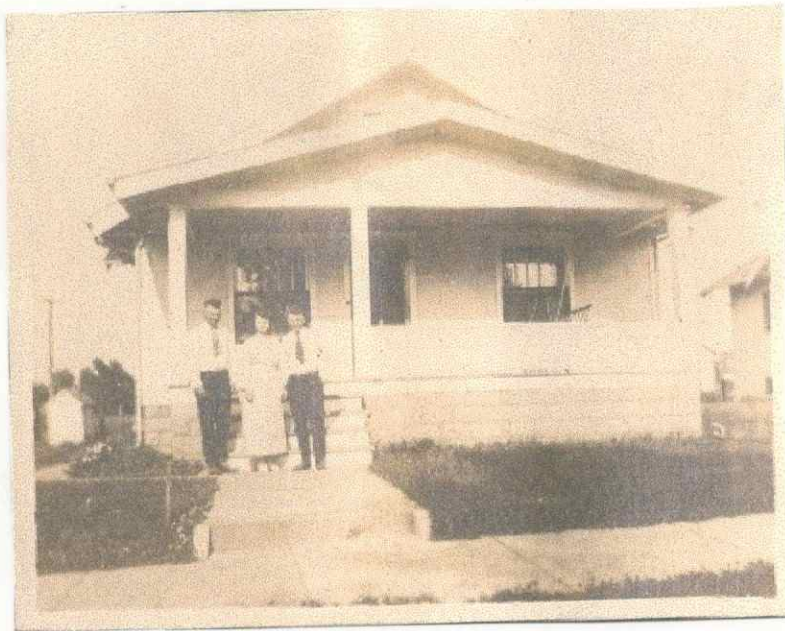

Sp. 4 Bob Carlson, 21, 12708 Carpenter, Calumet Park is greeted by his mother, Arlene Carlson upon his return from a tour of duty in Viet Nam.

Sp4 Class, Bob Carlson, 21 son of Mr. & Mrs. Robert Carlson, 12708 Carpenter Street, Calumet Park, recently returned from service overseas in Viet Nam.

Bob, who quarterbacked the 1966 Eisenhower Football Cardinals, received his basic training and Advanced Infantry Training at Fort Polk, Alexandria, Louisiana and graduated Paratrooper Jump School at Fort Benning, Georgia.

After attending language school in DaNang, Viet Nam Bob saw service with the 173rd Airborne Brigade at Bong Son, An Khe, Tuy Hoa and Bambi Tue, Viet Nam.

Among his decorations for valor overseas are the Bronze Star, Army Commendation Medal, Vietnamese Campaign and Service Medal, Expert

Machine Gun and Rifle Medal and National Defense Ribbon.

In an interview Bob said, "The presence of the American Soldier participating in the pacification program appeared to make the Vietnamese people wary at first but after a while their appreciation was very evident."

He added, "I think we should stay in Viet Nam until the end of the war which militarily is in sight. Right now it, (meaning operations overseas in Viet Nam), is mostly a harrasing operation and at Bong Son all the women, especially, felt a sense of security with us in the area."

"It was a long year," said Bob's mother, Arlene, "and I'm just elated and so happy he's home."

Dear Ken & Ethelene,

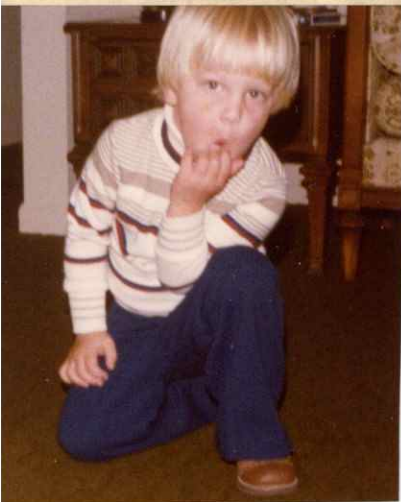
Its your anniversary and, as always, its a pleasure to send you our best wishes once more.

For the past five weeks I have tried to phone you, but to no avail. The number I have listed in our phone book is 1-515-483-2094. Possibly you have moved or changed your phone number.

As you have noted I am writing this rather than Arlene.

The sad news is that Arlene has passed away. How it occurred the following will explain.

Arlene went to the hospital on August 16th for an Angio-gram on her kidney and during the process suffered a stroke to her left side. After three ^{days} she seemed to be coming out of it very well. She was talking and starting to have feeling in her limbs. They started to give her therapy and then a few days later she suffered another stroke. She went into a coma which lasted over two weeks from which she never regained consciousness. She passed away on Sept 12th.

