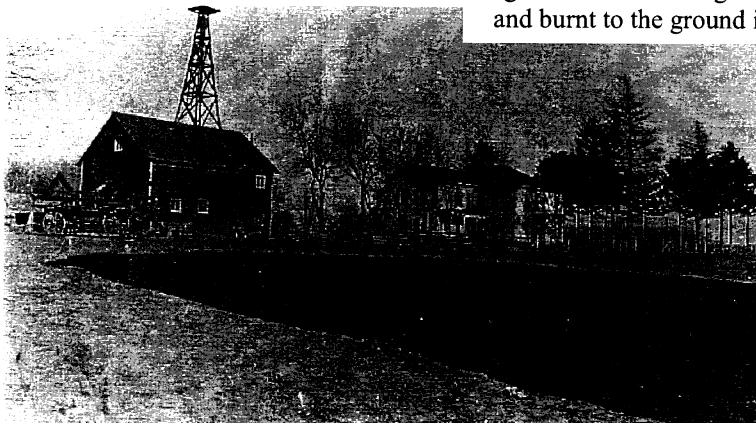

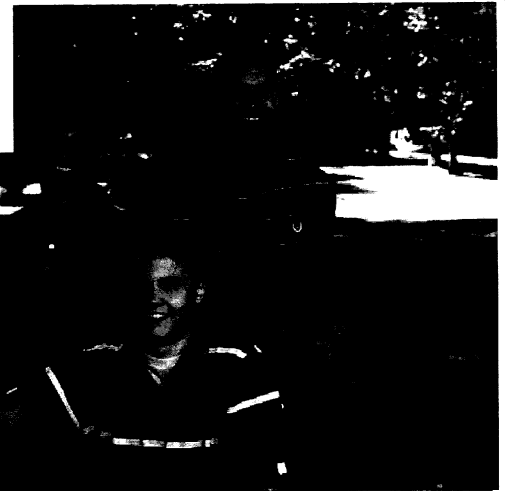

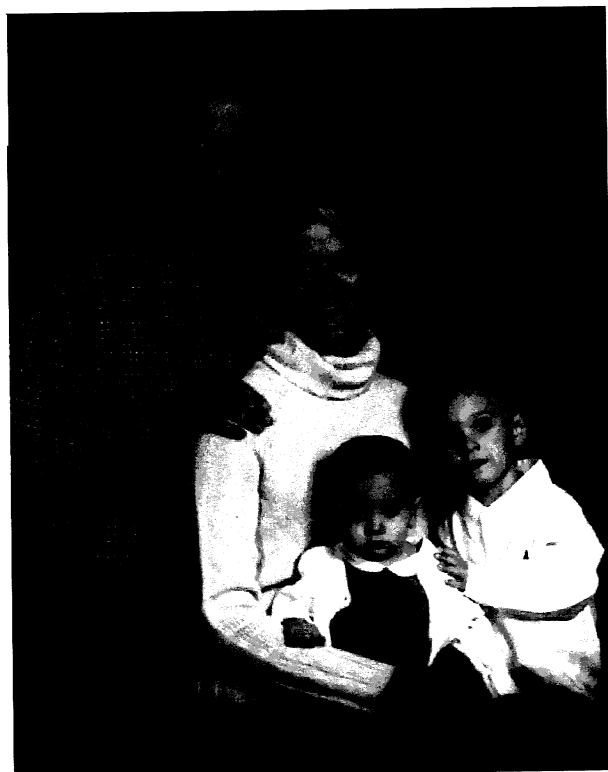

THE WEDDING PHOTO IDENTIFIED — there were no problems identifying the wedding photo that was published in the Enterprise before Christmas, as a total of about six persons called with the information, the largest number of identifiers so far. It was great and the newspaper staff thanks all readers, concerned enough to call. The various bits of information were all put together and this is the story of the wedding portrait: the photo featured Mr. and Mrs. Chris Wilkening. Chris and Aleta Pfantz were married October 6, 1915, at St. Paul's Lutheran Church by Pastor Oltman. The Wilkenings lived all their married life on a farm near State Center and celebrated their golden wedding anniversary October 14, 1965. They had four children: Melvin, State Center; Merle, Colo; Eugene, State Center, and Kathryn (Mrs. Dull) Marshalltown. Chris was born April 18, 1889 and died April 25, 1969, at the age of 80 years, while Aleta was born August 9, 1892, and died November 3, 1972, also at 80 years old.

