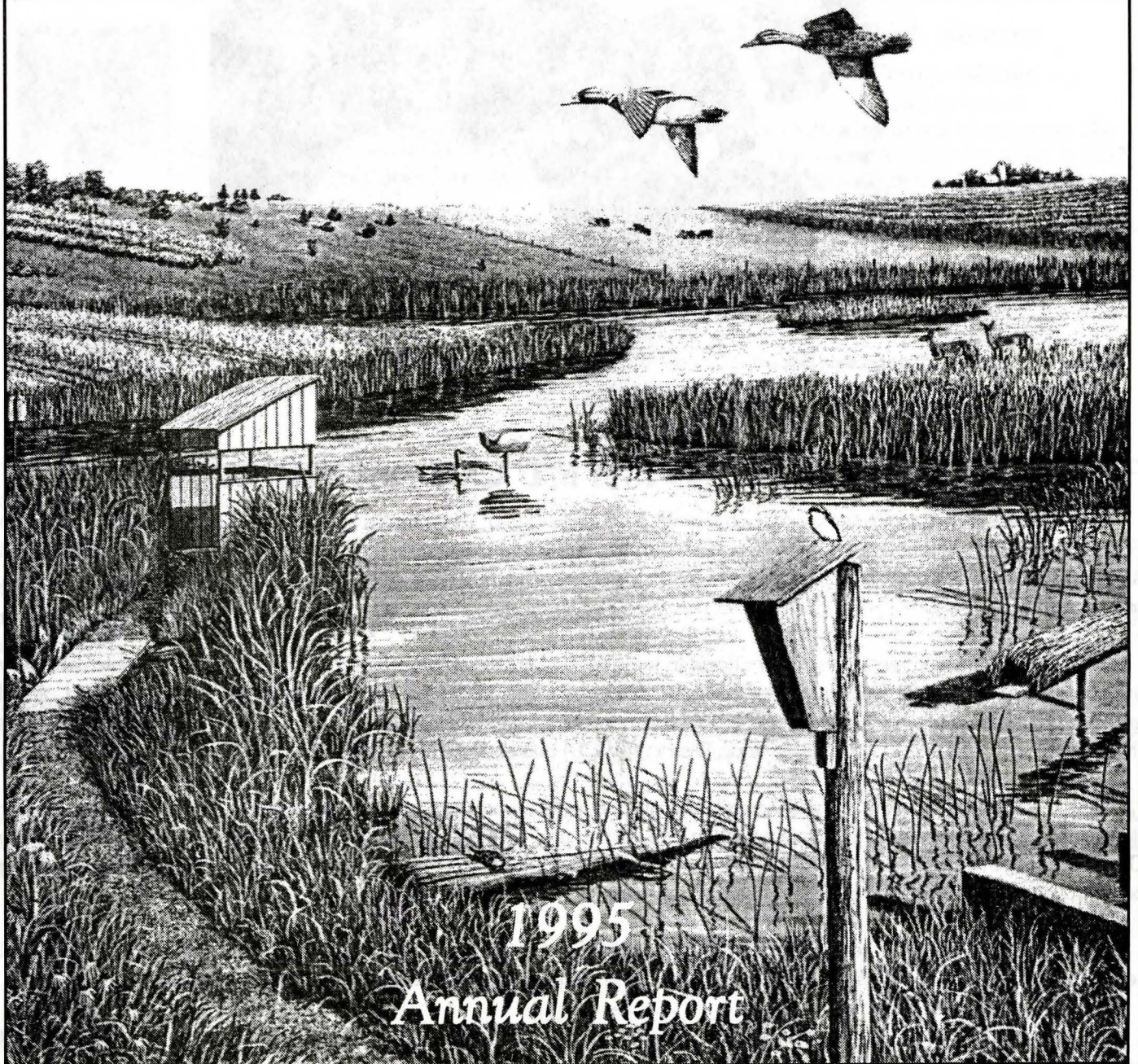

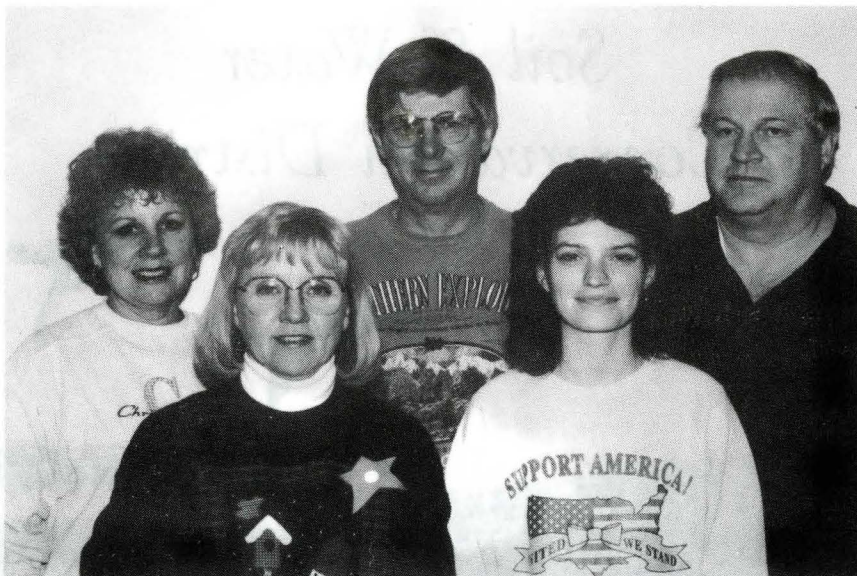

Dick Stille, District Conservationist

It seems like everything in the world is changing these days. One of the changes you've noticed is the name of our agency. For nearly 60 years we were the Soil Conservation Service, but now the agency is the Natural Resources Conservation Service. It's the same agency, same people. Our mission of the agency has changed, too. Now we are concerned with all natural resources, not just soil.

Another change is to reemphasize our efforts in information and education programs. The objective is to reach and serve a broader part of the public, beyond landowners and operators. This expanded report is an example of that effort. Another example is the planning done to establish outdoor classrooms at both Malvern schools. A regular newsletter combining efforts of the Mills County Soil and Water Conservation District (SWCD) and area agencies is also "in the works".

One thing not changing in the widespread dedication to natural resource conservation in Mills County is the fine conservation ethic in our county. This was evident back in 1941 when the Mills County SWCD was organized by people like Sy Wearin. Other evidence includes Mule Creek Watershed, one of the first PL-566 watersheds organized in the nation and the first to begin construction. The PL-566 watershed program remains active today in Mills County.

The dedication to natural resource conservation in Mills County is carried on today by people like Albert Washburn. He has served Mills County SWCD continuously for 38 years and continues as an Assistant Commissioner today.

So even though we see lots of changes like agency names, support and dedication to natural resource conservation continues unchanged in Mills County.

