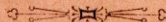

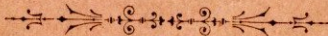

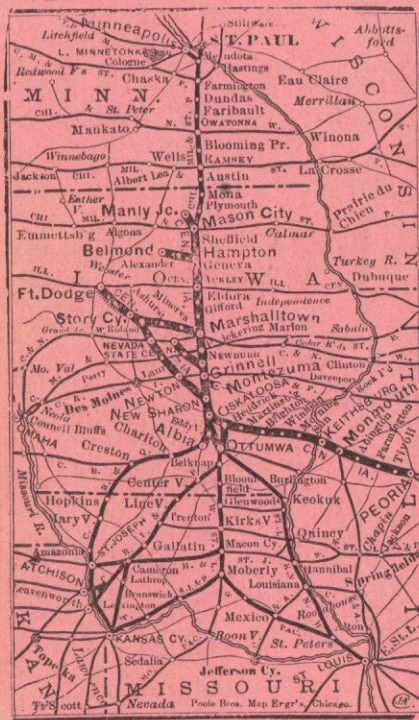

between St. Louis and Kansas City to St. Paul and Minneapolis, with through Pullman Palace Sleepers in each direction. Day coaches will run through in each direction without change between Albia and St. Paul. Going south the fast train now known as No. 2, will leave St. Paul and Minneapolis at 8 a. m. Mason City 1:30 p. m., Ackley 3:13 p. m., Eldora 3:40 p. m., Marshalltown 4:45 p. m., Grinnell 5:45 p. m., Oskaloosa 7:10 p. m., Albia 8:20 p. m., reaching St. Louis at 7:30 and Kansas City at 8:35 a. m., connecting at Mason City with the C. M. & St. P., at Ackley with Ill. Cent. going east, at Marshall with C. & N. W., going east and Diagonal for Des Moines, Pickering with C. & M. St. P. going east Albia Junction with the C. B. & Q. for the west, at Albia with the Wabash fast train for St. Louis and Kansas City, and at Moberly with the M. K. & T. division of the Missouri Pacific railway for all points south to Texas. Time from St. Paul to St. Louis is 23½ hours quicker and to Kansas City one hour quicker, than any other line.

The north-bound corresponding train, now known as No. 1, leaves St. Louis at 8:25 p. m., Kansas City 7:45 p. m., Moberly after the arrival of the M. K. & T. train from the south, and will leave Albia at 8:10 a. m., Oskaloosa 9:50 a. m., Grinnell 11:10 a. m., Pickering 11:56 a. m., Marshalltown 12:15, noon, stopping for dinner; Eldora 1:30 p. m., Ackley 2:05 p. m., Mason City 4:00 p. m., and arrive at St. Paul and Minneapolis at 9:45 p. m.

This train will take passengers at Marion from the C. B. & Q., from the west; at Grinnell from the C. R. I. & P. from the east; at Pickering from the C. M. & St. P. from the east; at Marshalltown from the C. & N. W. from the east and the Diagonal Railway from Des Moines; at Ackley with the Illinois Central from the east, and at Mason City Junction connects with the Iowa and Dakota division of the C. M. & St. P., arriving at Okoboji and Spirit lakes the same evening. This shortens the time to Spirit Lake nine hours, and makes this the great route for tourists from Iowa as well as from the South.

CIRCULAR OF INFORMATION.

THE AIM OF THE INSTITUTION.

The main objects sought by this Institution are five:

1. To furnish an English education to a class of students whose early advantages were few, and yet whose age and general development enable them to do work more rapidly than is possible in our graded schools.
2. To prepare young men and women for admission to classical and scientific college courses of higher institutions.
3. To afford a general education and culture to those who desire more than a common school education, and yet are compelled to accept less than a regular course.
4. To furnish thoroughly trained teachers for the public schools of the State.
5. To give all who may come under its influences such an intellectual and moral bias as shall tend to make them well-balanced men and women.

LOCATION AND ACCESS.

Albion Seminary is situated in the northern part of Albion, Marshall county, Iowa, on the Central of Iowa Railway, seven miles northwest of Marshalltown. The Central railroad makes connections with other railroads as follows: With the Chicago & Northwestern, W., I. & N., and I., C. & N. W., at Marshalltown; with Toledo & Northwestern, at Gifford; with Burlington & Cedar Rapids, at Abbott; with Illinois Central, at Ackley; with Dubuque & Dakota Railway and Belmond branch of Central, at Hampton. It will be seen that Albion is centrally located, and easy of access.