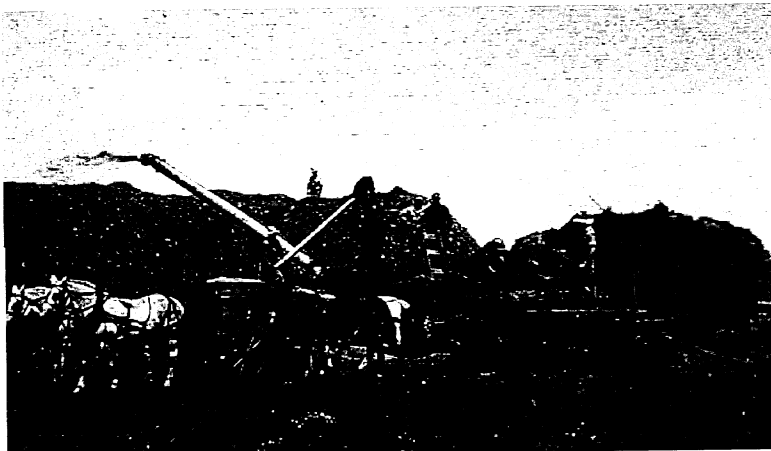
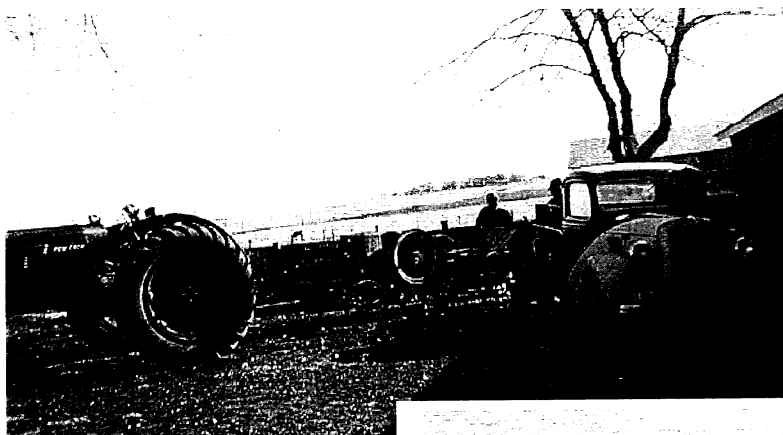

The following article appeared in the Mid Iowa Enterprise newspaper on July 13, 2002: Eugene Wilkening receives Bronze Star Medal after 56 year wait--It has been nearly six decades since World War II ended. But the military service of young men and women involved in that war will never be forgotten. On July 13,

Eugene "Gene" Wilkening of State Center, was presented the Bronze Star Medal at his place of residence by Rich Brewer, Commander of American Legion Post 122, Department of Iowa and Post 122 Honor Guard. The medal was awarded by Executive Order of the President of the United States, through

the Secretary of the Army, for meritorious achievement in ground combat against the armed enemy during World War II, in the European Theater of Operations, where (then Sergeant)

Eugene Wilkening, served with the Second Armored Infantry Division under General Patton. Wilkening served from Jan. 3, 1945 to June 14, 1946. Battle and campaigns were Ardennes, Rhineland and Central Europe. Other medals and ribbons awarded to Mr. Wilkening during his distinguished military career

were: Combat Infantry Badge, Marksman with M1 Rifle Badge, Honorable Service Ribbon, European, African, Middle East Campaign Medal with three bronze battle stars. Army Good Conduct Medal, Victory WWII Service Medal, and Army of Occupation WWII Germany Service Medal.

Eugene E. Wilkening, 83

STATE CENTER — Eugene E. Wilkening, 83, of State Center, died May 1, 2005, at Rolling Green Village in Nevada, with his family at his side.

