HARDIN COUNTY FUNDS AMOUNT TO \$8,600

County Needs More Soil, Water Conservation Funds Available

Soil erosion from the recent heavy rains in Hardin county has taken its toll on many farms. The top soil that has been washed down in the bottom land and piled up along fence rows and ditches can not be replaced.

The corn and soybean production stand was also materially reduced due to washing of the soil away from the corn and soybean plants. It has been several years since we have seen so many ponds standing in the fields.

There will not be any crop raised in many of these ponds on some farms this amount to several acres. This is a direct loss of several hundred dollars when corn and beans are yielding an average of 70 and 30 bushels per acre, respectively.

The heavy rains recently should make farmers aware that they need more conservation practices established on their farms. Soil and water conservation are important to this community and the nation for the protection of our country.

The Agricultural Conservation Program has been provided by the Congress to assist farmers in carrying out soil and water conservation practices. The ACP fund allocations in Hardin county this year amount to \$82,600 for establishing soil and water conservation practices. To date 211 farms out of 400 farms have signed up for

\$35,497 cost-share ACP practices.

The county ASC office has \$47,133 available for conservation practices for the balance of this year. It is very evident that more farmers should be participating in the soil and water conservation (ACP) program.

It is still time for farmers to establish practices on their farms this year to prevent further soil erosion. Farmers should take inventory of erosion damage on their farms and contact the ASC office to sign up for cost-sharing practices. It is necessary that a farmer requests cost-share for ACP practices at the county ASC office before performance of such practices is started.

Many ACP practices are available for farmers to conserve water runoff and prevent soil erosion. In some cases only one or two practices may solve the problem on their farm; in other cases a combination of practices may be necessary. If a farmer is not able financially to establish all the practices in one year, he may be able to establish one or two this year and continue to carry out the other needed practices in the next year or two.

The following ACP practices are available for soil and water conservation:

- (1) — Tiling — to conserve water and prevent ponds and crop losses.
- (2) — Sod waterways — to prevent gully erosion and loss of top soil.
- (3) — Terraces — to save runoff and prevent washing of sloping land.
- (4) — Dams — to hold back rapid water runoff; also conserve water and prevent gulches.
- (5) — Contouring — conserves water and prevents gulches. This practice is also used in many cases along with terraces and dams. On land with less slope contouring may solve the problem alone.
- (6) — Contour strip cropping — prevents soil erosion and conserves water.
- (7) — Establishment of terraces, contouring and strip cropping also will result in higher yields of crops per acre by their holding back the water runoff for the benefit of such crops.

The Agricultural Conservation Program has been provided by the people of this nation to protect and conserve our land. We urge all farmers to use this program for assistance to complete at least part of their conservation program on their farms. The three agencies in Hardin county, Soil Conservation Service, County Extension Office, and the ASC office, are interested and available in assisting farmers with their conservation needs.

Everyone should be good stewards of the soil, not only from the material benefits we receive, but also to improve the land for future generations — this is our Christian responsibility.

CONSERVATION SLIDES AVAILABLE FOR PUBLIC

Four sets of the conservation slides assembled by the Iowa Chapter of the Soil Conservation Society during 1958 are now available for public distribution, according to Charles Ballantyne, president.

This series of 50 slides depicting various phases of soil and water conservation is intended to create a concept and appreciation of conservation. A narrative to be used while showing the slides has also been compiled. The series of slides was shown at the 14th Annual Short Course by Charles Ballantyne.

Record Row Crop Acreage Sets Stage For Serious Soil And Water Losses

The tabulation of this year's final planting surveys seems certain to show Iowa farmers planted the largest acreage of row crops in the history of the state.

Farmers indicated they would plant more than 12,000,000 acres of corn — a new record for Iowa. Add to this an additional 2 1/2 million acres of soybeans and grain sorghums and we are witnessing an all-time high in clean-cultivated crops for Iowa.

Every farmer can contour row crops on slopes which exceed 3 percent. This can be done with little inconvenience and with increased crop yields in most years. Contouring of row crops will help control soil losses down to about half that expected from rows planted up and down hill. On many fields in Iowa, a good job of contouring will give adequate control of erosion.

Where slopes are long, it may be necessary to shorten the slope by breaking it up into shorter segments with terraces. Terraces give some inconvenience in farming, but they allow more intensive use of the land in row crops while soil losses are held within safe limits. Row crops are high profit crops in Iowa. This is the way terraces pay off for Iowa farmers — by allowing row crops to be safely grown during a higher percentage of the time.

For such practices as terraces, Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP) cost sharing is available and often pays as much as 70 percent of the cost. Technical assistance is available through your soil conservation district. It all adds up to a great bargain for those who need this kind of land protection.

