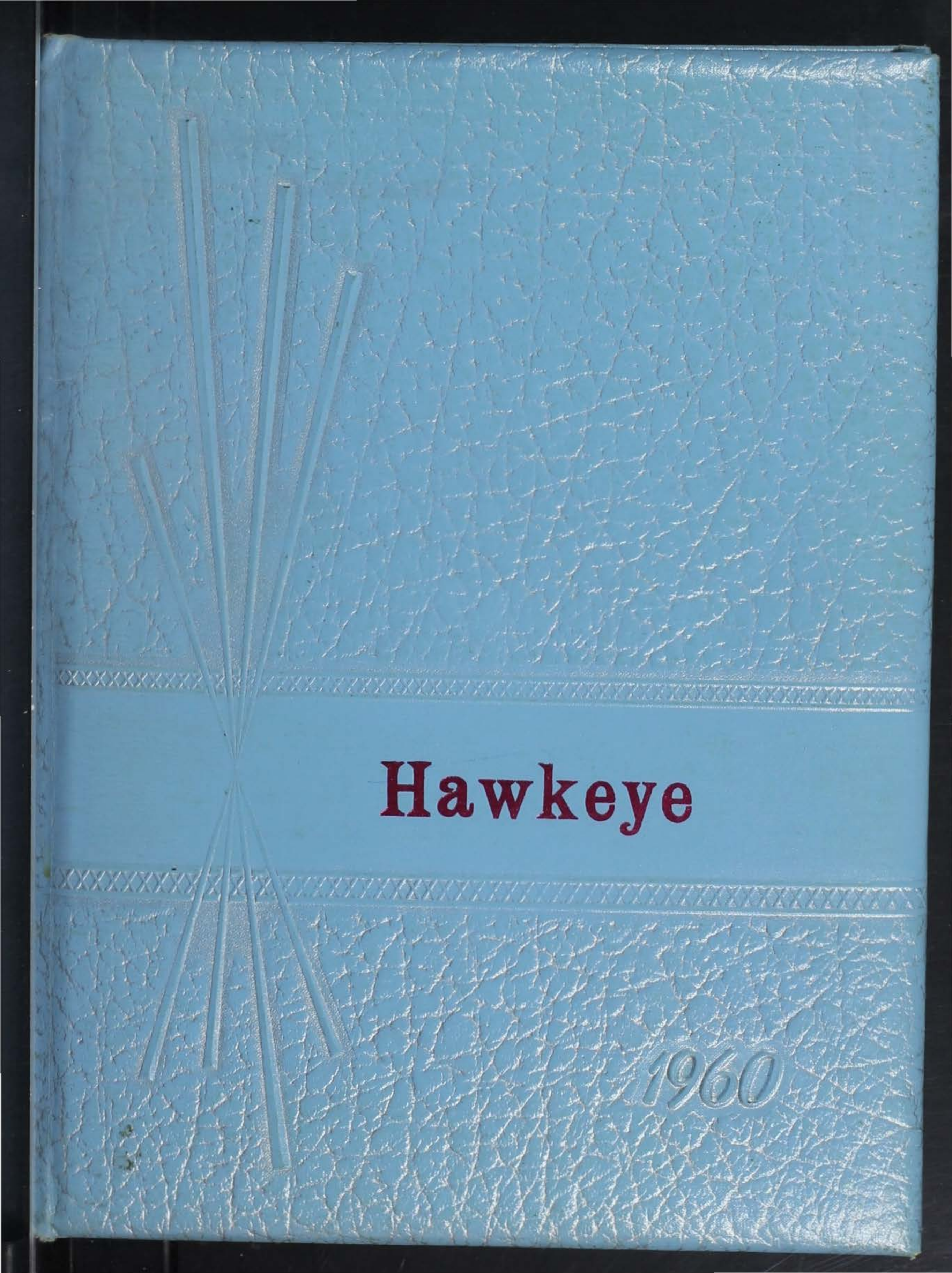

SENIORS TO OLYMPICS

Papoose Valley, Iowa (AP)--Sunday, February 28, marked the completion of the 1960 annual Winter Olympic Games at Papoose Valley.

Taking all the gold medals for the U.S. and putting us in first place were the seniors of Ankeny High School from Ankeny, Iowa.

The Ankeny boys Olympic team excelled outstandingly in all downhill skiing events, and, although competition was tough during the 80-meter ski jump, they still managed to pull through with the top rating in this event also.