Funeral services will be 10:30 a.m. Wednesday from St. Paul Lutheran Church, with Pastor Gary MacManus officiating. Burial will follow at Rose Hill Memorial Gardens in Marshalltown, with military honors by the Harlan Pfantz Post of the American Legion in charge. Friends may call at the Wensel Perrin Funeral Home Tuesday from 5 to 9 p.m., with the family being present from 6:30 to 8 p.m.

Eugene was born in State Center on March 3, 1922, the son of Christopher and Aleta (Pfantz) Wilkening. Raised and educated in State Center, he graduated from high school there. He then farmed with his father until entering the U.S. Army in 1944. In 1946, he was discharged after serving with General Patton in Germany. For his service he received the Bronze Star, which wasn't awarded until 2001. On June 6, 1948, in Nevada, Iowa, he was united in marriage to Marilyn Eatwell.

After he returned from the service he farmed until 1950, and then owned and operated his own custom shelling service. He also owned and operated his own wood crafting and cabinetmaking company.

Eugene was a member of St. Paul Lutheran Church, a former church board member, the Harlan Pfantz Post of the American Legion of which he had been a Sgt. At Arms, the West Marshall Senior Citizens and the State Center Community Club. He received the Governor's Award for Volunteerism, and they had served as hosts for many years at the Yellow River Forest State Park in northeast Iowa.

He is survived by his wife Marilyn; two children, Connie (Charles) Sigrist of Scottsbluff, Neb. and David (Lori) Wilkening of Oshkosh, Wis.; two granddaughters, Codi and Casey Sigrist; one brother Merle (Marie) Wilkening of Colo.; a sister Kathryn (John) Dull of Marshalltown; and a sister in law Naomi Wilkening of State Center.

Preceding Eugene in death were his parents and a brother Melvin in November 2004.