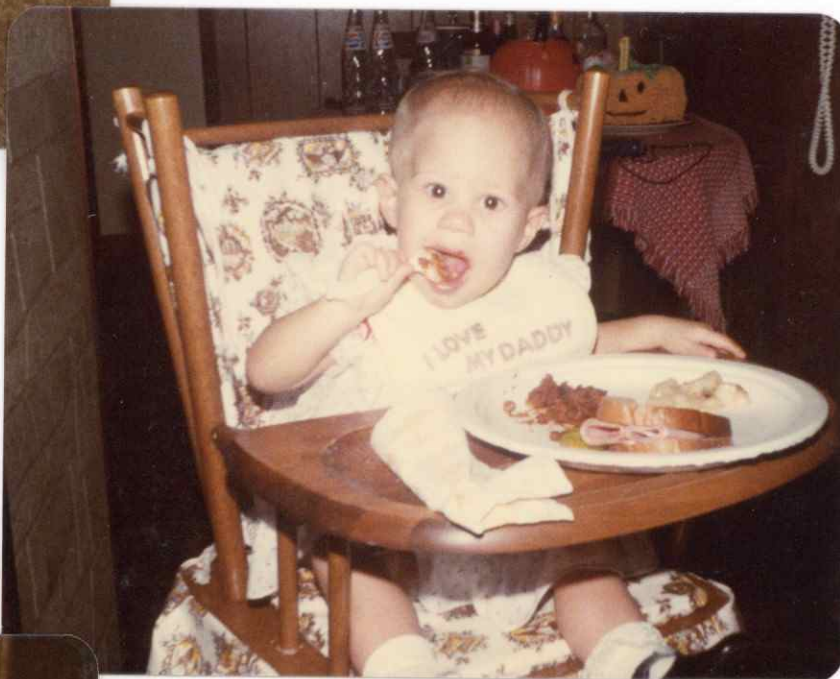

Dear Frene

I have been wanting to write you all this last year but due to all these trying times, I just didn't take time to do it. Having three of my children away from home I have to be busy writting letters to them. My oldest boy, who is 25-yrs. old is in the Air corps. He graduated July 4th. Which makes him ready for service where they see him fit. at present he is stationed at Houston Texas. where he is employed in the How Target Squadron. He ranks as 2^d Lt. My second son is 22, and is also

stationed at Houston Texas. He is not drafted in the army yet as he is a Civil Engineer and does internal defense work. So they deferred him for some time till he can be replaced by some other guy. So you can see I have quite a few worries. My third son he just missed this last registration as he will be 18 in Dec. But I am afraid it won't be long with him and he will be drafted too. He graduated from High school last year. We would like to send him to college but due to shortage of hands at these times we need him so bad at home. And he is really a born ranchman, who can not be replaced by a hand so easily. My oldest girl is 20 and she is working in Austin, Texas as a stenographer almost two yrs. and then I have two little girls, at least I call them little they are as big as I am. They are 15 and 14 yrs. So you see that makes three boys and three girls in my family. Quite a bunch but I am thankful and proud of them, I guess like every mother is. Well I better stop about my family as this may get tiresome to read. But I hope you will write me all about your family too some day soon.

My father is still living, and my mother died Feb a year ago. She was 86 yrs old, and Dad is 88 now. He is the only one of the Groh Sr. living. Aunt Minna Clark in San Antonio, you know Ernestine's

and she lives with her.⁽³⁾ You inquired about Alice. But
I get to see her so seldom that I can't write much about
her. As much as I know she must not be living with her
husband anymore. You maybe remember Alice's brother
Alfred, they had one daughter named Elsa. She was
married (Elsa) and she and her husband were killed
in a car accident. And that grieved her mother so that
not so very long after that she died and just about
a year later Alfred died too. So no one survives from
their family. And her other brother Ervin was also
killed in a car wreck, and his wife died too, but he
left a couple of children. Olga Grobe the youngest girl
of Uncle Ernest, she married a guy for San Antonio
and is living there. She doesn't have any children.
You asked about Mrs Peterson. Her mother was one
of Uncle Ernest Grobes' girls. She also has a

brother as minister in Iowa. Probably
your folks over there know him, Helmouth
Gold.