The dangerous curves of "Old K-T 2,222 didn't hinder the girls in the least bit as Ankeny's representatives actually took over the downhill race, covering over a mile in distance. The senior girl's average record-breaking time in this event was one minute, 3.1 seconds!!

Speed Skating

During the speed skating races, the representatives from Upper Slobovia took the lead at the start. Struggling for one more gold medal, Ankeny's girls gradually regained their position on the scoreboard, aside from many bumps and bruises. The Slobovians had to settle for second place.

Free-Style Couple Skating

Here is where the seniors really showed their stuff. Putting



all the other couples to shame, the top twosome from Ankeny's seniors stole the show with their own brilliant maneuver called the quadruple jackknife-double pretzel-twist deathspin. This completely won over the crowd and the judges, and again Ankeny finished with No. 1.

Second Half

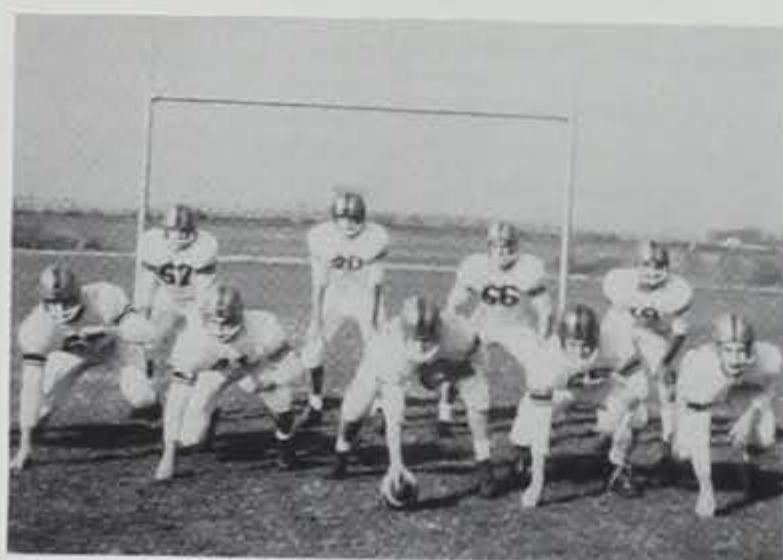
The third quarter of the game started off with a jolt as freshman Don Madole astounded the spectators and himself by kicking a field goal from the Polar Bear 25 yard line.