Bromegrass For Waterways

Bromegrass is still the outstanding grass for waterways in Iowa. It is easy to establish, provides a dense, tough sod and is adapted all over Iowa. Adequate fertility is necessary for its establishment and growth. Agronomist Frank Schaller suggests a planting rate of 15 to 20 pounds per acre.

MINOR ELEMENTS NOT REPORTED

The Iowa State College soil testing laboratory does not report on trace elements because soil fertility research has shown that response cannot be expected from any of the minor elements under Iowa conditions. A possible small exception might be in production of alfalfa seed, where a slight increase has been noted when boron was applied.

New Conservation Stamp Announced; To Be Available On August 26th

Postmaster General Arthur E. Summerfield recently announced that a soil conservation stamp will be issued on August 26, 1959, at Rapid City, South Dakota at the annual meeting of the Soil Conservation Society of America.

"This soil conservation stamp," Mr. Summerfield said, "should help focus public interest on the extensive conservation efforts being made by federal and state governments, local soil conservation districts, watershed associations and other private and public groups. The issuance of 120 million of these stamps is in further recognition of the stake all of our people, urban as well as rural, have in the work of maintaining and improving the nation's vital natural resources of soil, water, forests, and grasslands."

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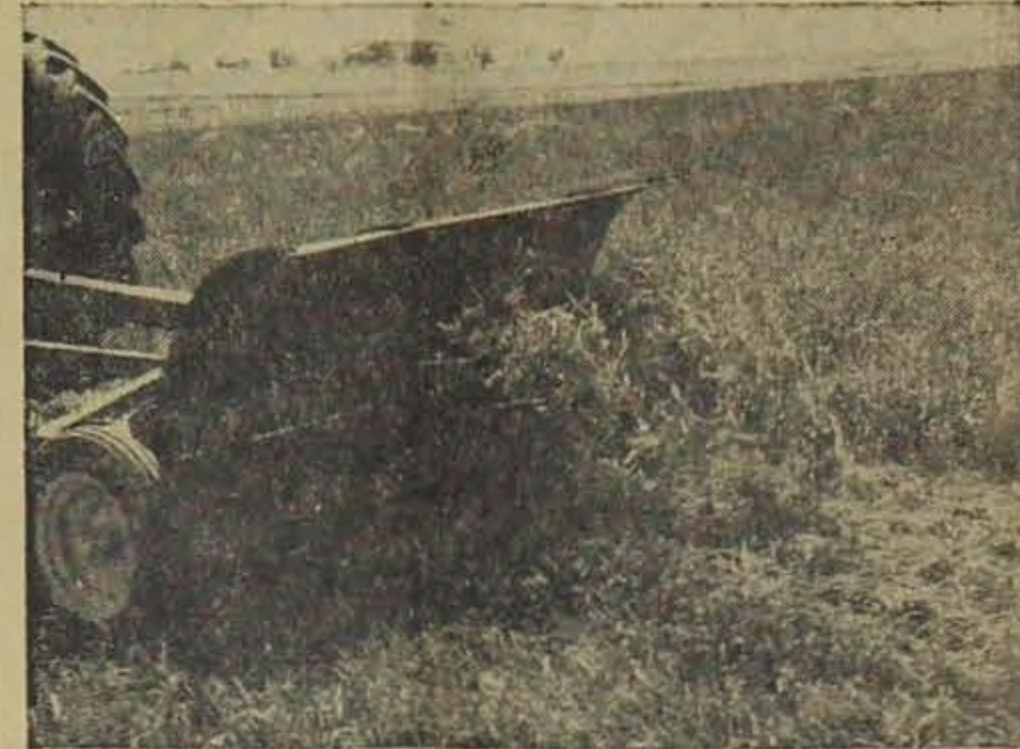
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BERNARD REECE A CONSERVATION AWARD WINNER —

Conservation Way Farming Pays Off For New Providence Farmer

Increased crop and pasture production has been the result of farming the conservation way for Bernard Reece of New Providence, one of the award winners in the Hardin Soil Conservation District Annual Conservation Achievement program this spring.

Reece, operator of the R. R. Clappitt farm three miles southwest of New Providence, has through his sound conservation program seen sizeable increases in yields by controlling soil erosion and restoring fertility.

Features of the plan on the 256-acre farm include a system of terraces, grassed waterways and headlands, contouring, pasture renovation and establishing a cropping sequence.

One mile of terraces have been built on the farm with more planned for construction. Over 20 acres of timber pasture has been converted to productive pasture by renovation to a mixture including birdsfoot trefoil. A total of 250 rods of tile has also been installed to drain wet areas.

A registered herd of 75 milking Shorthorns constitute the major part of the livestock program. An additional 75 registered Shorthorns of the original herd are on the farm operated by Harry Clappitt.

The Clappitt farms hold the record for the oldest, continuous exhibitor in the Iowa State Fair in all breeds. Cattle have been shown at the Iowa State Fair since 1915.