The village of Albion is pleasantly situated on high, rolling ground, in as healthy a region as can be found in the State.

The town is free from saloons, beer halls, billiard halls, and such demoralizing influences.

The quiet of the place, and the interest the citizens take in educational matters, make it easy for the student to become interested in school work.

BUILDING AND GROUNDS.

The building is a commodious, two-story, brick edifice, containing recitation rooms, library and reading room, three music rooms, large hall for chapel exercises and public purposes, and suites of rooms for teachers and pupils. Repairs and additions are constantly improving the comfort and appearance of the building. The grounds embrace about two acres, laid out and set with shrubbery and shade trees.

The library contains many books valuable for reading and reference, especially cyclopedias and historical works. The most of the newspapers published within a radius of thirty or forty miles are found each week upon our reading room tables. Also many other valuable papers and periodicals. The library is free to students, and open to them and friends of the school at all proper times, for reference and reading. Donations of good books and magazines will be gratefully received.

A Museum and Cabinet has been started, and is already of sufficient size to be of much help to students in the natural sciences. Many valuable additions to it are expected during the coming year. We respectfully solicit such gifts from friends of the school.

LITERARY SOCIETY AND WORK.

All pupils are expected to do some literary work, such as letter-writing, composition work, declamations, etc. Those who wish to, can become members of a well conducted literary society.

Patronage.

This school is under the patronage of the Upper Iowa Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church. This does not give it sectarian bias, but becomes an assurance to patrons of a deep

and continuous moral and religious influence, and insures such protection and support as is necessary to secure its continued welfare.

Courses of Study.

1. THE COLLEGE PREPARATORY COURSE is designed to qualify for ready entrance to the full classical and scientific courses of our Western colleges.

2. THE SEMINARY COURSE is designed to meet the wants and needs of such as desire a knowledge of the languages, sciences, etc., and yet cannot see their way clear to go through college. We believe it will fit for a high place in society and qualify for active life.

3. THE TEACHER'S COURSE offers those branches of knowledge which best fit for teaching, broadens and deepens thought, and stimulate habits of observation both indoors and out. Classes in Theory of Teaching and Government, with the best text-books as authorities, will be organized for those taking the course. If this course is faithfully followed, it will enable the graduate to secure a certificate very easily, and it will not be the fault of the course or the faculty if he does not take first rank among teachers.

4. THE BUSINESS COURSE will well prepare anyone who has the requisite mental strength and business tastes for the successful pursuit of an ordinary occupation, and at a rate surprisingly low. We do not promise a position to any graduate, nor agree to turn out a "successful business man in three months."

5. A TWO YEARS' COURSE IN INSTRUMENTAL MUSIC embodies the following piano studies:

Sutter's Grand German Method; Burgmuller, op. 100; Clementi's Sonatinas, op. 36, (four hands); Bertini, op. 29 and 32; Czerny's Velocity Studies, books I and II; Burgmuller's Etudes Brillantes et Melodiques; Cramer's Etudes.

Selections will be interspersed from the best classic authors—Beethoven, Heller, Goldbeck, Litolf, Rubinstein, Schubert, Schumann, Weber, etc.

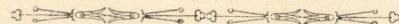
Classes in vocal music, meeting twice each week, are formed when there is sufficient demand.

Those wishing to make music a special study, can, with profit, take daily lessons.

For occasional loss of lessons by absence of pupils, no reduction will be made. In cases of protracted illness, however, there will be suitable reduction.

Private lessons will be given in harmony and voice culture at low rates.

Graduates in all courses will receive Diplomas certifying to the careful completion of said courses. They will not be issued to those who do not merit it as shown by thorough examination and class work.

No reduction will be made for less than half a term.

Those graduating in Seminary Course at full rates, will have a reduction of one-half on last term's tuition. Those graduating in the Normal Course, taking all the course in this school at full rates, will have a reduction of one-fourth on last term's tuition.

It will be seen by the above figures that our terms are from \$1.00 to \$5.00 lower, for the same grades of studies, than any other school in the State.

BOARD AND ROOMS.

By the energy and liberality of the trustees and other friends of the school, an attractive boarding hall has been built and has been in successful operation for the past three years. It is situated just across the street fronting the Seminary. It has the capacity in rooms and at the tables for thirty to forty pupils. The rooms are furnished with good stoves, and are rented to the pupils at the rate of 25 cents per pupil per week. Pupils are expected to supply the other furniture, either by buying or renting at furniture store, or by bringing with them from home.