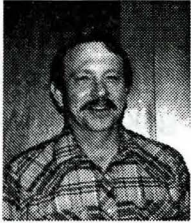

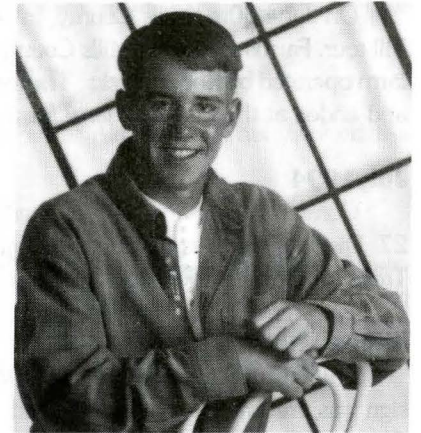


Clint Roenfeldt

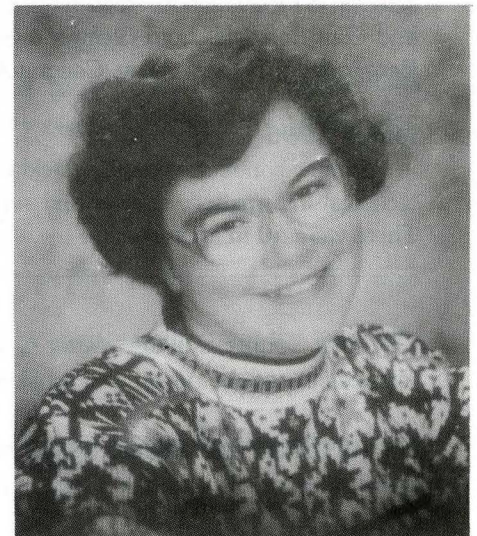


Jill Bergantzel

District Activities

June 1994

On June 30th, Mills County, in conjunction with East Pottawattamie, held a No-Till tour. Farms viewed in Mills County were McGrew Farms and the Emma Brammier farm operated by Robert Hicks. The tour participants traveled on to East Pottawattamie and ended at the Ed Keast farm for a catered barbecue.

July1994

Commissioners and staff manned a booth at the Mills County Fair during July 23-27. Displays were set up and prizes given away included a hand level, contour gauge, Trees for Conservation book and a residue measuring kit.

August 1994

The District honored Herman Stortenbecker as "Farmer of the Year". A special sign was presented for his homestead. Herman was also honored by the Lions Club of Glenwood.

The fall terrace layout was one of the busiest seasons ever for Mills County. Over 330,000 feet of terraces were laid out and only seven jobs carried over until spring.

December 1994

On December 6, one of the snowiest days of winter, Mills County SWCD held a Farmer Appreciation Day. The commissioners selected 100 outstanding conservation farmers in Mills County to receive a pewter ornament and other "thank you" items. Coffee and rolls were served. The office staff set up a Christmas tree with all the names of recipients and some of the ornaments to be displayed at the local "Festival of Trees" and in the office through the season.

January 1995

In January, a dinner and open house were held for Albert Washburn. Albert retired after 37 years of service as commissioner including 25 as chairman. He will continue to serve as an assistant commissioner. Replacing him is Ruth Stevens, former state clerk for 25 years. Our quality review was conducted by Ed Marshall from the area office.

February 1995

A lady landowners and partners meeting was held with approximately 30 in attendance. Presenters were representatives from CFSA, NRCS, Extension and a farm manager. The meeting was highly successful. The commissioners implemented a brand new outreach program by offering scholarships to area seniors. Four students were selected to receive scholarships in the amount of \$250. Those students are Lisa Tackett and Clint Roenfeldt from Glenwood School, Jeffrey Wyant of Fremont Mills and Jill Bergantzel of Nishna Valley. Congratulations to all!

April 1995

A four county technician meeting was held in Malvern in order to standardize delivery of services across county lines. Technicians from Fremont, Page, Montgomery and Mills attended. The late spring made for a late spring layout season. Thirty-three status reviews were completed.

June 1995

The entire staff attended a two day camp out at Aldersgate. This involved the entire area of twenty-one counties.

July 1995

District Conservationist, Dick Stille, attended two days of wetland training at Ames. Our fair booth theme was "Celebrate the Land" designed to emphasize the huge conservation effort of the past 10 years. A live Colorado Blue Spruce, a child's T-shirt and an adult T-shirt were some of the door prizes. J.F. (Sy) Wearin was presented the "Conservation Farmer of the Year Award".

August 1995

The National Soil and Water Conservation Society Meeting was held in Des Moines this year. Bonnie Pierce and Linda Seipold attended for two days serving as Emergency Medical Technicians. Rich Maaske attended two weeks of training in Total Quality Management to become an area facilitator.

