,000. The loss in supplies such as soap, detergent, cleaning fluids, etc., has been estimated at \$15,000. The firm lost four trucks.

### The State School did some of the laundry work at the institu- tion laundry while the local firm was inoperative because of high water.

### Wood's Company A. Iowa National Guard, suffered heavy losses at the army. Records were extensively damaged.

### Hail Ruins Crops In Some Sections

Severe damage from hail was reported Tuesday night in the Silver City area and also an area north of Malvern.

Crops were damaged and windows were broken in many homes from the hail and high wind.

Silver City received about two inches of hail along with the hail.

Emil Knickman, who lives north of Silver City, said his soybeans and corn were wiped out. The Buch of south of Silver City also reported his crops were ruined.

Others who live north of Malvern, reported heavy damage.

A severe hailstorm hit the Bartlett area about 4 o'clock Tuesday afternoon, leaving many fields of corn and soybeans.

## 162 to 74 Vote in Favor of Staggered Council Terms

Only 237 Glenwood residents went to the polls Tuesday for a special election, but they voted 162 to 74 in favor of keeping the present method of electing city council members.

The voters were given a choice of "yes" or "no" to the following proposition: "Shall the duration of the terms of the members of the council of the City of Glenwood be changed from four-year staggered terms to two-year terms?"

The vote totals by wards were as follows:

One ballot was spoiled in the first ward, the only ward that favored going back to the method of having all five council terms expire every two years.

The election was called when a petition calling for it, signed by 115 voters, was presented to the city council. It had been predicted that a light vote would favor those who wanted the change, but apparently many of those who signed the petition failed to vote. There was no campaigning either for or against the proposition.

The cost of the election—for judges, clerks, supplies, ballots, rent and setting up the booths—amounted to about \$294, or \$1.25 per vote. The turnout of 237 voters compares with the average of 596 voters for the past six city elections. Well over a thousand are eligible to vote.

This was the second time the proposition had been voted upon in special elections. Because of problems that arose after an all new city council took office on Jan. 1, 1958, the Opinion-Tribune started a campaign to change to the present system of four-year staggered terms to insure that there would always be some experienced men in city government. That election was held on Oct. 3, 1959, with a "Yes" vote that time favoring the staggered terms. With even fewer voters than this time, the results were:

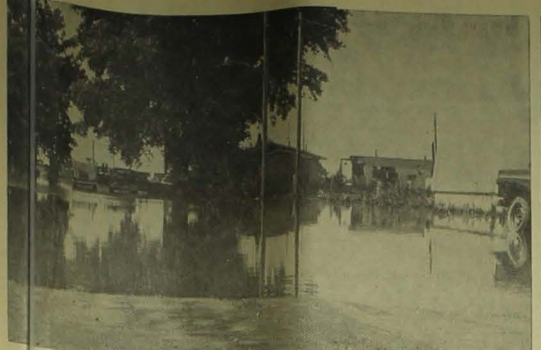
I have never seen such destruction as came to the creek from Dragons down to Mendenhalls. Being on the low end, they bore the brunt of everything that came that way. Raymond Andersons even lost the old swinging bridge that had stood for nearly a century, leaving them with a midget-sized sidewalk they just put across the creek. Not very much for the grandparents to depend on in emergencies.

We who bought places on the rock road several years ago are left with two choices, both through mud, and several have to punch clocks on steady jobs and need the security of a decent road. The day of sitting around ching out a bare living in hill country is past; folks just have to get to jobs to be able to meet the high costs of modern existence as taxes and everything else skyrocket to new heights.

It seems that after 100 years of floods, someone in this brilliant world could decide that water runs down hill—fast—if there is no

place for it to rest. At our place you couldn't tell there had been a storm. Some terracing a few years ago helped most of us up here, and the watershed was planned to help the lowlands—kinda hard to believe as the third generation shovels the mud out of the buildings. Seems like some of them are too trusting while they wait. I believe I would have moved to higher ground in the meantime. Some will never live long enough to see the latest scars etched... in the meantime they will point to the highwater mark on the buildings as of that June night in 1967.