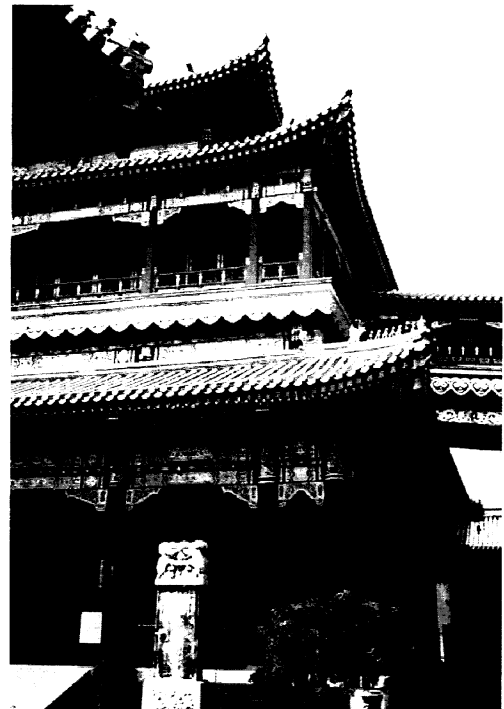

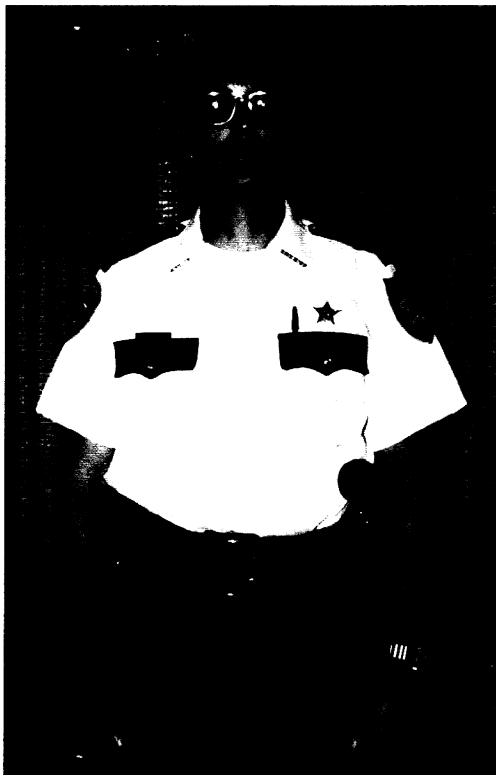

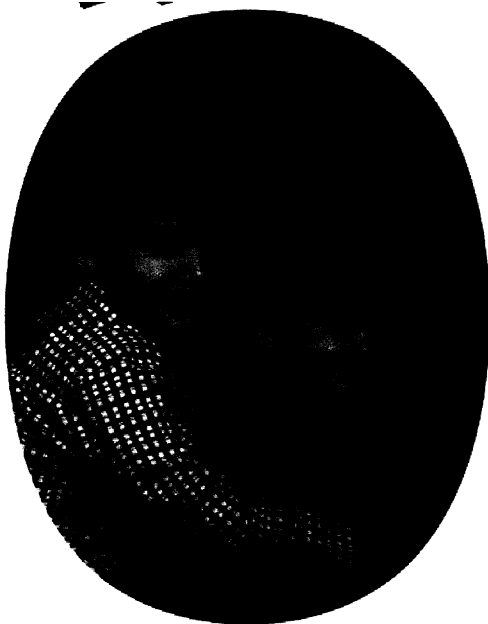

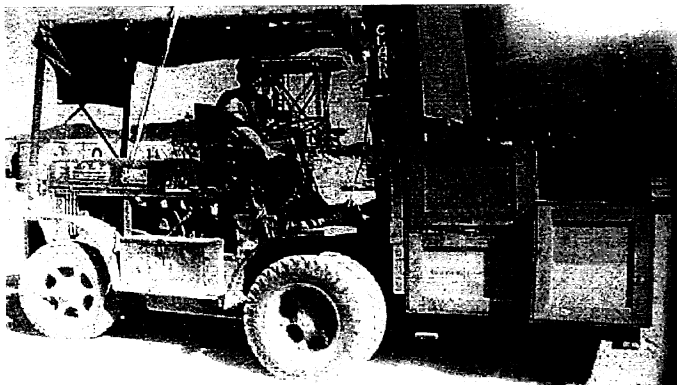

STARTING WITH Bos in September, 1939, McAlister has had no chargeable accident in 17 years of driving, according to L. E. Crowley, association executive secretary.

His safety record goes back farther than that, but complete records do not. He started in the hauling business in 1921 and says he never has had a chargeable accident, Crowley reported.

McAlister now drives a refrigerated truck, mainly between Marshalltown and Chicago, hauling meat and general commodities. He averages about 50,000 miles a year.

THE NEW Driver of the Month is an advocate of 'defensive driving,' commenting, "You've always got to guess what the other guy is going to do. Driving your own equipment properly is only half the story. You have to look out for everybody else on the highway."