Recently visitors from two foreign countries, Senora Juana de Campion of Argentina, owner of a large ranch in Argentina with 7,000 milking Shorthorns and Paavo Kajanaja, chief of the Division of Animal Husbandry on the Board of Agriculture in Finland, toured the farm. Also, a dairy judging class from Iowa State College conducted judging trials on the Reece farm.

Reece is ably assisted with the dairy operation and farming by his wife Mabel and sons, Keith, Earl and Linn. Keith and Earl are students at Iowa State College and Linn will be in fifth grade at New Providence Community School.

The Reece farm has been used for conservation tours to show other farmers and interested groups the good results of shifting to conservation farming. Reece served as commissioner for six years in the Hardin Conservation District from 1951 to 1957.

Farmers of Hardin county are recognizing terraces as one of the most important practices in conservation farming.

Terrace construction during the spring of 1959 has already topped the record of 1,400 feet. All were constructed by Triple R Construction, Wellsburg.

The week set aside as Soil Conservation Week brings special attention to earlier conservation work done in Hardin county.

Ernest Barz, operating a 160-acre farm four miles east of Eldora, owned by his father, O. H. Barz, continues on with conservation practices started by his father in 1940. Over one mile of terraces, two acres of woodland wild life planting were completed and waterway construction and contour farming started during the early '40s through assistance of the Civilian Conservation Corps.

An additional 1 1/2 miles of terraces have been constructed by Ernest Barz since his operating the farm. Additional tile drainage work and waterway reshaping has also been completed. All cropland not terraced is farmed on the contour in the Barz farming operation.

Wendell Clappitt, New Providence, installed nearly 2,000 feet on the farm operated by Dwayne Shaver and R. A. Scott, Eldora, built 2,800 feet of terraces and diversions on the farm operated by Charles Steinfeldt, Fred Rash, north of New Providence, constructed approximately 4,000 feet. The terraces were built by Shore Construction, Eldora.

Terraces were built on three farms with tractors and plows. The Eldora FFA Chapter constructed nearly 4,400 feet on the Otto Jeske farm. Eldora, Gerald Modlin built nearly 3,300 feet on his farm east of Eldora and John Bellmich, Union, constructed approximately 2,000 feet on the Minnie Haas farm.

A total of 7,600 feet were installed on the Walter Norman farm, south of Union with a dozer and roadpatrol operated by Trowbridge Construction of Marshalltown. Jesse Mann installed 770 feet on the Joe Mann farm northwest of Steamboat Rock.

Iowans Eating Lot Of Surplus Food These Days

A total of 8,314,086 pounds of federal surplus commodities, valued at \$2,155,052.52 were distributed in 1958 to needy persons through the State Department of Social Welfare's offices, according to Marshall C. Jewell, vice chairman of the state board of social welfare.

These United States Department of Agriculture surplus are furnished without charge to counties wishing to participate in this program. Eligible to receive these food are all recipients of public assistance who have cooking facilities, and low income groups, certified as eligible by the county directors of social welfare. Any board of supervisors may obtain surplus foods for the county's need by agreeing to pay cost of delivery and distribution.

Jewell said that extra help is employed in some of the larger counties, but in most counties distribution costs are kept at a minimum through the services of volunteer workers. These include boards of supervisors, boards of social welfare, mayors, women's club, labor and veterans organizations, and other interested citizens.

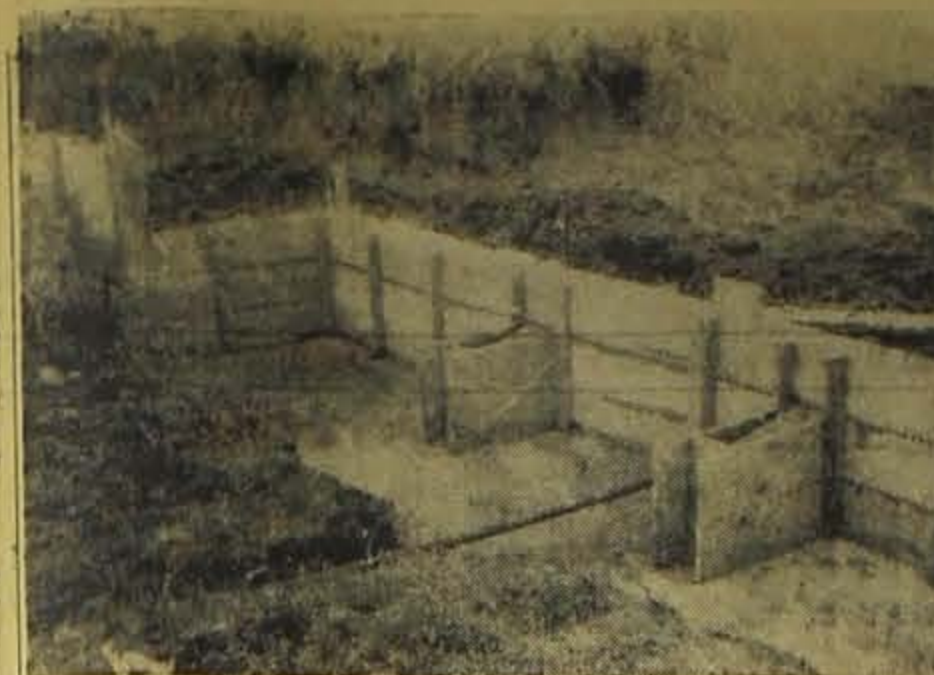
During 1958, 69 of the 99 Iowa counties participated in this program. A total of 1,013,312 pounds of butter valued at \$688,204.16; 999,630 pounds of cheese valued at \$449,833.30; 1,100,844 pounds of dry milk valued at \$484,371.36; 695,800 pounds of rice valued at \$123,421.00; 2,958,000 pounds of flour valued at \$273,629.75; and 1,546,400 pounds of corn meal valued at \$135,592.75 were distributed in the 67 counties at a total delivery cost of \$61,433.08.