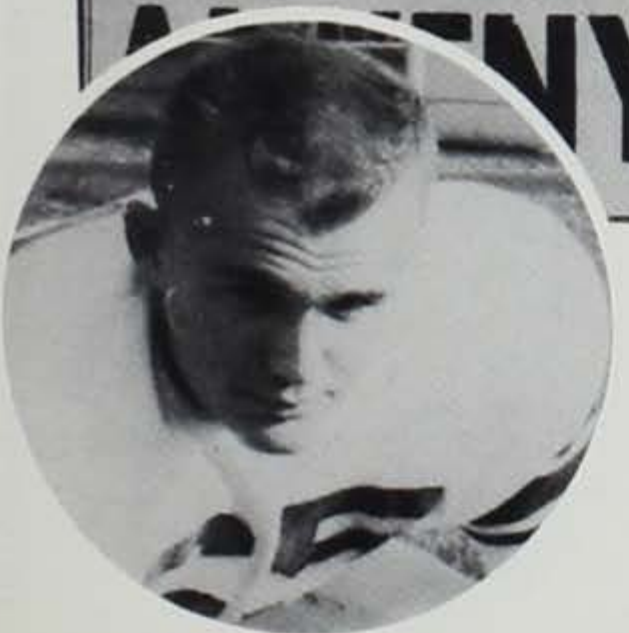

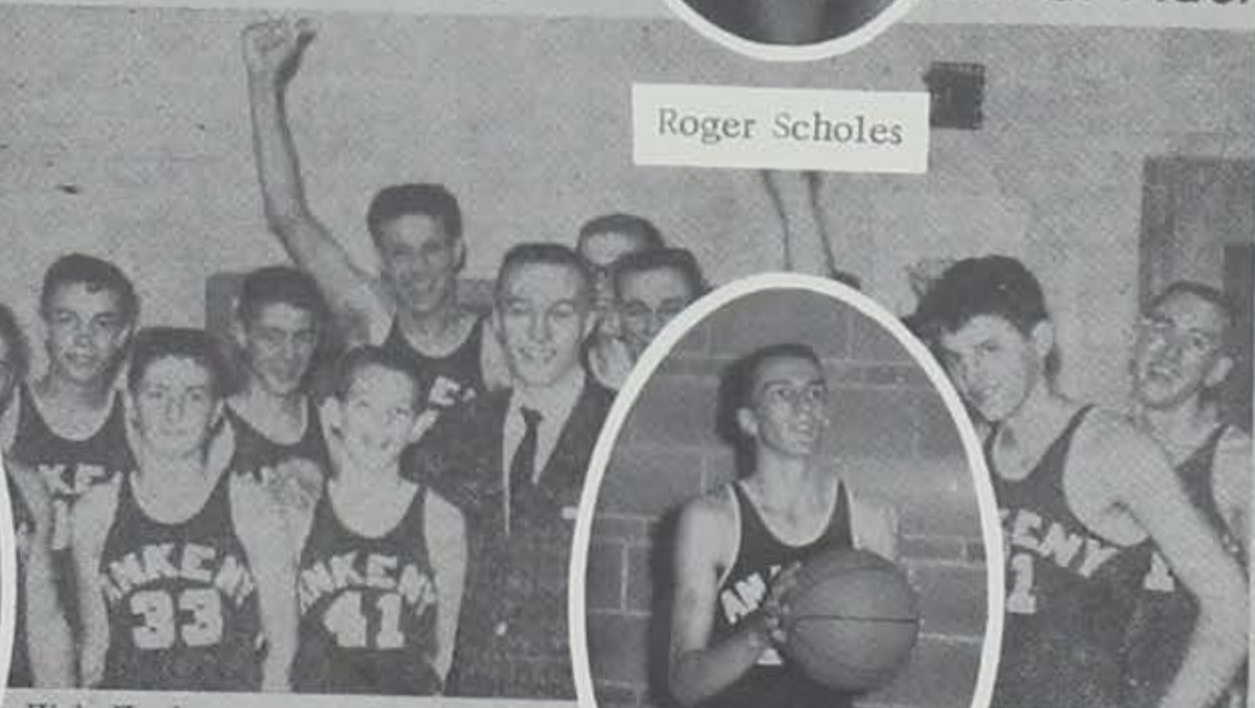

BAND IN MOSCOW

Moscow, Russia (AP)--This year's annual World-Wide Band Festival was brought to a close today with a grand concert given by all the bands attending.

Among the 2,001 bands participating in this gala affair was the world-renowned high school band from the ever famous city of Ankeny, Iowa.

Upon arriving in the Soviet capital, the Ankeny band members were greeted by the Soviet Premier himself, Nikita Khrushchev. They were then guests at Moscow's most popular hamburger joint, "The Wooden Nickle", after which they were taken on a guided tour of the great metropolis.

The band and their Director, George Friedmeyer, were then escorted to the auditorium where the rehearsals and the concert would take place. After being directed to their home room, the band members were free to roam about the city as they pleased and were allowed to go anywhere as long as they stayed within the city limits.

It is reported that a good time was had by all.

When the huge band met for its first rehearsal in the afternoon, the participants were introduced to their director for the festival, Msr.



Sergei Gommaghenshulmonder, President Emeritus of the League of Retired Band Directors in Moscow. Following a two hour rehearsal, a refreshingly delicious snack consisting of seven raisins was served to each person.

After twelve more rehearsals in the preceding two days, the band at last prepared to present its concert. Twenty-four lovely selections were played. Some of the most popular were: "Machraminoff's Symphony in H Flat Minor, (Op. 244, No. 1 1/2)", "Hitler's Fifth", "The Flight of the Beemle Bum" (with Flugahorn solo), and their closing number, that always popular march, "A Day in the Life of a Voodoo Doctor."

Upon returning home, the Ankeny Band made several comments, which led our reporters to assume that all had a very enjoyable trip and that everyone is looking forward to next year's festival to be held in Des Moines.

WHAT COULD BE DONE

Jimmy is an eleven-year old cerebral palsied boy. He cannot use his legs to stand or walk. He cannot talk except to say single syllable words. He cannot use his left arm to play but has learned to control his right arm to the extent that he can feed himself. In spite of his handicaps he has a ready smile and sparkling blue eyes which makes us wonder what all he could do if we were able to give him the help he needed.

Jimmy and about 100 other children and adult spastic patients at Glenwood State School have had no access to physical therapy until September of this year. Now we have the therapist but sadly enough still have only very limited equipment. Nor do we have funds sufficient to purchase equipment which might help Jimmy and others like him learn to control their bodies and help themselves to become as nearly normal as possible.

