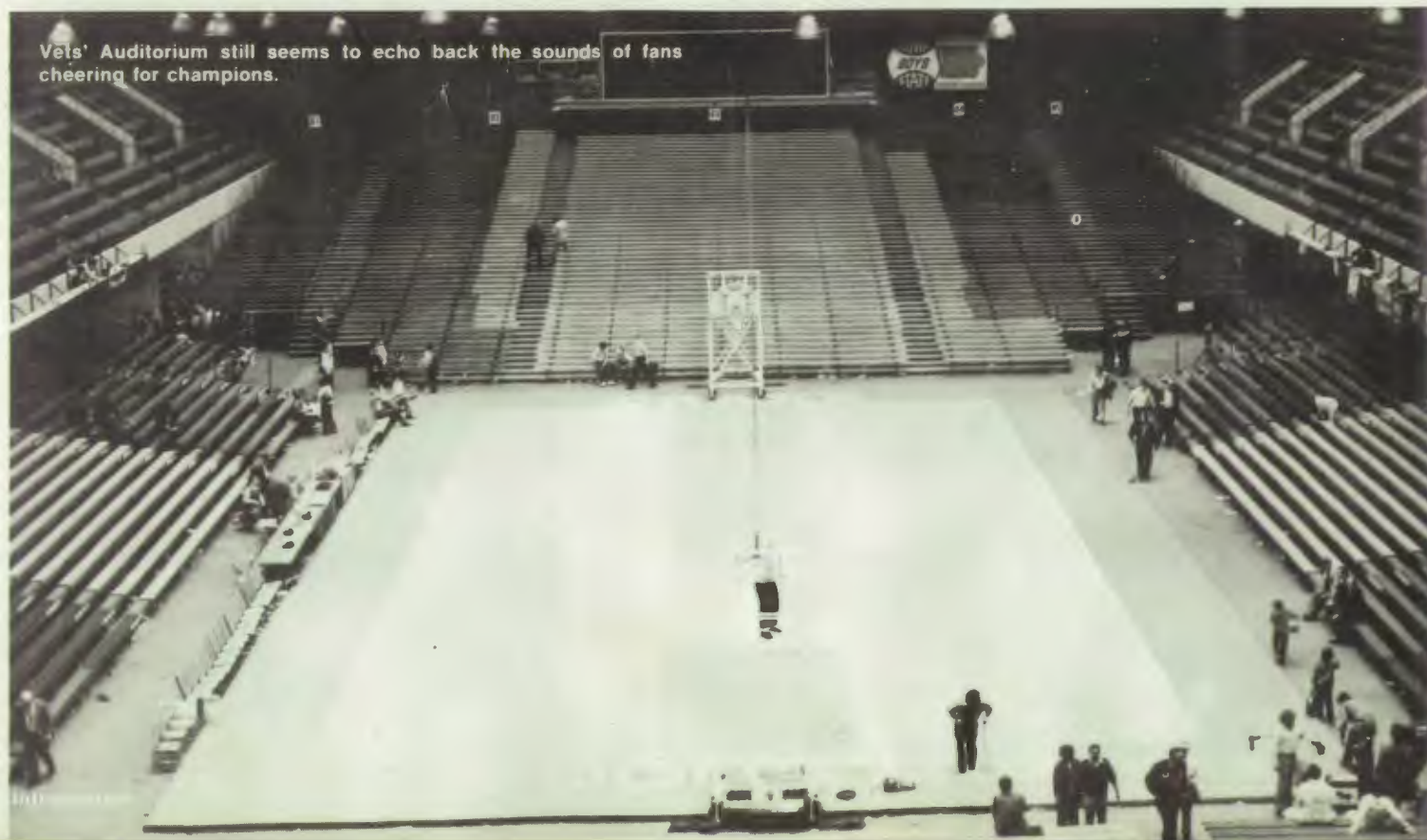

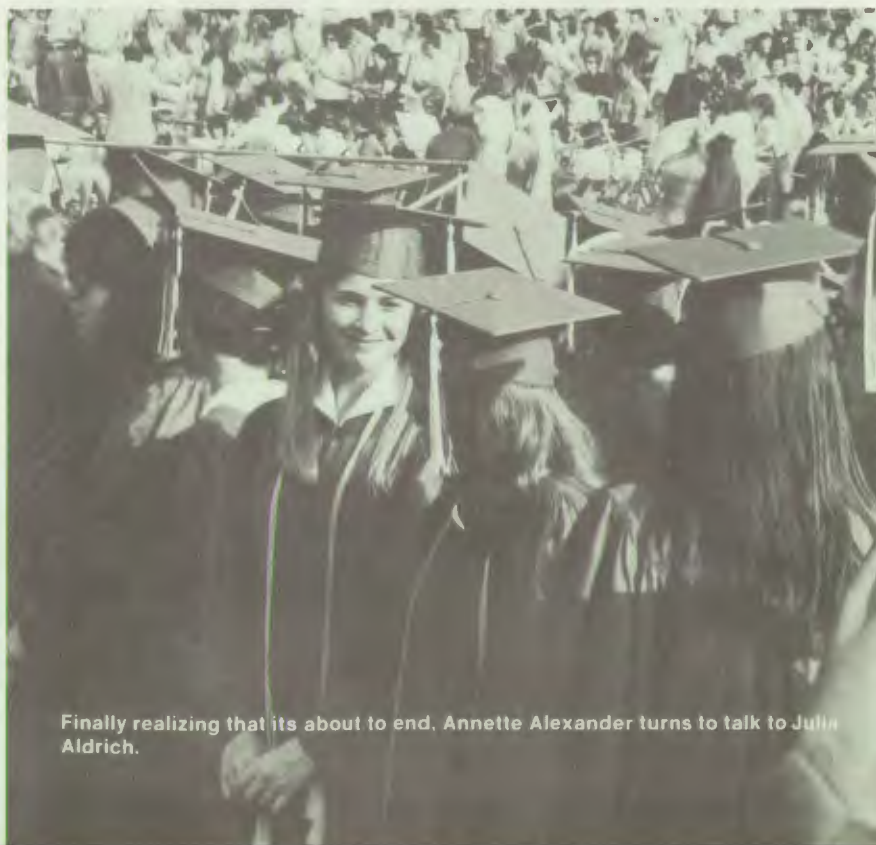

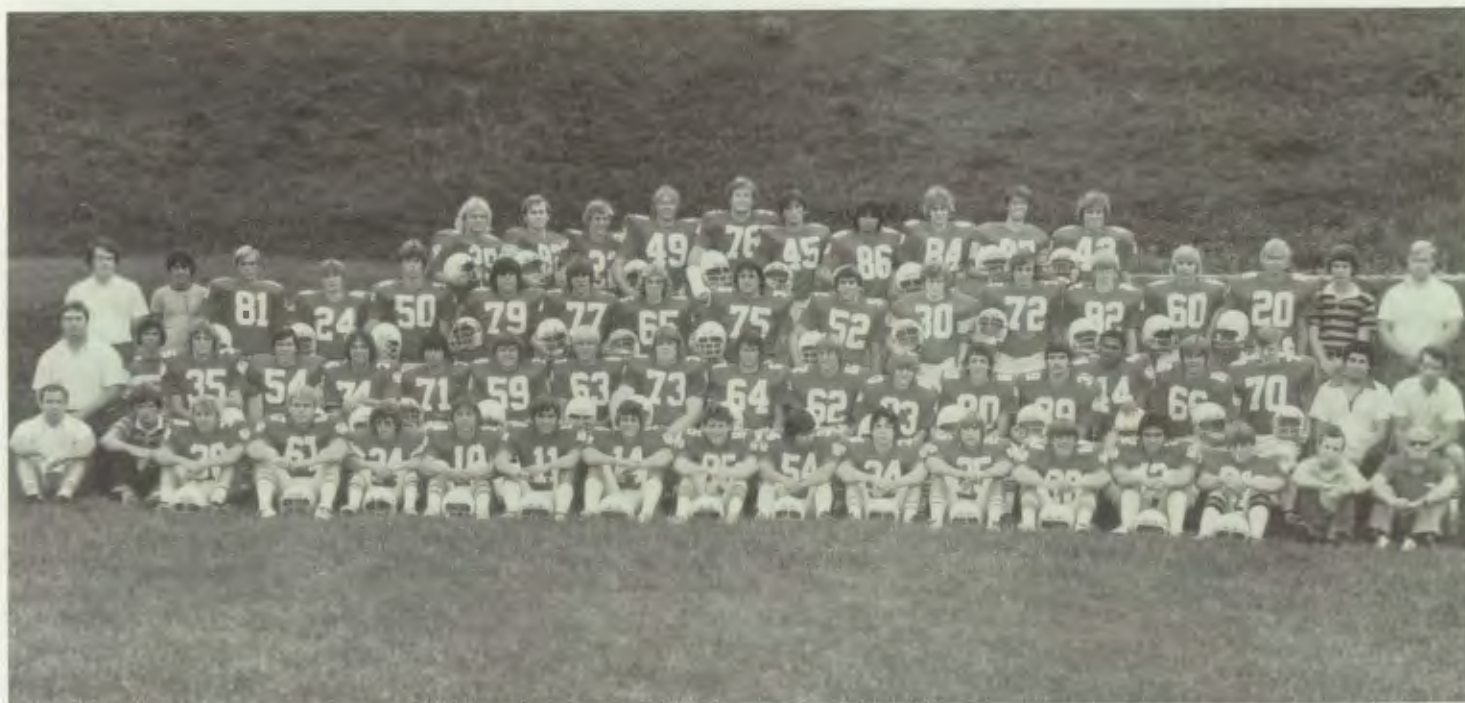
The Captain this year was Steve Cox; Most Improved was Perry O'Brien; and Most Valuable was Bill Mullin.