In Hardin county, delivery costs totaled \$619.55 for 11,717 pounds of butter valued at \$7,968.64; 11,700 pounds of cheese valued at \$5,265.90; 9,900 pounds of dry milk valued at \$4,395.60; 2,100 pounds of rice valued at \$346.50; 20,400 pounds of flour valued at \$1,890.50; and 19,200 pounds of corn meal valued at \$1,602.25. This totaled 75,102 pounds of food with a total value of \$21,548.49.

In May 1959, the state had 35,585 Old Age Assistance recipients. Total costs were \$2,415,473.90, averaging \$67.84 each. In Hardin county, there were 317 cases. Total costs were \$21,463.50, an average of \$67.71 each.

Aid to Blind grants for May 1959 were given to 1,444 individuals. Total costs were \$120,169.50, at an average of \$83.22 monthly. In Hardin county, there were 233 cases, with a total cost of \$336.50; an average of \$1.44 each.

Aid to Dependent Children grants for May were granted to 8,627 families, including 31,849 individuals. Total costs were \$1,109,638, and averaged \$129.61 per family, or \$34.84 per person.

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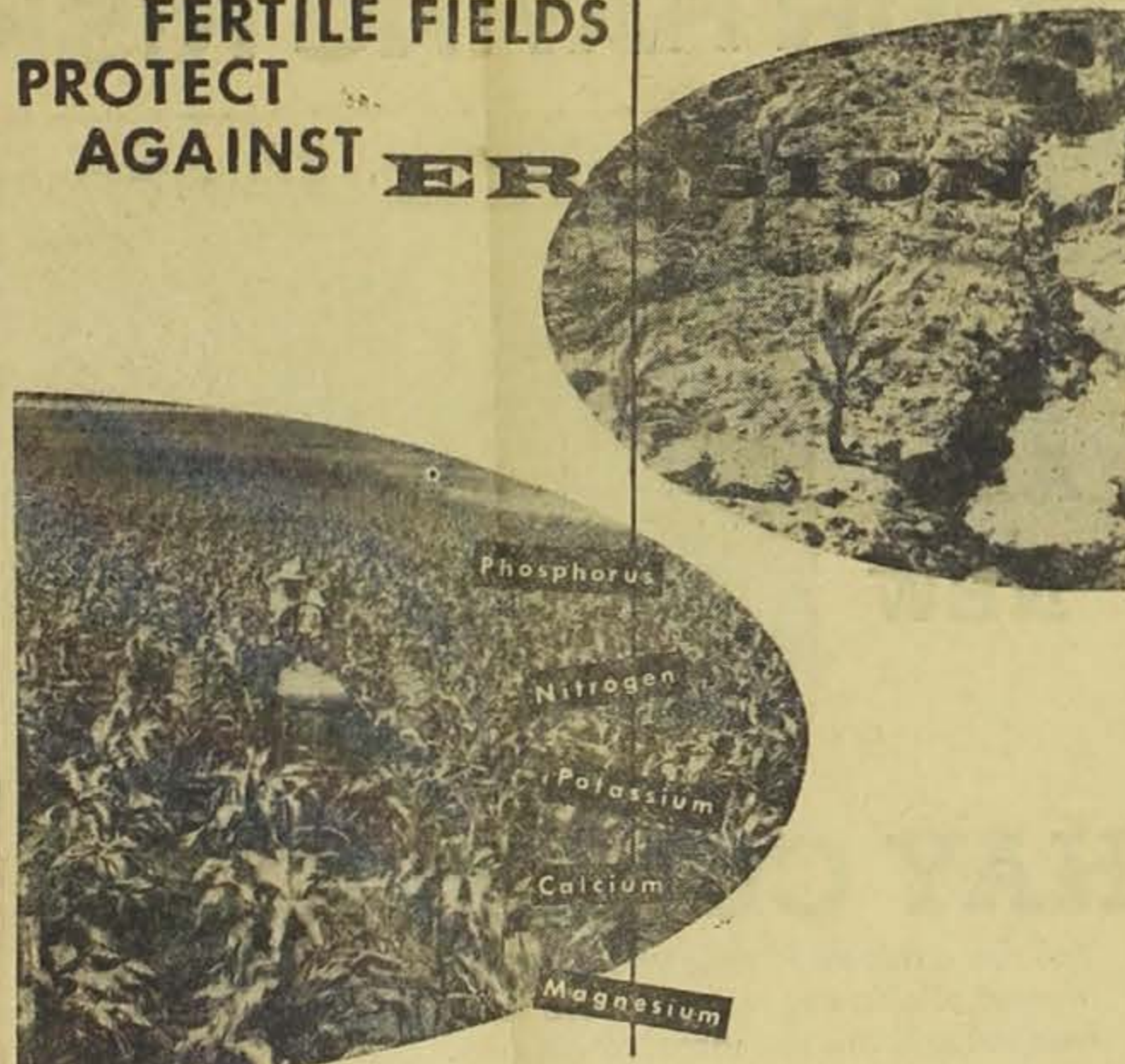
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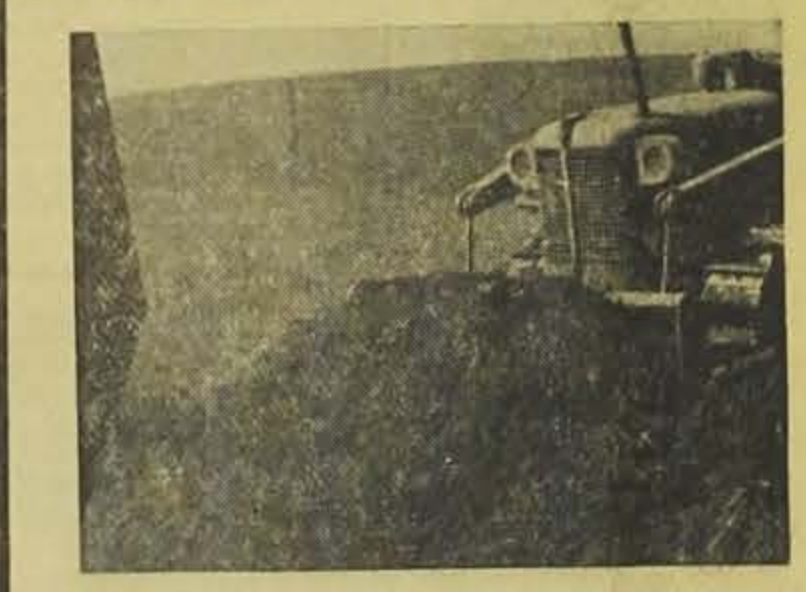
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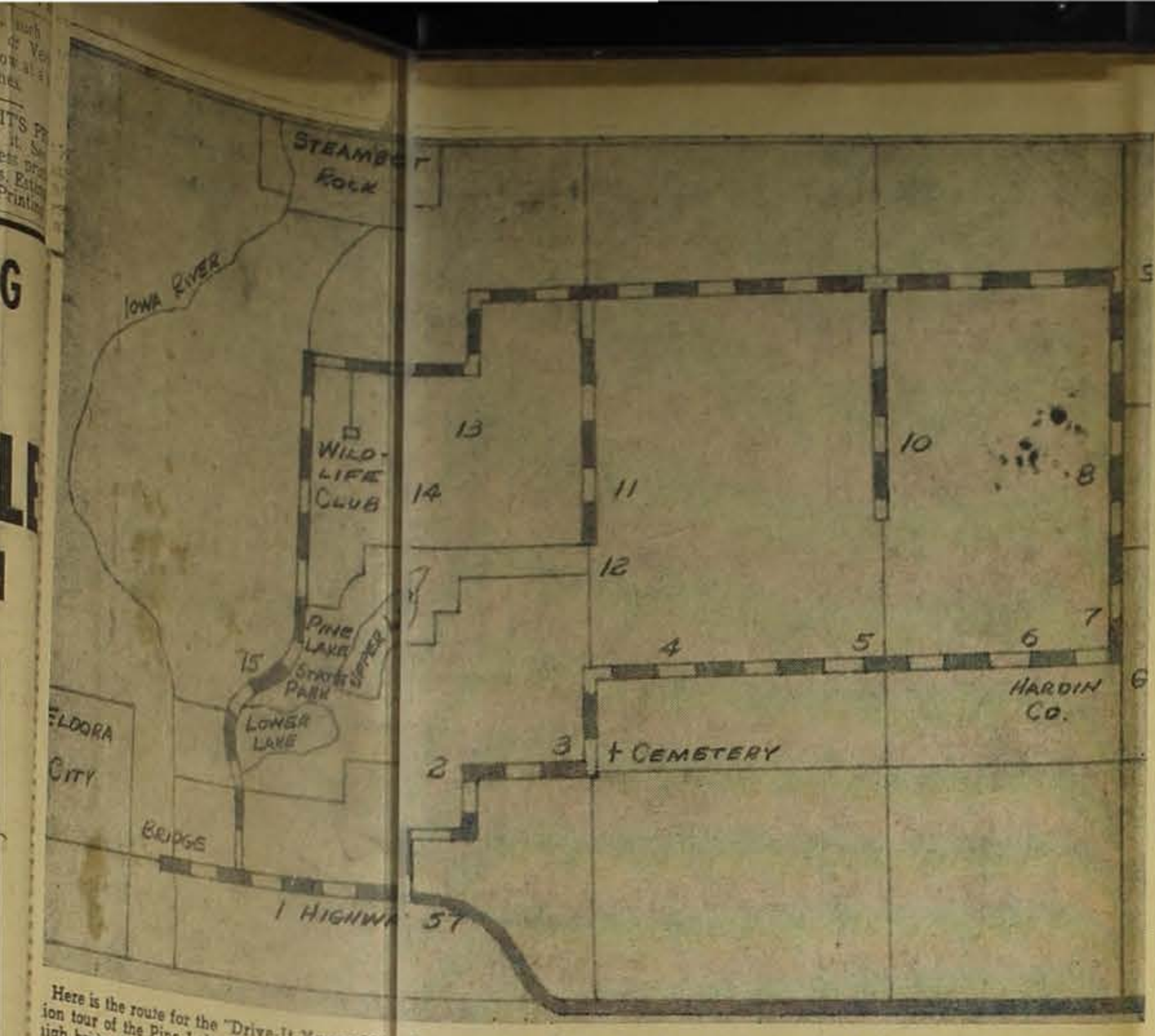