# Dean Kruse Saved By Trees When Car Swept Off Road

The Lord was riding with Dean Kruse during the downpour and flash flooding last week. Kruse, who lives about five miles northeast of Glenwood, was returning home from Council Bluffs where he had visited his wife and new son, Kent Duane.

Around 11 p. m. at a point about a mile north of his home, in a torrential rain, his car was suddenly swept off the road by probably a three or four-foot wall of water coming down a draw.

Recalling his harrowing experience the next day, he said his car "floated" in the high water as it left the road. The vehicle continued in its buoyant state across a field—pushed by a terrific current—until it hit a clump of trees in a deep ravine. (The marks

made the trees by the car's impact are visible.) The ravine is 25 or 30 feet deep.

When the car came to rest momentarily against the trees—probably about 60 yards from the roadway—Kruse crawled out of the car and grabbed the branch of a tree. Just how he got out of the car he doesn't remember exactly.

It was fortunate that he crawled out of the car quickly because the vehicle didn't stay long at the clump of trees. It was swept on down the ravine perhaps another 50 or 60 yards. It came to rest—turned the opposite direction—imbedded in mud and debris with only a few inches of the top visible.

Kruse estimates that he was trapped an hour in the tree— all the while praying. Water

was tumbling off the fields into the ravine "like Niagara Falls."

As he spent what seemed an eternity in the tree, fearing that the water would get higher, he finally observed through an occasional flash of lightning that the high water was receding. He also noticed a nearby tree with limbs that stretched over to the opposite bank of the ravine. Between flashes of lightning, he made it to this tree and to safety on the other side of the ravine.

Then he walked home and went to bed.

It wasn't until the next morning that he realized just how lucky he had been. He is unable to swim so he feels he owes his life to a strategically-placed clump of trees and a handy nearby tree which provided an escape route. And you can't tell him that prayers didn't help.

The young husband and father is also saying a prayer of thanks that his wife and newborn son weren't with him at the time. He brought them home the afternoon following his narrow escape.

His car, of course, is a total loss and the insurance company has advised him to leave it at the bottom of the ravine. Later, he said he may be able to remove it "by using two or three tractors."

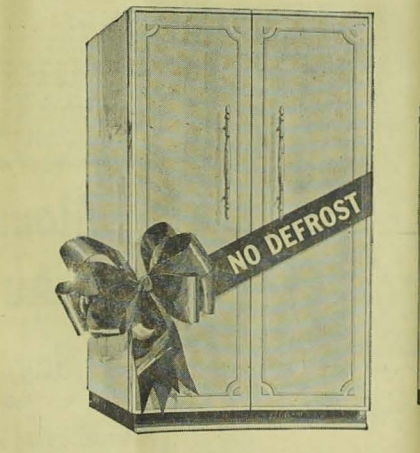

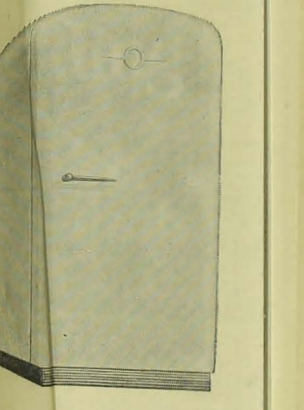

a converter, typewriter, medical examination chest and other items to 75 pairs of shoes and boots.

The water was 28 inches deep in the army at one time, Stone said. Although 10 men were on duty early Wednesday morning after the flood hit, the entire company was called out Wednesday night and served until Saturday.

At times, four officers and 40 men were on duty in the Pacific Junction area.

Work of repairing breaks in the Pony Creek levee north of Pacific Junction began Saturday.

The operations branch of the Army Engineers in Omaha hopes to complete the task by the end of the week.

Although not a Federal levee, the Pony Creek levee is being repaired by the U. S. Corps of Engineers under an emergency measure.

One break was 450 feet long and the other 75 feet. Engineers report that the breaks may have been caused by recent heavy rains.

The flood water from the Pony Creek did not run over the 15-foot levee.

The June 21 flash flood in this area demonstrated again the fine spirit of cooperation between Iowa Power and Light Co. and its customers, according to Fred Harbarger, Iowa Power's Glenwood manager.