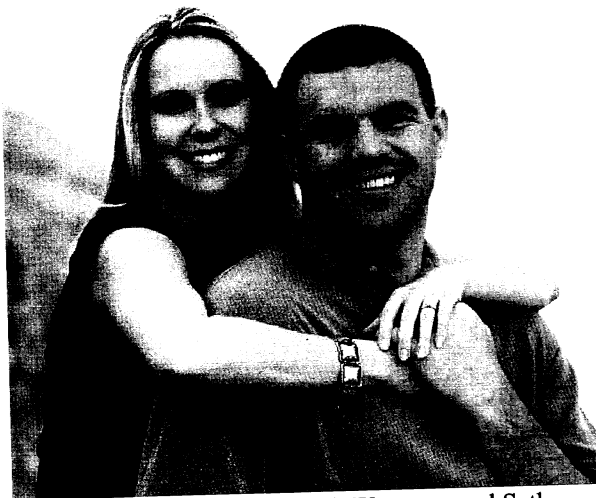

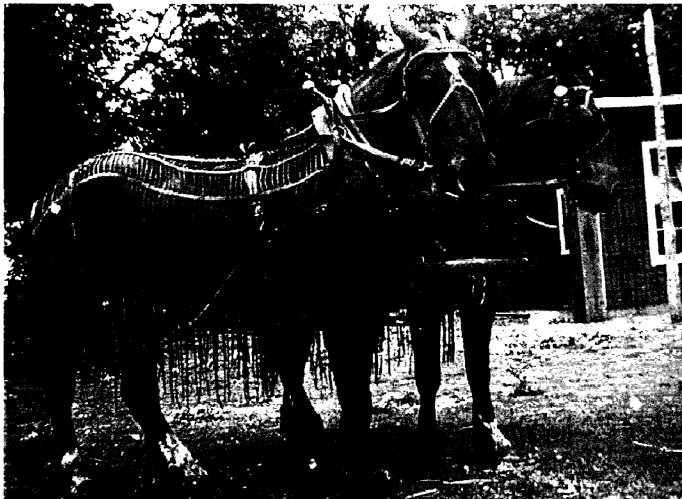

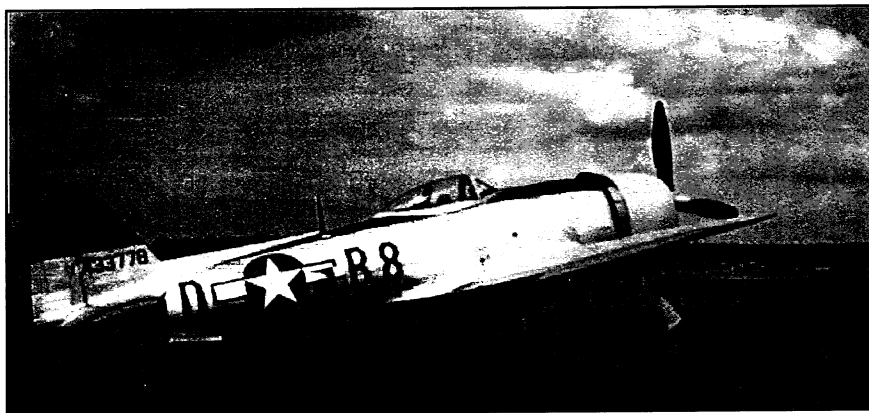

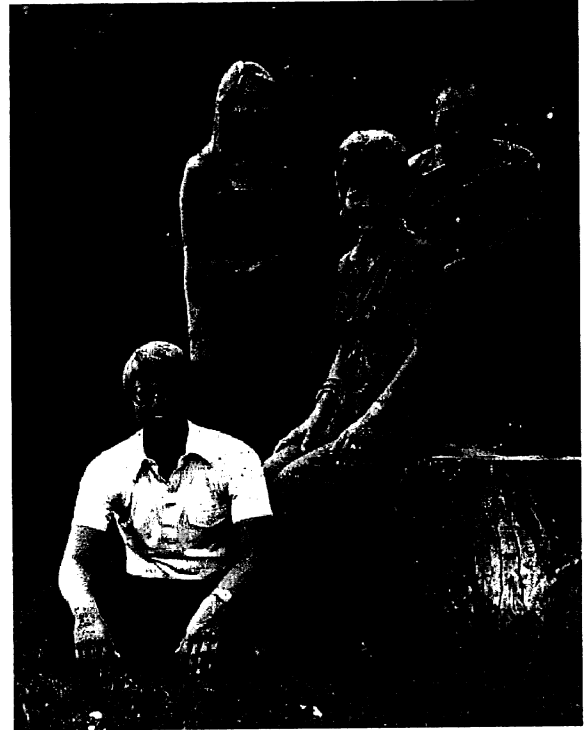

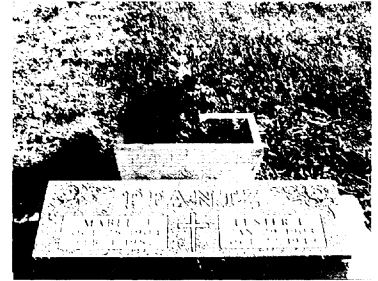
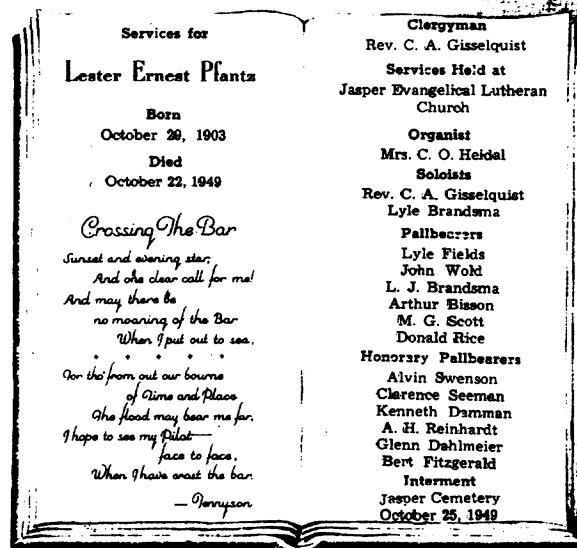