We can only provide Jim with a wheel chair and exercise by massage. This is not enough.

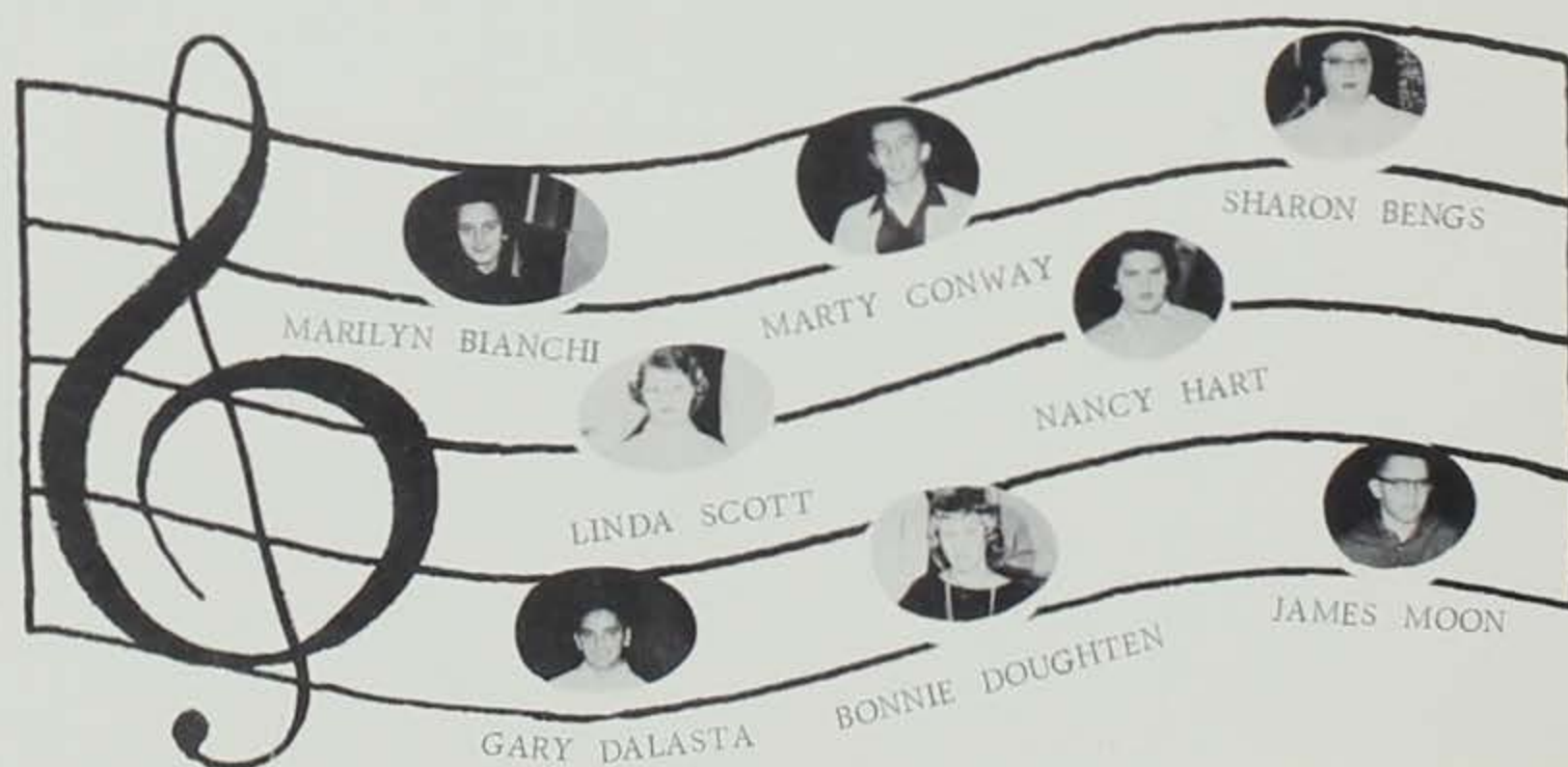

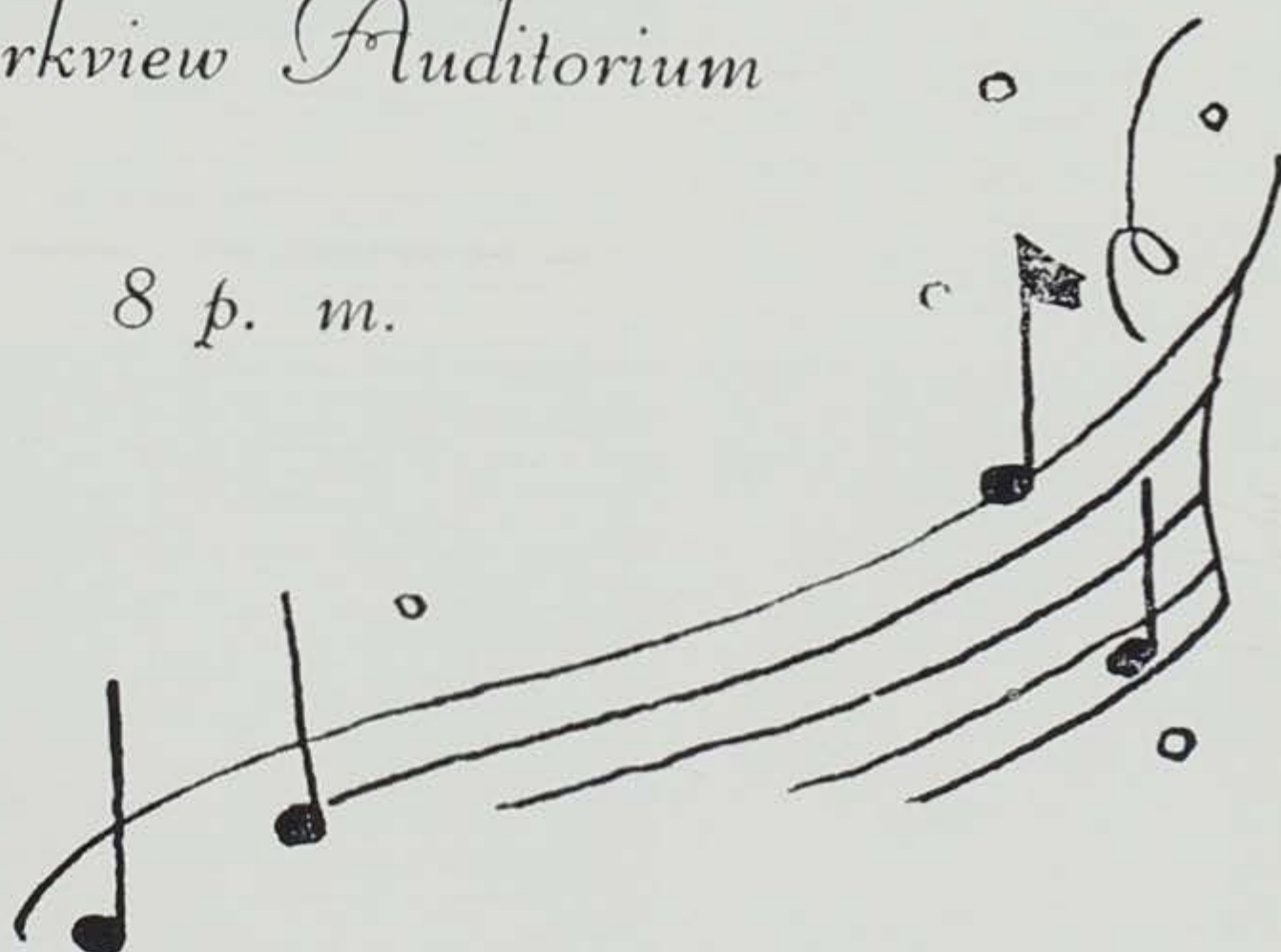

TEACHERS STRIKE!!!

Ankeny, Iowa (AP)-- Thursday morning, February 31st saw certain members of Local 137 of the Ankeny High School Teachers Union on picket duty in front of the high school, following a night of rioting and confusion.

It seemed to our reporters that the teachers were displaying unrest as a result of the increasing uncontrollability of the Ankeny High students, although other factors may have been involved.

One teacher, who wishes to remain anonymous, remarked, "Ever since Christmas vacation I just haven't been able to settle my sociology class down. I kick the whole class out every day, but I end up begging them to come back to class the next day, so it doesn't do any good. How do they expect us to work under these conditions anyway?"

Another teacher said, "How can I drill any English into their heads when they insist that Julius Caesar is strictly from Squaresville?"

Many have thought that arbitration will be the key to the settlement of this dispute, but if this method does not prove successful the President will resort to ordering the teachers back to work under the Taft-Hartley Act.