During the last half of the season, the Bulldogs slipped away as several key injuries and many bad breaks left Ottumwa out in the cold when the chance to win was there. For Ottumwa, the real meaning of football was alive during that instant.

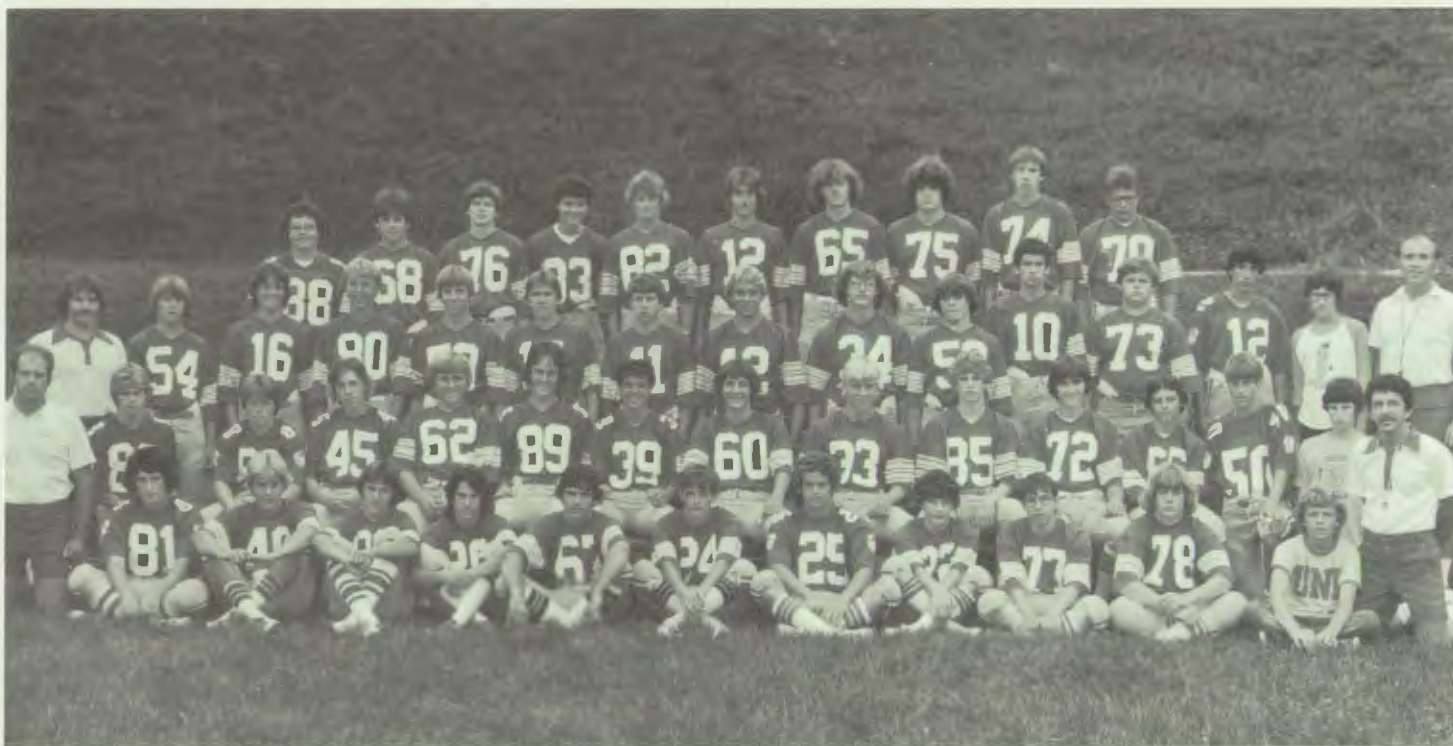

“I’ll meet you at the game about 7:30, O.K.?” Isn’t that the phrase you hear most often the day of a football game? But what about the sophomore game at 5:30?

