Mullen — Ellerbroek — Rollins — Barron

The track team composed of Barron, Mullen, Rollins and Ellerbroek established an enviable record. These men were all in their first year of college but this lack of experience did not seem to handicap them any.

Their first attempt was at the Kansas Relays. Here they met the best competition in the country and while they didn't win, they made a very creditable showing.

The next meet entered was the Drake relays. Here the team came through by winning the Iowa Conference half mile relay, making much better time and showing considerable improvement over the previous week at Kansas.

At the South Dakota relays B. V. placed in all the events they entered, winning first place in the college section of the half mile relay, and second place in the University section, being barely nosed out by South Dakota University.

B. V.'s four man track team showed their ability at the Iowa Conference meet by winning fourth place. The following list is a record of the way they were placed.

Barron—first—120 yard high hurdles.

Barron—first—220 yard low hurdles.

Mullen—third—100 yard dash.

Ellerbroek—third—220 yard dash.

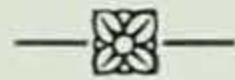

DOPE ON THE GAMES

*Still—6**Buena Vista—0**October 13*

Buena Vista opened the season by losing to Still College at Des Moines on October 13th. Still's team was composed of a husky bunch of veterans. They were also playing their third college game while B. V. was playing its first game. Handicapped by lack of teamwork, due to the fact that the players were not used to each other, and especially by the muddy field which made the usual speed and drive of the BeaVer backfield ineffective. Even under these conditions the BeaVers had the edge on their opponents until the "Bonesetters" completed a thirty yard pass in the last two minutes of the play, which gave them the long end of a 6—0 score.

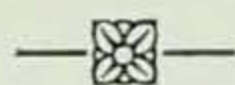
*Western Union—10**Buena Vista—0**October 19*

The second game of the season was played against Western Union at LeMars. This game was bitterly contested. Buena Vista excelled their opponents in every department except aerial attack. The Western Union backs were helpless on line bucks or end runs. Western Union favored by the breaks won, 10—0.

*Morningside—0**Buena Vista—6**October 27*

Due to the BeaVers having an open date and cancellation on the part of one of the teams on Morningside's regular schedule, the Maroons finally consented to meet a B. V. team on the gridiron. Fighting spirit, together with the support of loyal B. V. students sent Buena Vista on the field in an unbeatable condition. Playing in a sea of mud, neither side was able to show much aggressive football. The only score came in the first quarter when Bouck returned a punt through the entire Morningside team. He nearly duplicated this stunt a few minutes later when he got away again, but due to treacherous footing, slipped when he was passing the last man. From then on Saggau showed his football sense and good headwork by playing a defensive game and using only such plays on the offensive as were well covered, thus giving them no chance to score on a fluke. Most of the game was played on even terms in the middle of the field until the third period, when the Morningside coach began to substitute men with dry shoes and clothing in a vain attempt to score. Even these fresh players were ineffective against the battling spirit of the eleven BeaVers who started the game and also finished it.

FOOTBALL—Cont.

*Columbus—0**Buena Vista—10**November 3*

Columbus invaded Storm Lake with a grim determination to down B. V. They did not stop to realize that it was B. V.'s homecoming and that the fighting spirit which was manifested in all the previous games would be at its height. The spectators who witnessed this battle declare that an excellent brand of football was exhibited by both teams. Although B. V. slipped over a touchdown and a drop-kick on the visitors, it took all their grit and ability to do it. Barrett showed up well in this game by catching a pass and going over for a touchdown.

*Trinity—6**Buena Vista—0**November 10*

When these two teams meet on the gridiron there is little love lost. For this reason the BeaVers trained all season for this game, and were at their best when they took the field against the Catholics. Lady Luck surely turned her back on Buena Vista. In the first quarter Buena Vista had the ball within Trinity's ten yard line at least four times, and within the same area at least once more in each successive quarter. Trinity's only chance to score came when one of the Trinity backs intercepted an unprotected Beaver forward pass and went for a touchdown. It was a great contest and was filled with thrills but was surely a tough game to lose.

*Wayne—12**Buena Vista—18**November 17*

Buena Vista was at it's worst in this game and put up a listless game. This was especially true of the line. Wayne scored the first touchdown in the first few minutes of the game. Buena Vista came back with one in the same quarter. The Wayne players were small but hard lighters and put up a good game. Buena Vista annexed two more touchdowns while Wayne secured one more before the game was finally over.

*Ellsworth—0**Buena Vista—89**November 23*

Although the fall is not generally the season for holding track meets, this game can hardly be classed as anything else. All the BeaVers were at their best and they could easily have defeated Ellsworth by a larger score if they had wished to. As it was, the last half was cut from fifteen minutes to ten.

Thus closed a season which can hardly be called unsuccessful but which was not nearly as successful as it should have been, considering the speed and power contained in this team. We can truthfully say that the breaks were against the team in practically all of our contests.

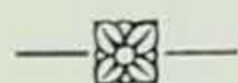

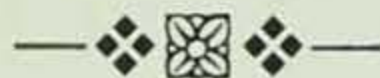
BASKETBALL—Cont.

For these reasons the team was not subjected to very hard training and in some cases did not play the brand of basket ball of which they were capable. Nevertheless, the season was a success and at times the teams showed flashes of basket ball that were of a high caliber.

By breaking even with South Dakota U. in a two game series, losing one and winning one from Columbus, winning two from Western Union and last but not least decisively defeating our old Trinity rivals by winning two out of the three games. We feel that the basket ball season was disposed of rather successfully.