So far the boarding has been on the club plan, namely: Provisions, fuel and work for kitchen and dining hall are bought at as reasonable rates as possible, and the bills are presented to the club and audited and paid by it. The teachers are members of the club, and the general management of the hall is under the supervision of the principal. This plan has given universal satisfaction. Wholesome and well-cooked food, abundant and varied, has been furnished at less than \$2.00 per week, this includes pay for fuel and lights, and frequently the \$2.00 will cover room rent also. Present indications are that the hall will be filled to its fullest capacity. Those who wish board or rooms in the hall or in the community, will do well to apply some time before the terms commence.

Rent for the term must be paid in advance in order to secure rooms in boarding hall. No room will be considered engaged until paid for. Money refunded in case of severe and protracted sickness. Room rent receipts are transferable by permit from principal.

Good board in private families, with rooms, lights, and fuel furnished, can easily be obtained at from \$2.50 to \$3. per week.

Rooms for self-boardings can be rented at from fifty cents to \$1.50 a scholar per month.

With good rooms so cheap and provisions at low prices, or furnished by parents or guardian, the actual money outlay for board need not exceed \$12.00 per term.

There are no extra fees not mentioned in the catalogue. we can compete with any institution in the State in the amount given for the money.

TEXT-BOOKS.

Students should bring their old text-books. If not used, here they will be convenient for reference. The following authors have been in use, and can be bought here at about wholesale rates, viz: Fish's Arithmetic, Wentworth's Algebra, Robinson's Geometry, Reed & Kellogg's Higher Lessons in English, Swinton's Complete Geography, Huston's Physical Geography, Swinton's Word Analysis, Huston's Natural Philosophy, Lippincott's Fifth Reader, Meserve's Book-keeping, Kellogg's Rhetoric, Young's Civil Government, Anderson's History of the World, Dana's Geological story, Wood's Botany, Eclectic U. S. History, Eclectic Physiology, Harkness' Latin Grammar, and Jones' First Lessons in Latin. It is designed to have the *best books*. *The greatest good to the pupil;* and thus the greatest benefit to the school.

REMARKS ON GOVERNMENT AND MEMBERSHIP.

Mildness with firmness, charity with strictness, love with justice. We take no students to reform them, but endeavor to assist every one in securing a good moral and intellectual education. Punctuality, good order, the cultivation of good manners and habits, the mingling of young men and women in refined society, charitable opinions, integrity and truthfulness, and a strict compliance with the rules of the institution will be expected and required.

DEVOTIONAL EXERCISES.

The work of each school day is introduced by suitable religious exercises in the Seminary chapel.

It is expected that all students will attend church services each Sabbath. And are required to report at roll-call such attendance.

MERIT AND DEMERIT.

A daily record is kept of the scholarship, attendance and deportment of each student, an abstract of which is read publicly at the close of each term, and sent to parents or guardians when requested.

CONDITIONS OF ADMISSION.

1. Students to be of good character.
2. Pledge themselves to observe the requirements of the school.
3. To pay or arrange for settlement of all bills in advance.
4. To register name and studies and pay enrollment fee before entering classes.

WANTED.

Good students. Young persons of good abilities and good purposes are desired as students. We want those who have a capacity for study, and are willing to study hard. We want those who desire to improve their time and talents. To all such we promise help in developing their powers.

NOT WANTED.

Young persons of bad habits, of vicious dispositions, or of low sensual tastes. We cannot please idle or malicious persons. It is not pleasant here for those who do not try to learn, and we hope none such will enter the school. Parents having children known to be bad are requested not to send them here.

We aim to do all the good we can, but we do not want the good injured by associating with the bad. "Evil communications corrupt good manners."

Students can complete our course without attending consecutively. Many students attend two terms a year and teach one or two terms.

Students not intending to graduate can select such studies as they are qualified to study.

EDUCATION.

Some persons have mistaken the nature and value of education. They consider education and knowledge as equivalent; and they value knowledge as a means of doing business or making money.

An education consists of three things: Knowledge, mental power and habit. Knowledge is whatever is known. Its value depends more upon its quality than upon its amount. A little, well-known, and thoroughly at command, is of great value.

Mental power is strength of mind. It is measured by the closeness with which a subject is kept in mind, the length of the time concentrated effort can be made, or the extent of the subject which can be grasped, and the energy with which it can be investigated.

Habit is the bent of mind—its tendency to action. It is the result of repeated efforts, and has immense influence upon every individual.

A good education consists in definite knowledge, well developed mental power, and right habits of body and mind.

A complete education fits a man to perform justly and skillfully all private duties.

DUTY OF THE TEACHER TO THE SCHOLAR.