What is your girl doing? She must be
about grown, too. I want you to write
me all about your family and also
about your mother, whom I always
had in mind to write a letter to,
but still didn't get to it. Hope they are
all well yet. Are your brothers married
and living up there too?

How are the crops up your way? The crops
were good here, but we are having as
much rain here this last month that
the people are just unable to harvest their
crops. They are raising peanuts as a
main crop and some cotton, and they
both can't stand this rain.

We on our farm are just raising fed
(over)

stuff for our stock. We are running about 50 registered Herford cows, and around 400 sheep and 400 goats on our ranch, which makes a pretty good living for our family. As you may have learned from your children, to send them thru college takes quite a bit of dough.

Our peach crop was not so hot this year, as a late frost ruined them, but we really have a dandy crop off grapes this year which we are enjoying now. Some of the neighboring orchards (peach) had a wonderful crop. They smudged when the frost came on, and thereby saved the fruit.

I don't know whether you are a sport in hunting and fishing like I am, but I really get pick out of it. My husband and I really enjoy going out in camp with some other folks to hunt deer and wild turkey, and also fishing. He caught one on his rod and reel here a week or so ago that weight $4\frac{1}{2}$ lb. I haven't been so lucky as to catch such a big one, but I enjoy the little ones, too.

Well, I sure, I do wish that you and your family could spend sometime with us down here.

We would really be glad to have you.

So I guess I will have to bring this to a conclusion, as you may get tired of this

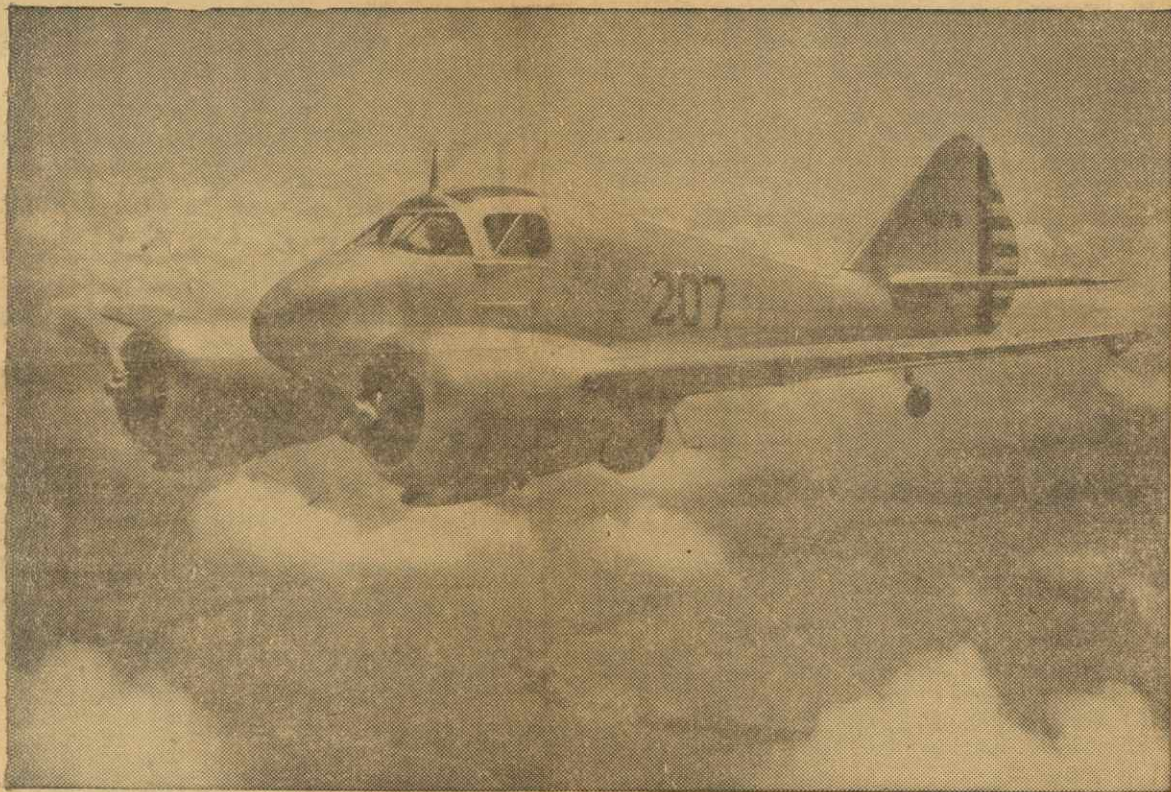