Plan 'Drive-It-Yourself' Tour Of Pine Lake Watershed Areas

Want to take a pleasant drive in the country and learn something about the job some of the farmers in the Pine Lake Watershed are doing to maintain their soil and its fertility? A "Drive-It-Yourself" Soil Conservation tour of the areas has been planned by the Hardin Soil Conservation District according to Cal Moore, Hardin County Soil Conservationist.

The tour was arranged so that town residents and local farmers can get an idea of what their farming neighbors are doing.

The "Drive-It-Yourself" tour starts today and can be taken any day at your leisure, with the aid of the accompanying map. The tour is about 15 miles long.

Moore said he believes it is the first time this type of tour has been arranged in Hardin county.

The route was planned to include scenic areas of the lake watershed and to show examples of work farmers are doing to save and build up soil fertility in crop production. The route also goes past several areas on which land improvements could be made. The tour covers the west half of the new 10,000 acre watershed in Hardin and Grundy counties. The area has been of significant interest since the recent appropriation of \$93,500 by the State Legislature to enlarge the Upper Lake from 72 to 106 acres.

A requirement that 75 percent of the land in the watershed be under a conservation program was one of the provisions of the appropriation. Eighty percent of the watershed land in both Hardin and Grundy counties has now been signed under the Soil Conservation District program.

Here are the points of interest:

Point 1 — The tour starts at the bridge east of Eldora on highway 57 1 1/2 miles to the curve, turn left.

Point 2 — Terraces and grassed waterways of the Ed Wiesner farm. Many of these terraces were constructed during the 1930's with CCC assistance. Terraces are low ridges on the contour and are used to break up long slopes into a series of shorter slopes. A most effective conservation measure, terraces slow the runoff of water and divert it into grassed waterways to be carried off the field with a minimum of erosion.

Point 3 — Strip cropping, contouring and grassed waterways on the Lewis Crosser farm. Strip cropping is the alternating strips of corn, oats, and hay established on the contour. Strip cropping slows the runoff of water and helps prevent erosion. Contouring is the planting in level line around and across slopes.

Point 4 — Contouring on the Ivan DeWitt farm may be observed on the north side of the road.

Point 5 — Newly established contouring on the Henry Peters farm can be seen east of the building.

Point 6 — Contouring with contour field divisions on the Dick Freese farm. Using a contour line for a field division as is observed between the corn and oats field east of the buildings. Straight field divisions would cut contour lines resulting in many short rows.

