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TWO HURT IN RUNAWAY

Bad Accident Near State Center Saturday Night Results in Painful Injury to Little Mildred Hilleman—Girl's Father Also Hurt When Dog Frightens Horses and Buggy Overturns.

Wilbert Hilleman, a farmer living three and one-half miles northeast of State Center, and his little daughter Mildred were both injured, the latter very painfully, when the Hilleman team ran away Saturday night at about 7 o'clock as the Hillemans were driving to State Center. The little girl's injuries consist of a fracture of the collar bone, shoulder blade, and arm at a point two inches below the shoulder. Mr. Hilleman was badly bruised about the head and face, and his son Harold sustained slight bruises.

In the Hilleman rig were Mr. and Mrs. Hilleman, their son and daughter, Harvey Hilleman, a brother of Mr. Hilleman, and Miss Clara Kuhn, of Nauvoo, Ill. When the rig was opposite the George Nolte place, a mile and a half north of State Center, the Nolte dog ran out, barking at the horses. This frightened the team, which started to run down the hill. At the bridge crossing Linn creek, just north of Hillside cemetery, the buggy was overturned, and the occupants dumped out in a heap. The little girl was brought to State Center, where her injuries were dressed.

POULTRY CULLING PAYS NON-PRODUCING HENS ARE DETRIMENT TO FLOCKS

That poultry culling in Marshall county, as done under the direction of the Marshall County Farm Bureau, is a success is proved by results that have been obtained in

culled since July 1. The work for the most part has been in charge of A. F. Hankins, who has co-operated with the farm bureau.

The culling comes as a result of demonstrations that have been given in the county the last four years by Iowa State College. Its purposes is to weed out non-producing hens and to build up better flocks. In some cases farmers and poultry raisers have been taught to do their own culling, while others have called upon the farm bureau to have it done right.

As examples of some of the results that have been obtained, C. A. Paul, living near Ferguson, had 183 fowls. When they were culled, 127 of them were found to be non-producers. The next day, after the 127 had been weeded out, the fifty-five laying hens, produced one egg more than had been gathering the day before the culling.

W. C. Hilleman living north of State Center, had 172 hens. For fourteen days prior to the culling process he had kept a record of the eggs gathered. Fifty hens were taken from the flock, and the remaining 122 hens produced seventy seven more eggs during the next fourteen days than had been produced in the fourteen days prior to the culling.

Wilbert C. Hilleman, 79, well known and highly respected retired farmer, and a native of State Center, passed away unexpectedly Thursday afternoon, September 20th at the farm home of a grandson. Mr. Hilleman, still active for his years, had gone to the farm to assist with some seasonal work.

Funeral services were held Saturday afternoon, September 22nd from the St. Paul Lutheran church in charge of the Rev. Dr. Herman Sieskes of Mason City, assisted by Dr. Peter Hinrichs of Boyden. Interment was in Hillside Cemetery. Dr. Sieskes and Dr. Hinrichs are nephews of Mrs. Hilleman.

Pallbearers were Dale, Howard, and Alan Hilleman; Robert, and Roger Meier and Charles Lampkin.

Mr. Hilleman was born November 15, 1883 near State Center, the son of Frederick and Marie Garbelman Hilleman. He grew up and was educated in this community.

He was united in marriage to Johannah Hamman at Nauvoo, Ill., on June 28, 1903 and they resided on a farm three miles north of State Center until Mr. Hilleman retired in 1938 and they moved to town where they had since lived.

The couple celebrated their Golden Wedding anniversary in June, 1953.