"We would like to thank the people of Malvern, Glenwood, Silver City and Pacific Junction for their patience and consideration during this unusual storm and its aftermath."

Harbarger added: "Our customers, who experienced a brief outage early in the morning Tuesday, June 20, can take comfort in the fact that this outage made possible the installation of equipment which doubled the capacity of the Glenwood substation."

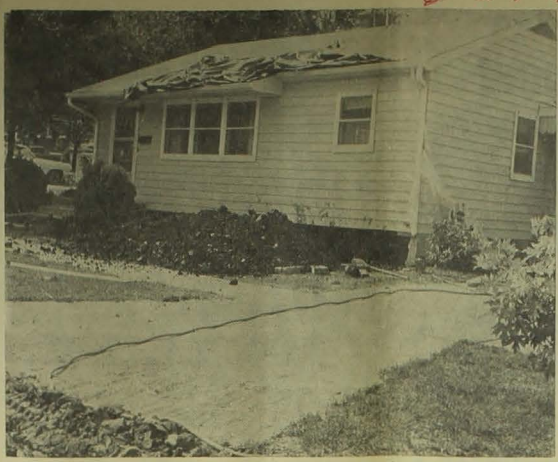

in a nearby state, lost their home and their clothing. The insurance settlement was sufficient to pay off the balance of the mortgage on their home and to enable Mr. B to get a long-term, low-interest loan to rebuild. However, the family did not have the means to obtain furnishings for the home. So Red Cross provided the funds for the needed furniture, utensils, dishes, linens and other household items.

Another family, Mr. and Mrs. A. and their six children lost their home and all its contents in the flood. Their income was seasonal and often not enough to cover regular monthly expenses. The home was mortgaged. The family had other debts in addition to the mortgage.

Mr. and Mrs. A. were able to do some of the cleaning up and some of the unskilled work in rebuilding a home. With no flood insurance though, they had no financial resources to use to recover. In this instance, Red Cross provided needed funds for materials and for skilled labor to rebuild their home. In addition, Red Cross provided the funds for clothing and home furnishings needed by the family.

Mrs. O'Rourke emphasized that Red Cross meets the family's needs. Needs, she explained, are items which families must have to resume their life. To explain how need differs from desire, she cited the case of a retired couple whose eight-room home was wiped out by a tornado.

Red Cross did replace the home for the couple. However, since their family was grown, the need for an eight-room home no longer existed. The home built with Red Cross funds consisted of a living, a dining and a bedroom, plus kitchen and bath. That size home met this family's need.

Registration for flood-affected families will be carried on in two locations in Mills county as long as there is work to be done said Mrs. O'Rourke.

In Glenwood, Red Cross head-

quarters is in the Fire Station at the parking lot level. In Malvern, families will register for assistance in the Community Building.

Mrs. Charles Stinard, Red Cross chapter chairman for Mills county, has been making all the arrangements for setting up the disaster headquarters in Glenwood.

"With the help of Mrs. Stinard and the people of Glenwood, Malvern and Pacific Junction who have volunteered to aid their neighbors through Red Cross, flood-affected families shall recover speedily, I know," said Mrs. O'Rourke.

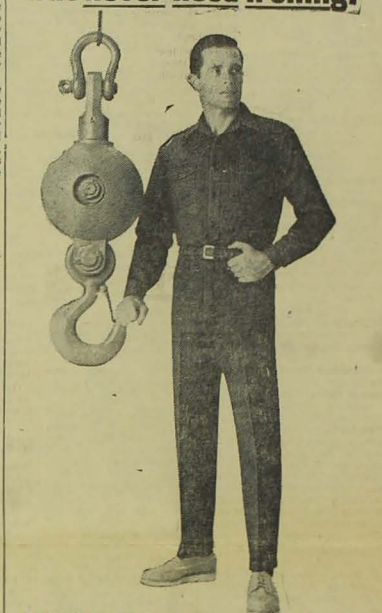

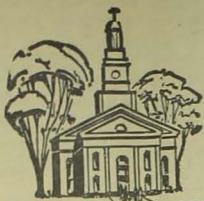