The teacher should direct the scholar in the choice of studies. He should show him how and when to apply his mind to study.

He should advise him in the use of his time.
 He should encourage him in difficulties.
 He should reprove him for his errors.
 He should place before him correct standards of excellence.
 He should exhibit to him a true model for copying in life.
 He should infuse a love for study.
 He should train pupils to right habits of thought and action.
 He should be a firm friend.
 He should lead him to regard the performance of duty as the greatest good, and the neglect of duty as the worst of evils.

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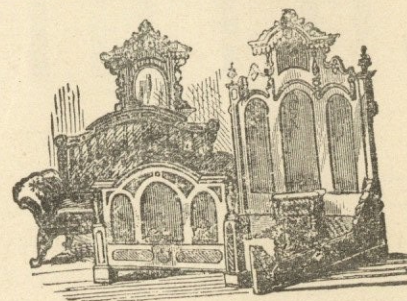
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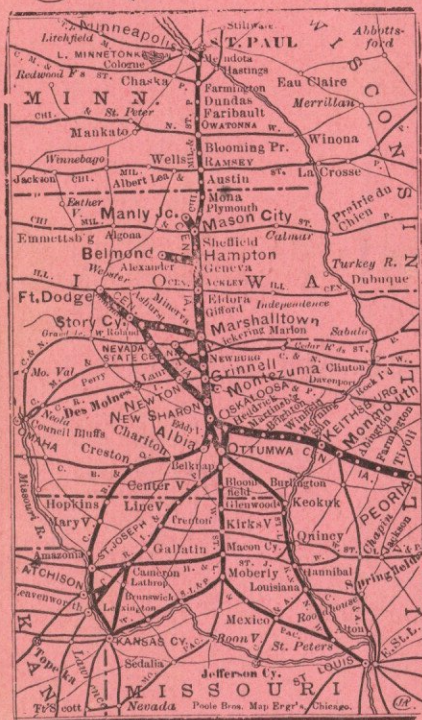

 1:30 p. m., Ackley 3:13 p. m., Eldora 3:40
 p. m., Marshalltown 4:45 p. m., Grinnell
 5:45 p. m., Oskaloosa 7:10 p. m., Albion
 8:20 p. m., reaching St. Louis at 7:30 and
 Kansas City at 8:35 a. m., connecting at
 Mason City with the C. M. & St. P., at Ac-
 kley with Ill. Cent. going east, at Marshall
 with C. & N. W., going east and Diagonal
 for Des Moines, Pickering with C. & M. St.
 P. going east Albion Junction with the C.
 B. & Q. for the west, at Albion with the

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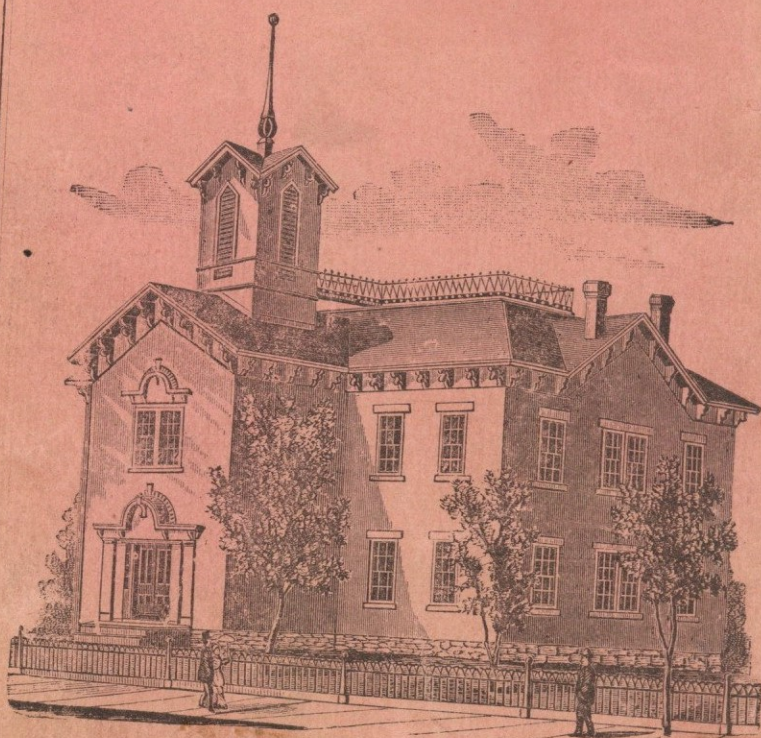
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