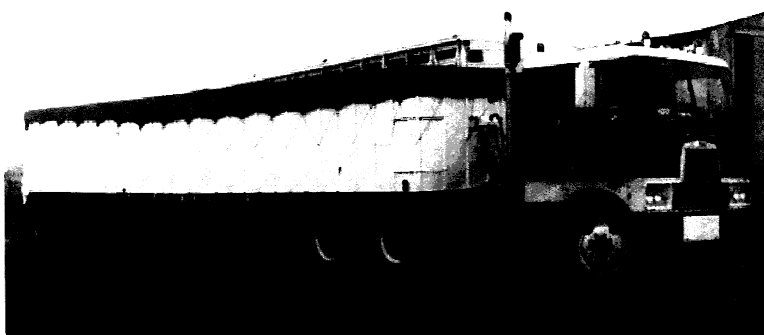

Lyle Hind ...

was born on February 10, 1927 in Jasper, Minnesota to Eugene and Thelma (Simonson) Hind. He attended Jasper schools, graduating from Jasper High School in 1945. While he was still in high school he enlisted in the United States Navy, serving aboard the U.S.S. Indianapolis which carried the atomic bomb. This ship was torpedoed by the Japanese, and of the 1100 persons aboard the ship Lyle was among the 317 who survived, spending five days and five nights in the ocean before being rescued. Following his discharge from the Navy in 1948, he moved to California where he attended a plastics school in San Francisco. In 1950, he enlisted in the United States Air Force and became a specialist in infrared camera repair. Throughout his military career, he served in World War II, Korea, Turkey, and Vietnam for a total of 20 years of military service. He retired from the military in 1968. On July 10, 1968 he married Delores Pfantz at the Little Brown Church of the West in Las Vegas, Nevada. Following their marriage, they moved to Aurora, Colorado where Lyle worked for the Bendix Corporation, and later worked for the Uptime Corporation in Englewood, Colorado where he built computer heads. In December of 1971, they moved to Sioux Falls, South Dakota where they have lived since that time. On Thursday, August 31, 1995, Lyle died at the Sioux Valley Hospice Cottage in Sioux Falls, South Dakota at the age of 68 years, 6 months and 21 days.

He was a member of the United Methodist Church of Jasper.

He is survived by his wife, Delores Hind of Sioux Falls, South Dakota; a sister, DeVonna (Dee) and her husband, Robert Johnson of Pipestone, Minnesota; nephews, nieces, aunts, uncles, and cousins; sisters-in law, La Jean Powell of Jasper, Minnesota, and Lois Jurens of Sioux Falls, South Dakota. 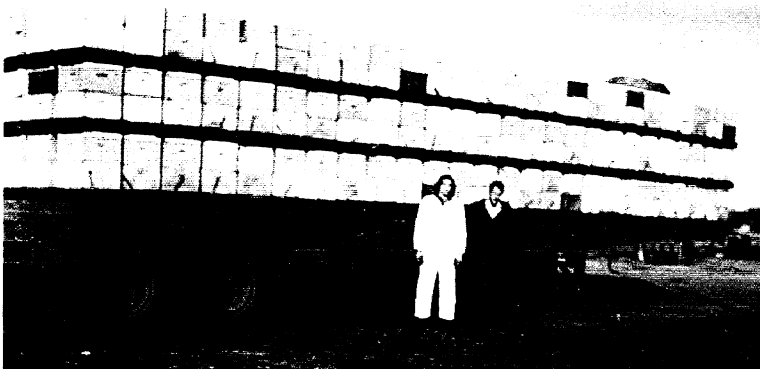


Photo of Donald Powell and Edward Powell with the trailer that is loaded with bee hives for Florida.