September 1995

All technicians attended an area technician's meeting in Council Bluffs to aid in uniformity of terrace layout in the area. Dick Stille and Belinda Greene attended a sub area meeting in Atlantic. Technicians assisted the Malvern High School with plans to revamp the mowed campus including establishing natural areas and promoting conservation education.

October 1995

Work begins on "Project Renaissance" at the Glenwood State Hospital School. This project's long range plan is to bring all the ground under school supervision into a managed care program to minimize maintenance, conserve soil and reestablish natural areas. October was extremely busy with terracing as the weather cooperated with construction. Repair work started last July was finished on four structure sites in the Waubonsie Creek Watershed.

November 1995

FOCS training for the entire staff. This is brand new software system for the computer that makes all offices across the country uniform.

December 1995

Cost share rules were reviewed and several changes were made. These include cost sharing on topsoil and summer cost share raised to 60% to encourage more participation in that program.

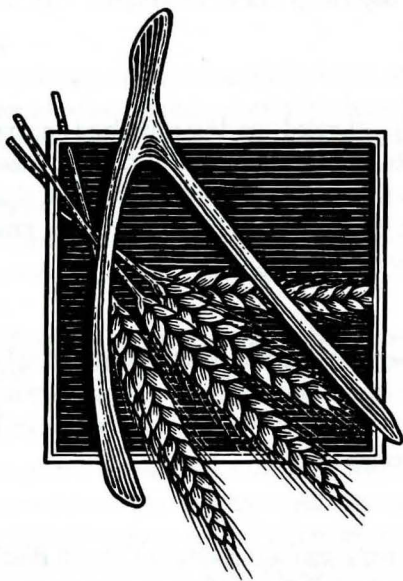
REAP Funding Available

Mills County Soil and Water Conservation District applied for special project funding under the Resource Enhancement and Protection (REAP) Act. The special project is the area that drains onto the Wabash Trace Nature Trail. The purpose is to treat the area with terraces to reduce runoff and erosion. This is a large drainage area covering about 32,000 acres in Mills County.

All regular cost share program rules will apply to this sign up. Please come in and check the map of the Trace Watershed Area. The area covered is not only land adjacent to the trail but a large section of Silver Creek Northeast to Malvern extending into Indian Creek and Anderson Townships. There is also a large part of Deer Creek included in the Watershed.

Remember to stop in to the Mills County Soil and Water Conservation Office and check into special funding available. Sign up will be taken anytime.

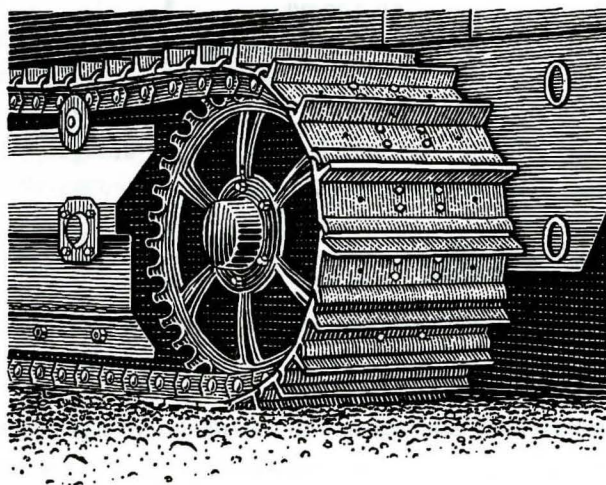

The Challenge of Water Quality Protection

Congratulations on another fine year of soil and water conservation program achievements in Mills County. In reviewing the list of accomplishments for the year, it is obvious that land owners share a commitment for protection of their soil and water resources, with commissioners and staff of the district who are working to assist them in their efforts.

Historically, soil and water conservation districts across the state worked with farmers to install structures and management practices for their land to protect their soil from erosion. In doing that, we knew that improvements in water quality were occurring, but the principal objective was soil resource protection. However, over the last seven years, districts have been broadening their assistance to farmers to include more practices and management aimed at providing off-site protection of water quality. Water quality protection has become an equally important objective for farmers and districts.