Point 7 — Contouring and new grassed waterways on the M. Q. Reynolds farm operated by Don Balvanz. Waterways were constructed this spring by the Triple R Construction, Wellsburg. A grassed waterway provides for the runoff of water without gully.

Point 8 — Newly constructed parallel terraces and waterways in the oats field of the Balvanz farm. Terraces were constructed parallel to eliminate short rows between terraces. Construction work was completed by the Triple R Construction, Wellsburg.

Point 9 — Terraces, contouring and grassed waterways on the George Primus farm in Grundy county.

Point 10 — Parallel terraces and contour field boundary on the Lee Lundy farm operated by Marilyn Eilers. Terraces were constructed this spring. Terraces are constructed low and broad to allow use of 4-row equipment.

Point 11 — Strip cropping, grassed waterways, and contouring can be observed on the Joe Beach farm. Terraces have been constructed every year for the past 3 years on the east side of the farm. A concrete drop box structure has been constructed at the road. The structure is built on to a culvert at the road. The structure stabilized the grass waterway above it.

Point 12 — New bridge under construction over Pine Creek. The bridge will be a 55 foot pre-stressed concrete structure.

Point 13 — Strip cropping on the Bill Schuneman farm east of the road.

Point 14 — Strip cropping on the John Snapp farm. The strips were established in the spring of 1958.

Point 15 — Contouring on the Butler Farms operated by Paul Primus. The contouring is north of the Pine Lake golf course.