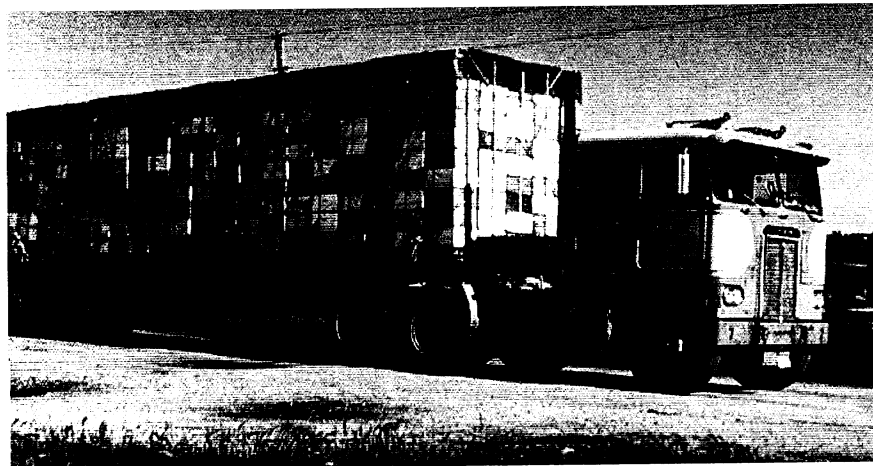

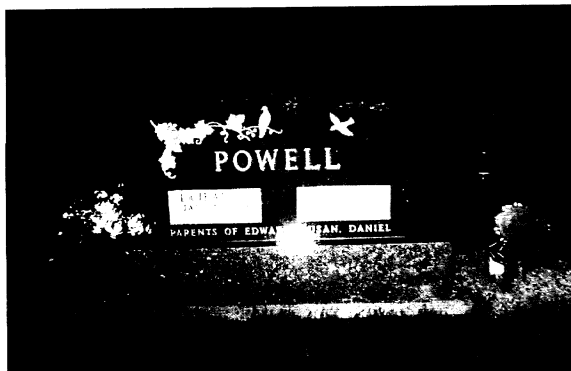

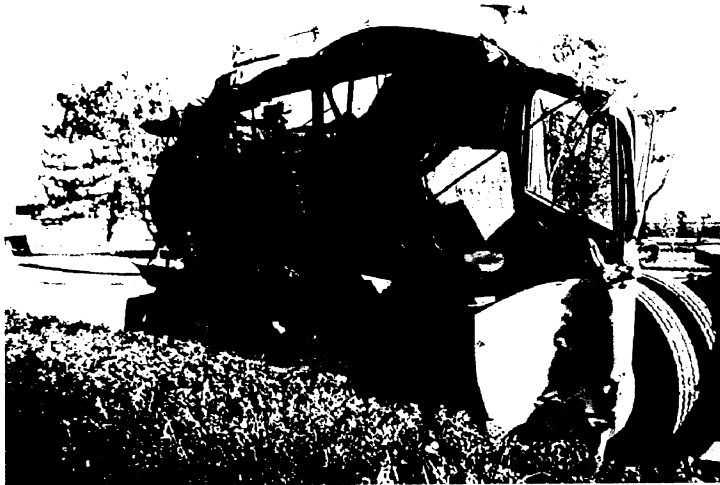

Heavy Damage as Driver Loses Control of Semi

Flandreau. (Special) — An estimated property damage in the amount of \$18,000-\$20,000 was the result of a diesel semi-trailer-tractor accident which occurred on Highway 34 about 5 miles east of Flandreau at 2:30 a.m. on November 15.

Donald G. Powell, 33, of rural Jasper, was the driver and he lost control of the semi-vehicle which was loaded with livestock. He did not overturn but ran it into the driveway of the Oliver Larson farm. The farm has extensive fencing, evergreens and a large wooden gate sign overhanging the drive which reads "L-Pine Ranch". The sign, fencing and trees were extensively damaged.

Powell, who possibly went to sleep at the wheel, escaped with only cuts and bruises. Of the 110 calves on the trailer six were killed. The Kenworth tractor was a total loss and the trailer was considerably damaged.

Investigating the accident was Moody county sheriff Fletcher Faris.