The Bullpups this year have had their share of empty stands and bad breaks with a 2-6-1 record. Their main error was two hundred more yards of penalties than their opponents, but they still gained more total yards.

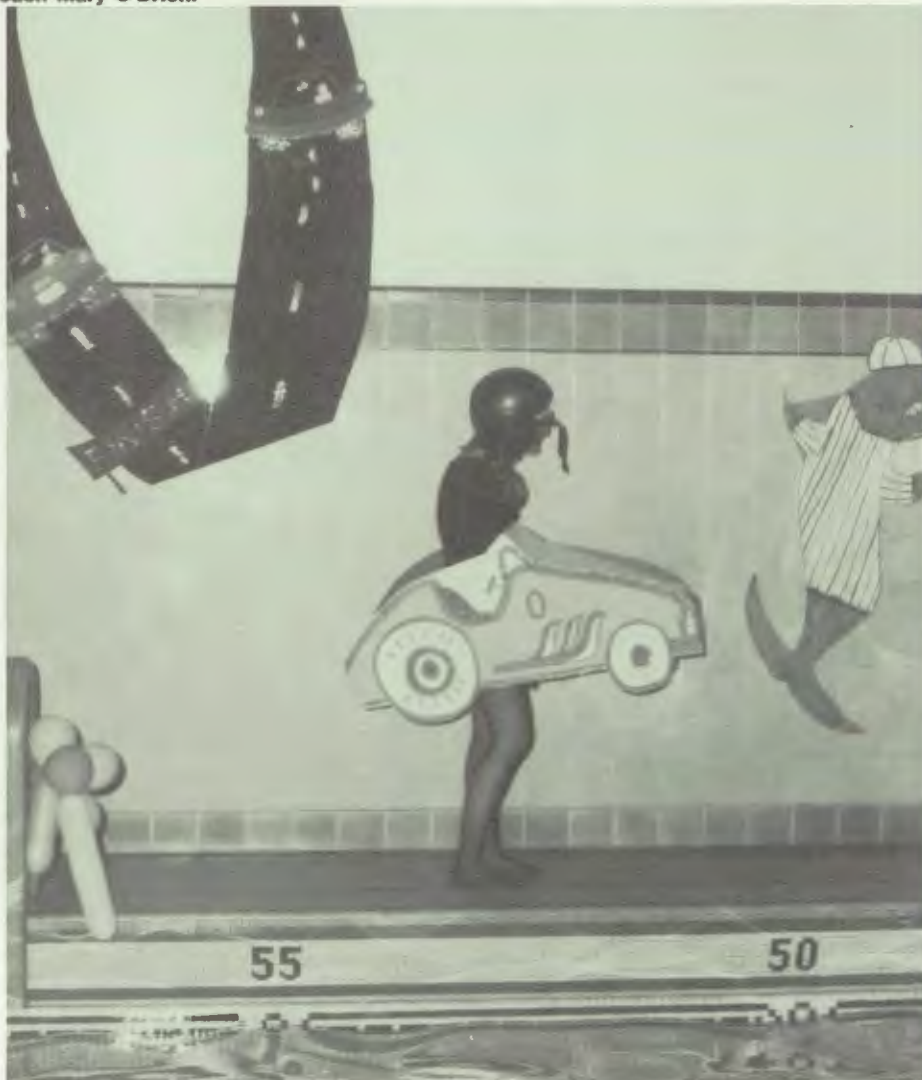

The 1977-78 boys swimming season was in reality two separate seasons. The dual meet season had the look of failure with a 2 and 8 record.

Coach Mike McWilliams characterized the season as "an unmitigated disaster. We had enough illness and injury to fill a floor in St. Joseph's Hospital."