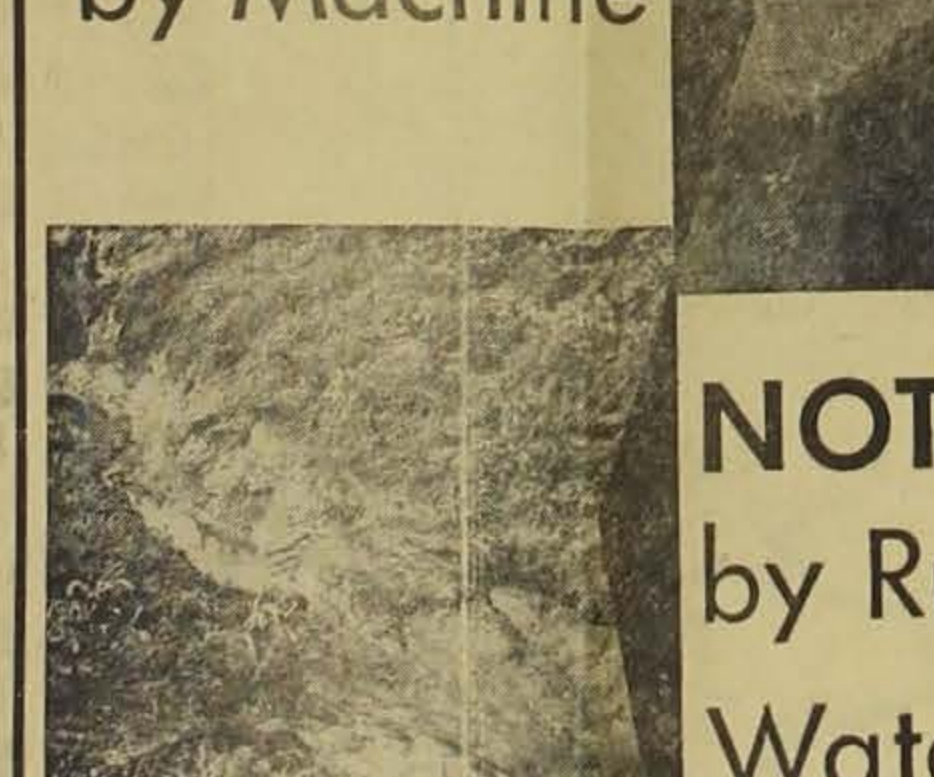

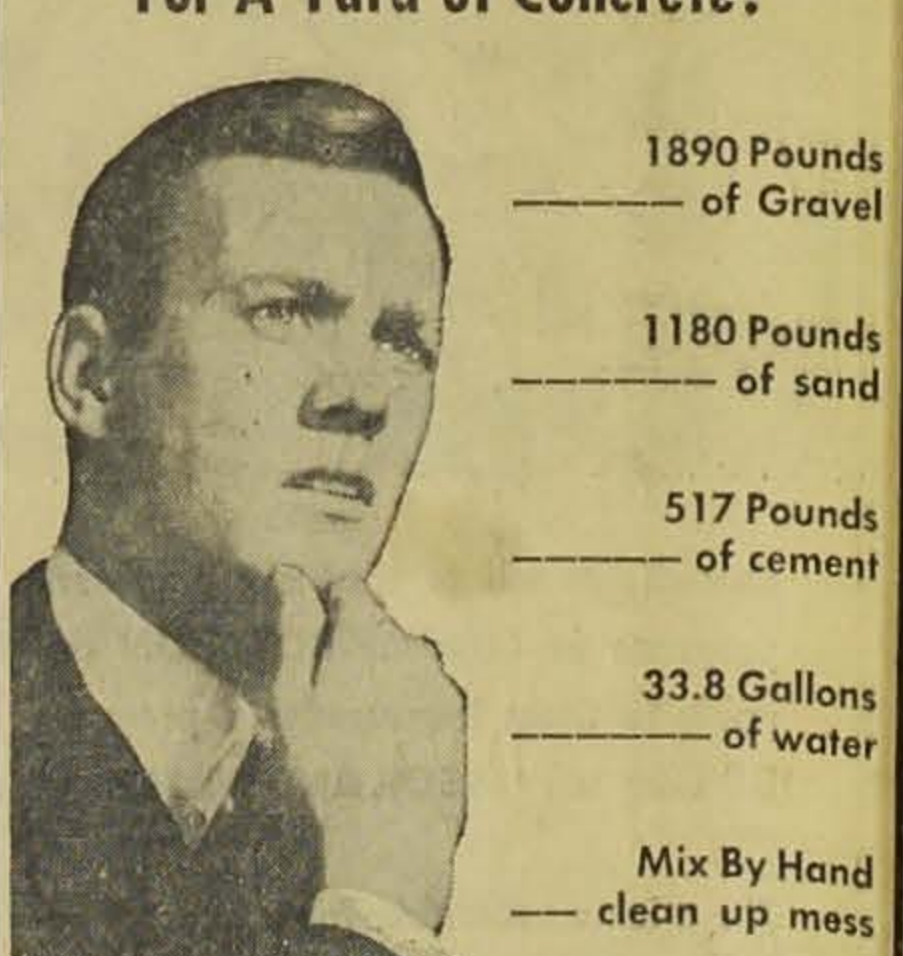

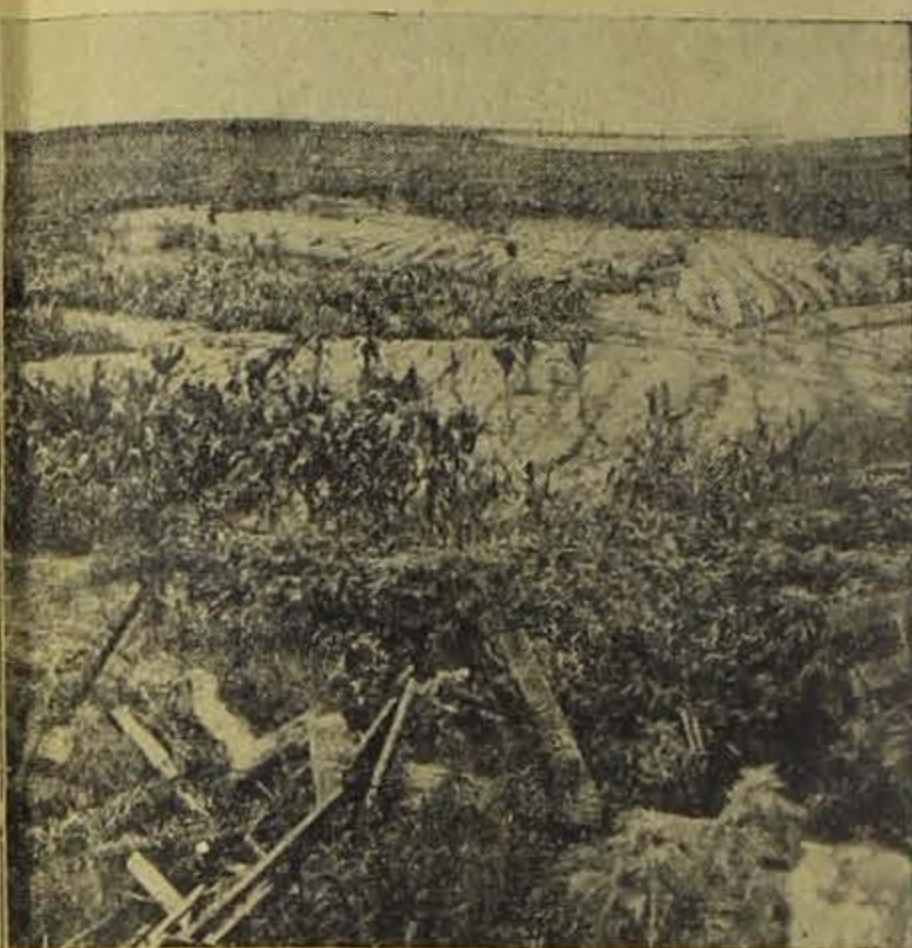