TEACHERS STRIKE

PAY INCREASE FOR ANKENY TEACHERS

Based on Education and Experience.

At a special meeting of the Ankeny School Board held last Friday night, the board voted 4-0 in favor of a new pay schedule for teachers in the school system. Member Vic Johnson was not present at the meeting.

The schedule was recommended by the teacher salary committee.

Class I--Teachers with 60 to 89 hours of college education will begin at \$3,300, plus \$100 for each year of experience.

Class II--Teachers with 90 hours or more of college education will begin at \$3,550, plus \$110 for

each year of experience.

Class III--Teachers with a B.A. degree will begin at \$4,250 plus \$120 for each year of experience.

Class IV--Teachers with M.A. degree of 150 hours of college education will begin at \$4,650 plus \$130 for each year of experience.

Increases over last year's schedule are: Class I, \$100; Class II, \$150; Class III, \$250; Class IV, \$450. The board pointed out that the large increase in Class IV was due to the fact that there have been no raises in this category in the past two years.

This schedule applies only to teachers and not administrative positions. The increase will average approximately \$300 per year for teaching personnel.

IMMIGRATION QUOTAS RISE

Ankeny, Iowa (AP)--Recent studies show that an alarming number of new immigrants plan to enter the country as High School Freshmen. This year's probable entrance number will undoubtedly surpass all other records to date.

Many Causes

Present facilities in the Jr. High building cannot begin to serve the increased enrollment. Teacher shortage also lends to the overcrowded conditions.

They are expected to fill the cheering section at the games and YELL their little hearts out. All this is for the good of the school. Maybe someday these poor children will come into the ranks of the upper-classmen and then they will rule the "roost".