The championship season looked like it might go the same way. Bruce McGiverin broke a finger and Craig Bauerle caught the Russian flu. At district, the medley relay and one individual were disqualified. Also at district, Dan Barr hit the diving board but still finished ninth, despite his injury.

The next week at the state tournament, the seniors turned the whole season around in one meet. Craig Bauerle qualified 18th and finished 7th in the 50-yard. Curt Zimmerman qualified 12th and 8th and finished 6th and 5th in the IM and butterfly. Zimmerman also broke the individual medley record, tied his record in the 100-yard butterfly and also broke two school records in the free relay.

Also at the state tournament, Bruce McGiverin led off the relay team with a 49.1 time, sophomore Bub Fletcher finished 50.7, Craig Bauerle swam a 50.4, and Curt Zimmerman became the first swimmer since 1974 to make the Bulldog Hall of Fame by swimming a 48.8 to help the team finish 9th.

With many sophomores and juniors returning next year, the boys swimming team should repeat the fine showing at the state tournament.

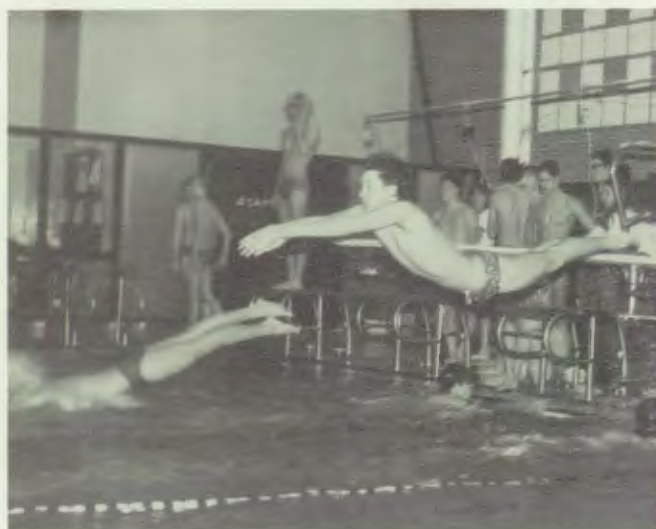

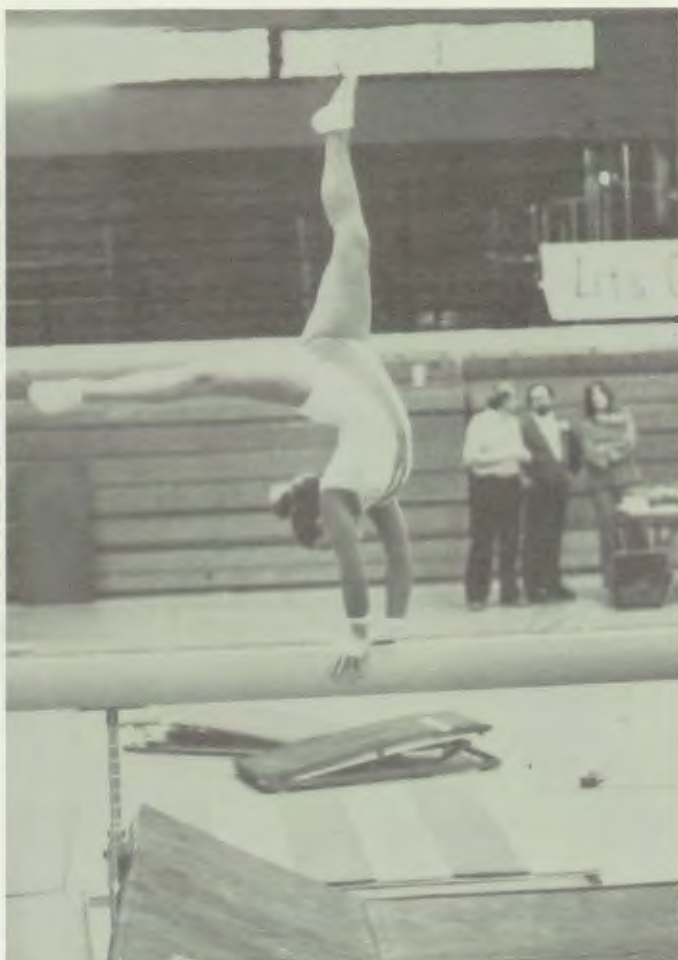

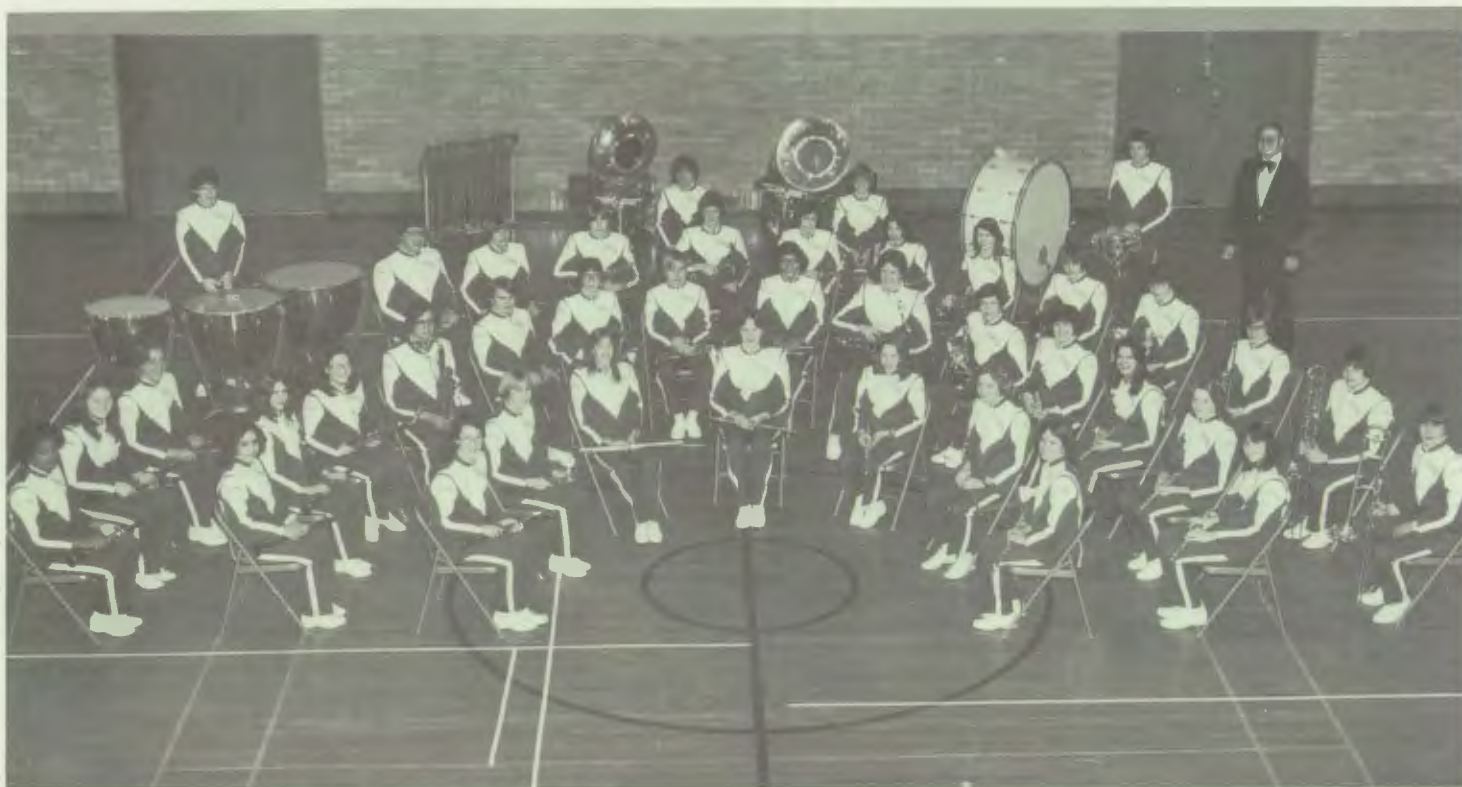

The Argus News is the school tabloid newsmagazine, published monthly for the first time in 1977-78. It is an 8-page paper and received first place awards from the Columbia Scholastic Press Association for the last two years. It also received an "outstanding" rating from the IHSPA in 1977.

Argus News staff members run the paper like a small business: selling ads, designing and making up ads, planning assignments, setting the type, taking all pictures, and supervising all make-up of pages for each issue.

Staff members this year attended the IHSPA state convention at Drake University, the Editors Day at the Capitol, and workshops at the University of Iowa.

The staff is large with 42 members. Each editor has their own staff, all under the supervision of Karen Long, Argus News editor, and Joan Thompson, Adviser.