Many of our districts have had remarkable success in the area of water quality protection, and Mills SWCD can be counted as one of the best. The record is clear. The district is providing more assistance than ever before, and increasing the diversity of its program assistance to farmers.

The Mills SWCD has been actively involved in the Waubonsie Creek Watershed project. This project demonstrates the commitment of farmers to profitable agriculture and a quality environment, while protecting the infrastructure of much of Mills County as well.

Good News in Conservation in Iowa

More progress has been made in resource conservation in Iowa recently than at any other time in history. That shows that Iowans are proud of their land and are committed to conservation. Each day, the conservation efforts of farmers are more evident.

There are more trees, more wildlife habitat, more wetlands, more land protected with conservation tillage practices, more grass, more land protected with a variety of conservation measures - in general more natural resource care in Iowa than at any time in recent history. The progress that has been made has truly been at a record pace. Lester Brown of the World Watch Institute has said that the reduction of soil erosion may well be the most dramatic success story of this decade.

Soil erosion in Iowa has been cut 35 percent recently, the state's farmers lead the nation in many aspects of wetlands restoration, and there are many, many examples of conservation progress by farmers in the state.

Now there's an opportunity to help private landowners make the 53,000 acres of cropland scheduled to be restored to wetlands through the USDA's Wetlands Reserve Program and the Emergency Wetlands Reserve Program the best they can be for wildlife, personal enjoyment, education and other purposes. The Natural Resources Conservation Service hopes to team up with environmental organizations, schools, civic organizations, agricultural organizations and others interested in bringing wetlands back to Iowa. Outside groups will be asked to "adopt" a wetland and put practices on it that will attract wildlife, songbirds, waterfowl, frogs, turtles and other animals. The activity could also increase educational opportunities for schools, or just beautify the area with wildflowers, trees and shrubs.

NRCS is looking forward to next year. Yes, there will be some challenges as a new Farm Bill will be passed, but the natural resources in Iowa continue to improve and as more people get involved in conservation efforts, as conservation work on the land continues to build, it will be increasingly evident that the conservation ethic is alive and well in Iowa.

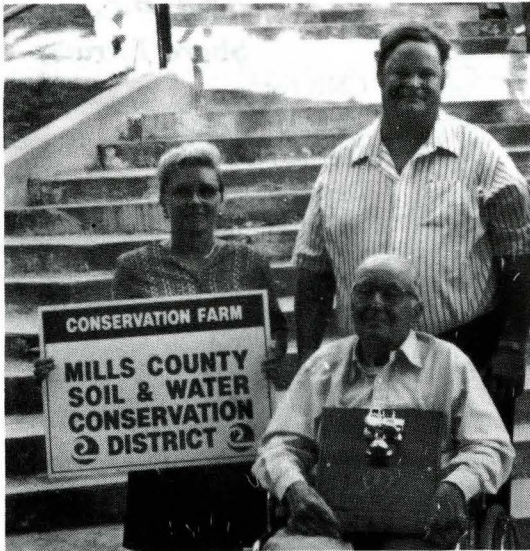

The commissioners of Mills County Soil and Water Conservation District are proud to name J.F. (Sy) Wearin as Conservationist of the Year. In 1941, Sy was elected as one of the first three district commissioners in the newly formed district. He served from 1941 to 1957. During his term, the commissioners sponsored the First Annual Plow Terrace Contest in 1942. In 1946, they hosted the National Plow Contest with over 20,000 people in attendance. Sy realized that the first job had to be education and nothing was better than seeing conservation on the land. The first terraces on his farm were constructed over 50 years ago with a plow and are still effective today. Since that time, he has added thousands of feet of terraces, waterways, crop rotation and residue management to give his farming operation a total resource system. As a result of Sy's efforts and commitment to soil conservation, Mills County residents will benefit for generations to come.