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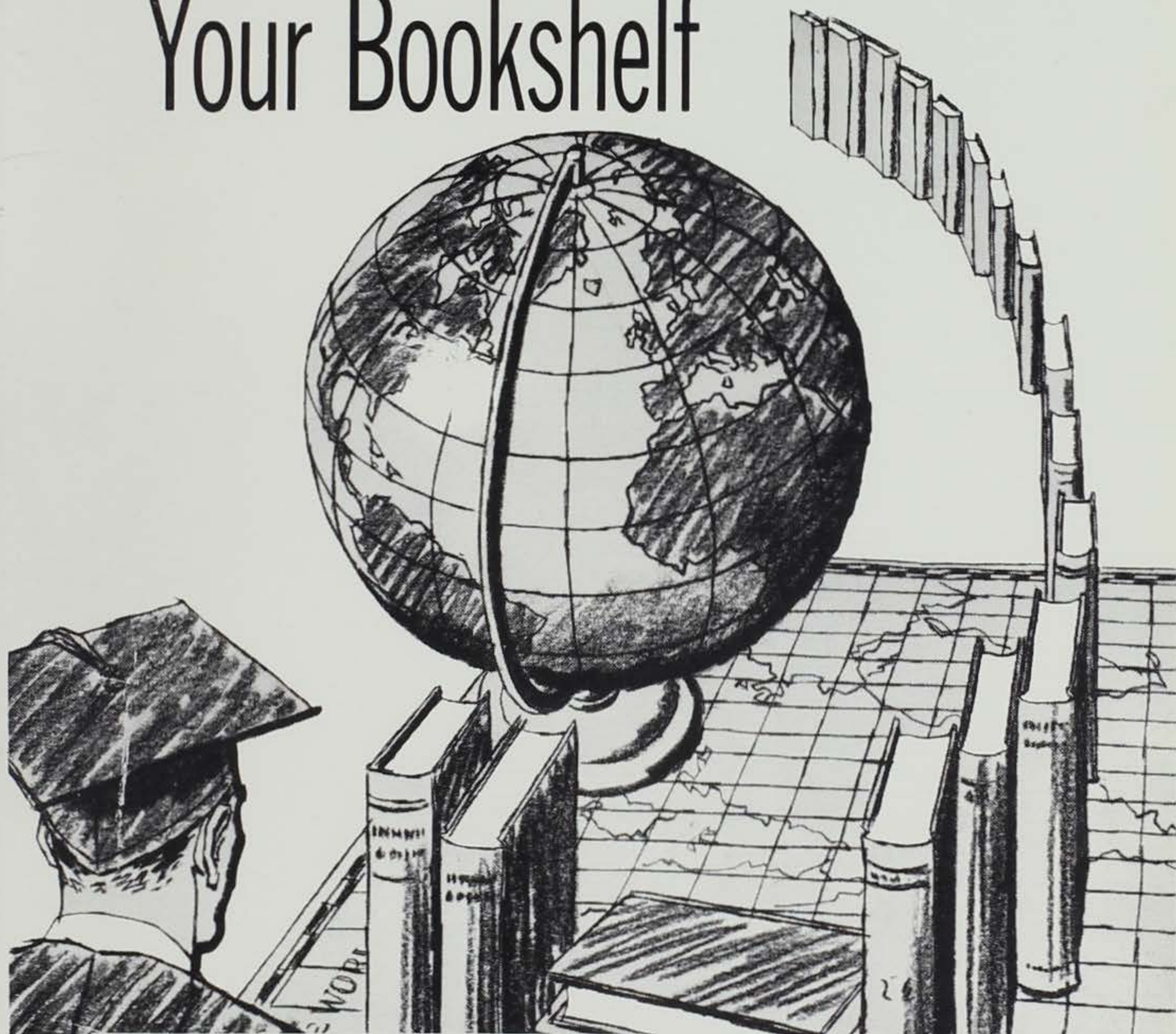
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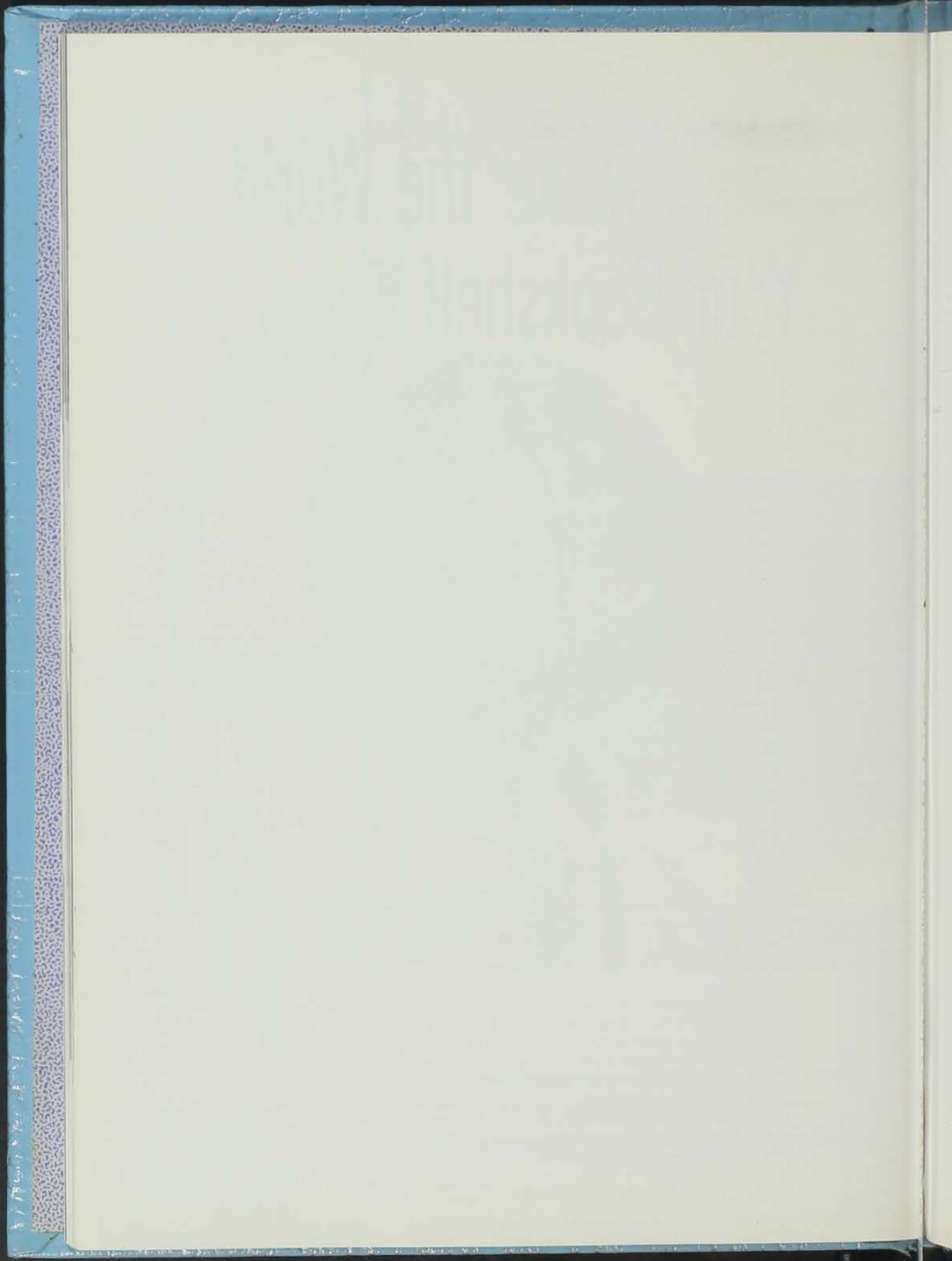