The OHS Speech and Debate Team is a competitive unit with a season that begins in late October and ends in mid-March. Competing with a majority of underclassmen who continued to improve as the year progressed, the 1977-78 season proved to be a very successful one.

The 24 member Debate Team won 14 team awards at major invitational tournaments and at the conclusion of the regular season was ranked number three on the State Debate Poll.

At District IHSSA competition, two of three OHS teams qualified for the State Tournament. At the National Forensic League Qualifying Tournament the championship teams led OHS to a fourth place finish. OHS then was the only school to put three teams in the quarterfinals of the Iowa Forensic League State Tournament, and the team of Seniors Debra Fear and Susan Heise finished in third place.

This now brings to 11 the number of consecutive years that OHS debate has been ranked in the top five in Iowa (1967-78). This outstanding record includes four state titles, three runner-ups and three third place finishes.

Senior Susan Heise received the Double Distinction Degree from the National Forensic League. Debra Fear was nominated for the Hugh Seabury Award (an IFL award for excellence in Iowa Debate), and Kevin Caster received the Charles Bookin Memorial Award presented each year to the outstanding OHS Senior debater.

There are twenty different events in speech

competition during the year, including Interpretation, Acting, and Public Speaking in individual events and Duet Acting, Choral Reading, Reader's Theater and Mime in group event. Thirty-four students represented OHS in Speech this season.