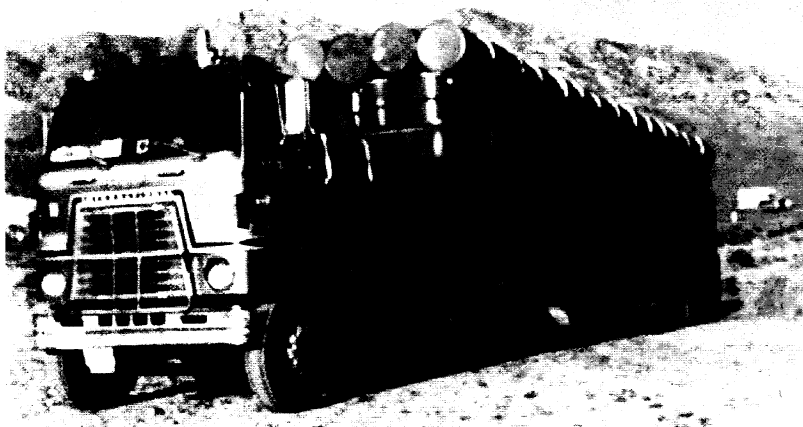

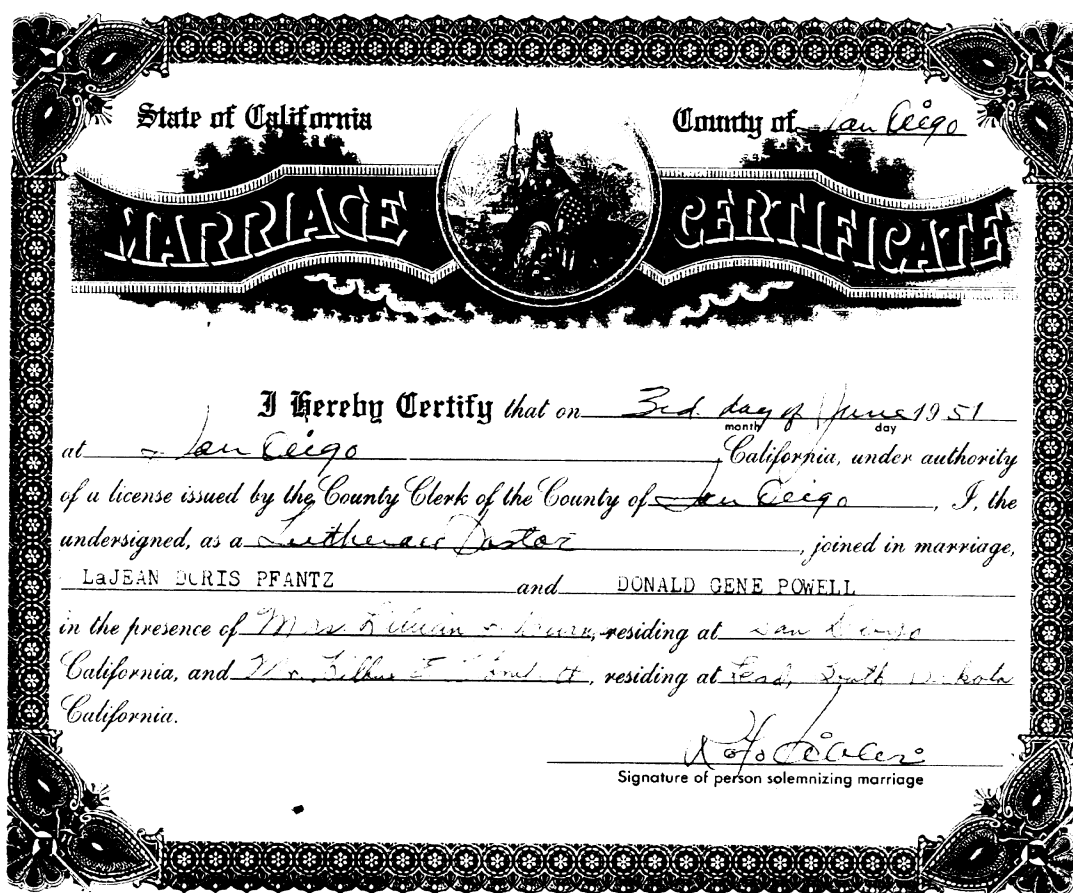