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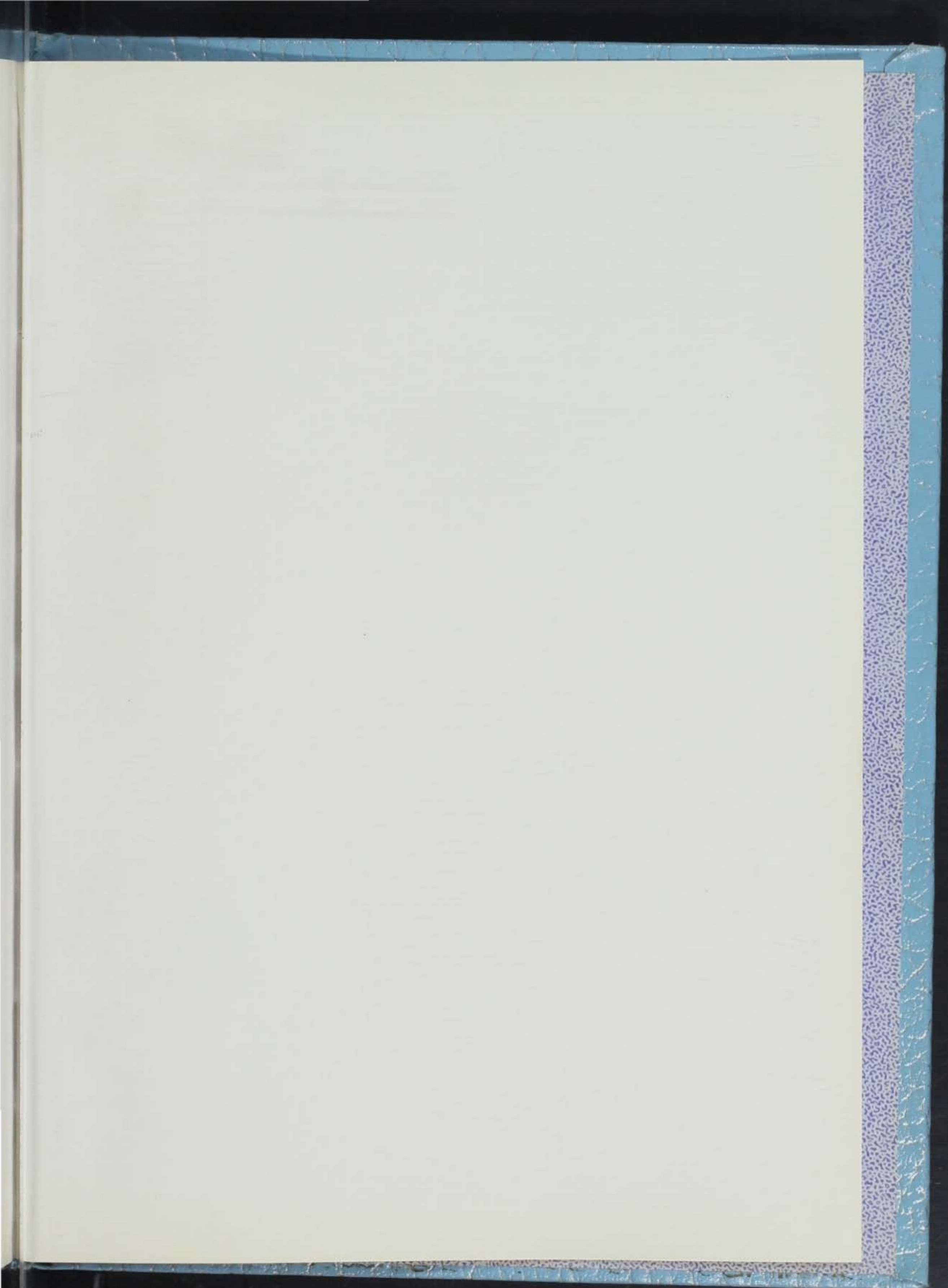
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