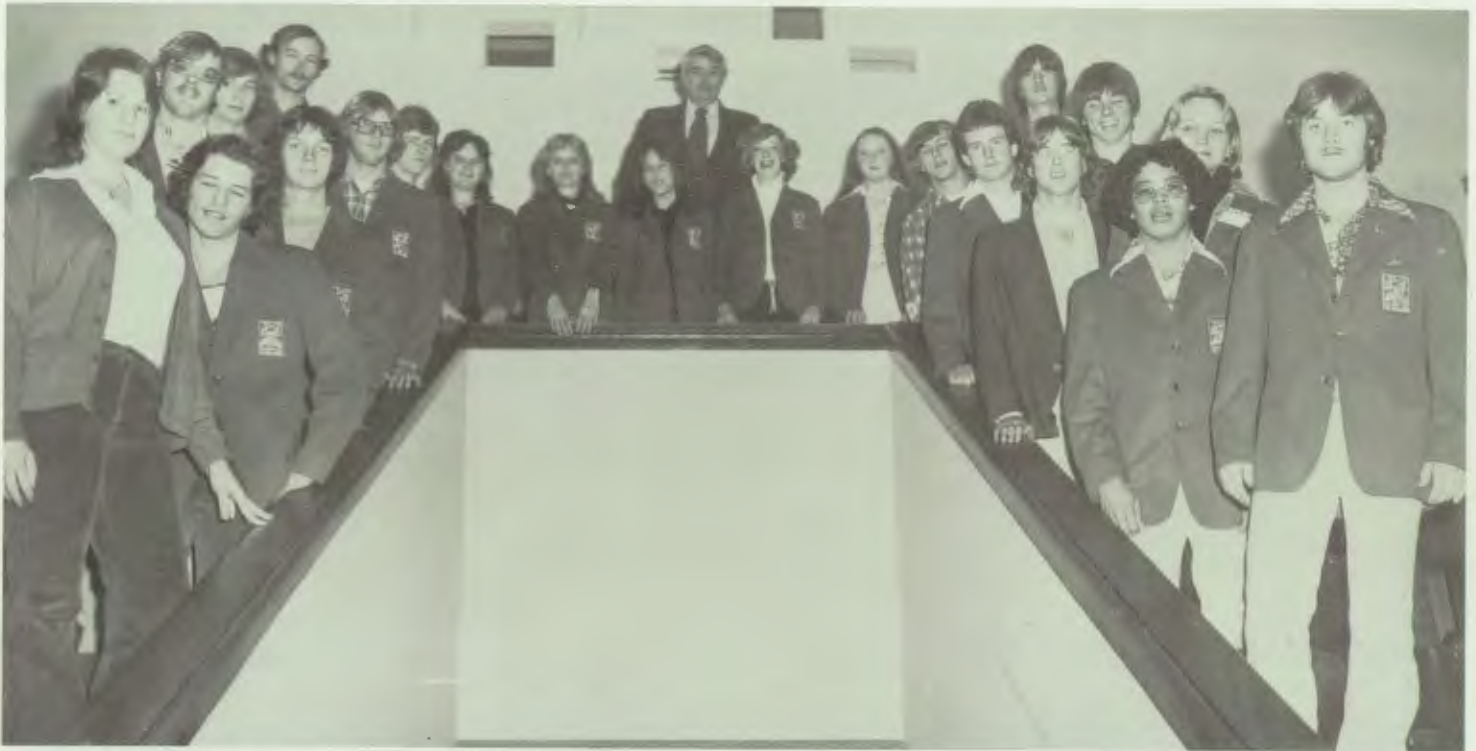

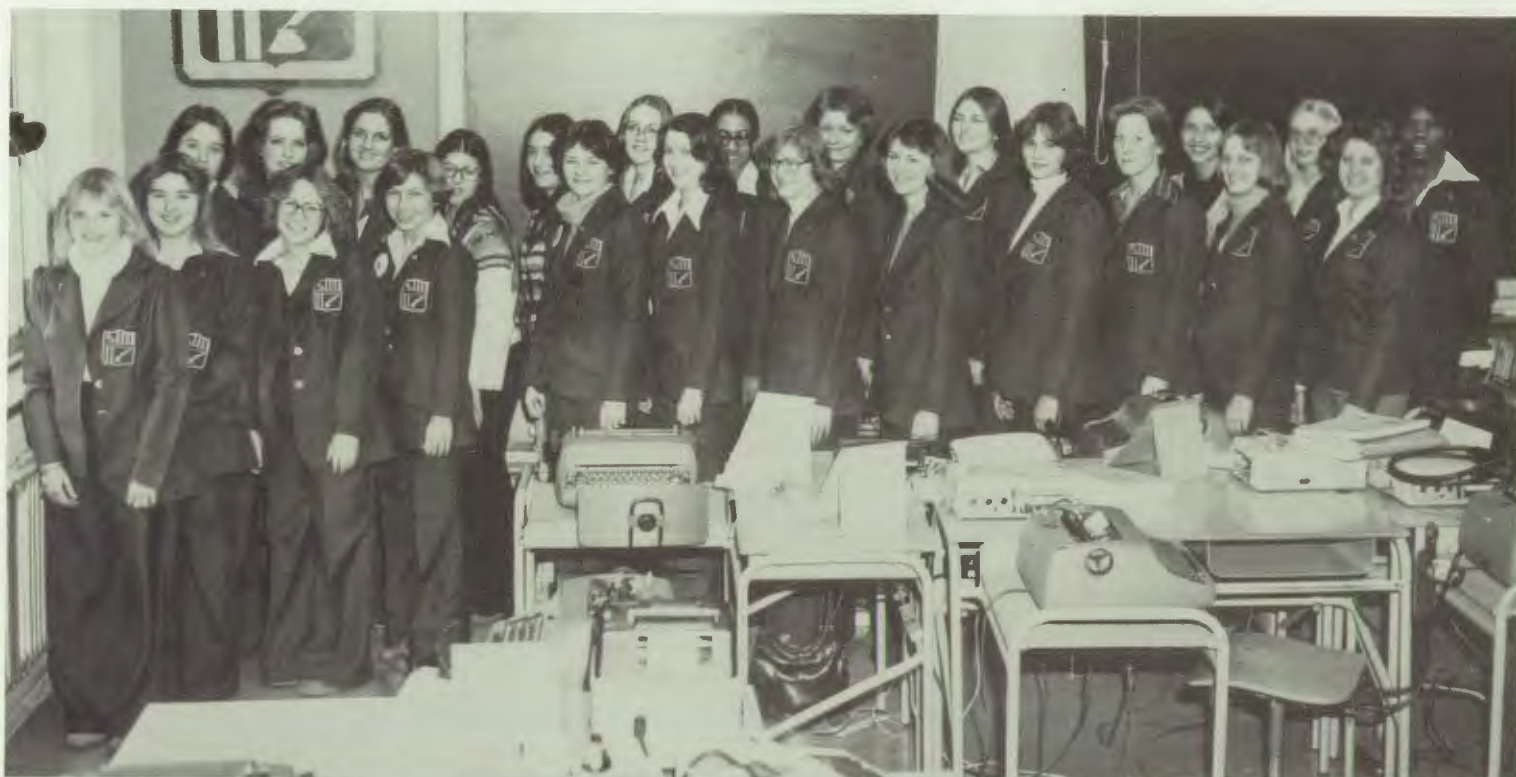