GIRL'S ATHLETICS



Basket ball, Hiking, and Tennis are the main forms of Girl's Athletics for the Beaverettes at Buena Vista.

Basket ball has proved very successful this year. The freshmen have shown exceptional interest in practice, having enough players for two teams. During the season they challenged the faculty to a game in which the faculty team was the winner. This game afforded considerable amusement for faculty and students. Tournament games for point winners were played as the final event of the girl's basket ball season.

Hiking is the chief sport in the spring. The Hiking Club, organized under the management of Florence McFadden, freshman, take four definite hikes, and must hike so many miles every day during the season. The first hike is to Alta, the second around the lake, third to Sioux Rapids, and fourth to Cherokee. The girls also hiked to Newell this year.

A point system is worked out for college women whereby they can earn a sweater and a "B." The system, at present, is twenty-five points for hiking, fifteen points for tennis, and ten for basket ball. The combination of these points gives the required one hundred, and for each successful culmination of athletic work a medal is given.

Miss Lillian McFadden, '23, and Miss Gladys Bethards, '24, were awarded sweaters and their "B" at the end of the 1923 season.



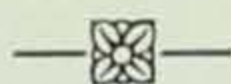

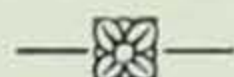

The Y. W. C. A. of Buena Vista is one of the most important organizations. It lends it's aid to the new girls at the opening of the year and makes them acquainted with the college.

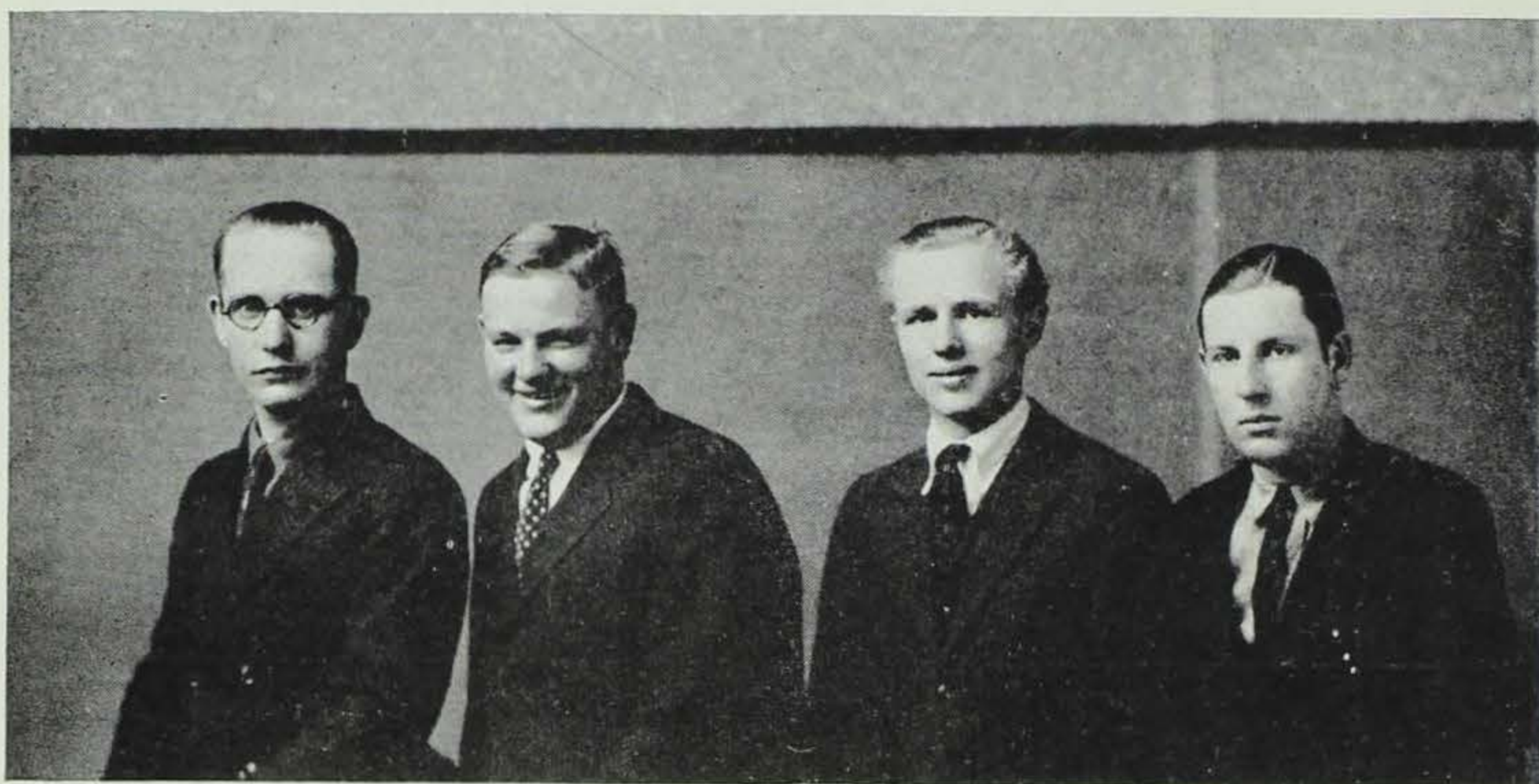
The Y. W. extends also to the foreign fields. The girls here support a Japanese school girl. It is their aim to bring her to America and have her attend Buena Vista College.
